NESS OFFICIATES AT INSTALLATION OF NEW STATION

T. H. Ness, former manager of the California Oregon Power company division here, now division manager of the Coos Bay district, officiated at the opening of the new steam electric generating station at North Bend last night.

The new, large power plant, completed July 1, is interconnected with the local transmission system of the power company by 2 110,000-volt power line built last fall by the Copeco concern. This connection assures this district of a standby service in case of emergency.

Line 20, the new high tension line, was built last fall and extends from Dixonville to Marshfield, Oregon, a distance of approximately 65 miles. The line traverses a rough, mountainous country covered with heavy timber, which made construction work extremely difficult. It is interesting to note that in the survey of this new transmission line the latest modern methods were employed, an airplane being employed for the purpose of making an aerial reconnaissance which proved valuable in determining the best route to follow through this rugged country.

The carrying on of the extensive construction work represented by the above line and power plant has involved the expenditure of a large sum of money in this territory for labor, foodstuffs and materials. In accordance with the usual Byllesby policy, local labor and materials were given the preference wherever possible to do so.

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DEVICE FOR FIRE FIGHTING TESTED

County officials and prominent farmers watched a demonstration of a new kind of fire extinguisher shortly before noon today put on by Harry Boyle, agent for the new device.

The extinguisher is designed particularly for use in prune driers. A panel of old boards ten feet

square was soaked in kerosene and ignited. It was allowed to burn until thoroughly afire and then the extinguisher was turned on it. Just 20 seconds later the blaze was out. A bucket of gasoline was set on fire and put out in a few seconds.

Mr. Boyle is the Douglas county agent for the machine, which is known by the trade name of Instant Fyr-Fyter. It is manufactured in Dayton, Ohio. Mr. Boyle's
