Nationalist promises to attack the invaders gathering at Hankow were not relied upon by foreign consuls, who said government forces there were not strong enough to support their own picks. Barber wire entanglements were erected about the Japanese concession there.

Aliens Warned
Four thousand Red troops were reported in British advices as marching upon Kinkiang strategic city in northern Kiangsi province.

Chinese authorities warned foreigners to leave Kuling, summer resort near Kinkiang. Additional British gunboats were sent to that area.

Japanese naval authorities said four destroyers were being held at their base in readiness for duty in China. If needed, two hundred Japanese marines also were standing by at Sasebo for emergency orders.

Gunboat Route Reds
NAKING, Aug. 1.—The navy ministry asserted a Chinese gunboat arrived at Chongsha today, bombarded communist positions and forced the reds who had backed the Hunan province capital for four days to withdraw northeast.

Kuomintang (people's party) officials branded the communist depredations at Chongsha as "solely aimed to embroil the nationalist government by causing foreign complications."

Japanese consular officials have received instructions from Tokyo to file a protest with the Chinese government as a result of the Chongsha incident, reserving according to Japanese reports, "the right to demand indemnities for losses Japanese suffered thereby."

Foreign Minister C. T. Wang said tonight the government "holds itself fully responsible for the regrettable occurrences at Chongsha."
