GIANTS STEADILY CLIMBING UPWARD

Extra base hits coupled with steady, effective pitching, is spelling success for the New York Giants as they slowly climb toward the top of the National league percentage ladder.

The Giants have won 12 of their last 15 contests to mount within four games of the league leading Brooklyn Robins in the National circuit. The persistent climb also has narrowed down the Cubs' advantage over their New York rivals, the difference today being just one and one-half games.

The Giants finished a good example of why they are perennial contenders yesterday when they defeated the Robins 4 to 0. There was not much difference between the pitching of Fred Fitzsimmons and Watson Clark of the Robins, but three of New York's hits were of the home run variety.

In the only other National league game on the books the Boston Braves managed to eke out a 3 to 2 decision over the Phillies despite Lefty O'Doul's single, triple and home run. Bob Cunningham played an important role in the Braves' triumph, holding the Phillies to eight hits and driving in two runs with a double.

The pennant chase in the American league saw the Athletics take advantage of the idleness of the Yankees and Senators to gain a half-game with a 13 to 4 triumph over the Boston Red Sox. Lefty Grove hung up his seventeenth victory of the season. Two triples and one home run, his twenty-sixth of the season, was credited to Al Simmons.

Charlie Gehringer was the whole show at Detroit as the Tigers took a 12 inning pitching duel from the Chicago White Sox, 7 to 3. His last out came in the twelfth with the bases loaded gave Vic Sorrell the best of the hurling argument with Red Lyons. He hit another homer in the third with one man on.

Coming from behind in the ninth with a three-run rally, the Cleveland Indians defeated the St. Louis Browns, 5 to 2. It was Wesley Ferrell's eighteenth mound triumph of the season.

Winifred Brown, 25-year-old Manchester girl, won the King's Cup air race around Great Britain today, landing first among eighty-eight competitors. It was the first time a woman had won the King's Cup. Tearing around the 750-mile course at an average speed of 102 miles an hour in her Avian machine, she swooped down past Manchester and London, after having outdistanced the most famous pilots in England.

Among the unsuccessful entrants were Flight Lieutenant H. R. D. Wallis, winner of the Schneider Cup; Squadron Leader A. H. Orlebar, holder of the world's speed record; and Lady Bailey, heroine of lights around Africa.

A crowd of 20,000 waited at Haverthwaite to see the finish of the great handball race, in which Miss Brown had started fourteenth with two and a half hours' handicap. She landed in seventh place at Bristol, reached third at Manchester and was leading the field at Newcastle, which was the turning point. She left Hull, the last of the four key stations of the race, with nine minutes' lead.

A speck was sighted in the sky making straight for Haverthwaite, and soon the little Avian was banking over the field. From the wing numbers the crowd could see it was Miss Brown's plane, and handkerchiefs, hats and umbrellas were waved to greet her. The plane alighted gently, then bumped along the field and stopped. A loud roar of cheers a smiling girl with her face blackened by exhaust fumes stepped out.

"I never expected to win it," Miss Brown told Sir Philip Sassoon, who presented the cup. "As a matter of fact, I never expected to get back. My engine went beautifully the whole time. I thought some of the faster machines would overtake me and didn't know until this moment I had won."—Special cable to The New York Times, July 5, 1930.

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GANGSTER SLAIN FOR TELLING TOO MUCH ABOUT JAKE

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—Jack Zuta was killed, police said today, for telling what he knew about the assassination of Alfred (Jake) Lingle, Tribune reporter.

And it was a woman, the police were convinced, who arranged the slaying of Zuta Friday night in a lake resort dance hall near Delafield, Wis.

Zuta, the head of the northside Moran-Alto gang's vice business, "talked plenty" when he was questioned several weeks ago about the Lingle slaying. Pat Roche, chief investigator for the state's attorney, said. The vice chieftain feared an attempt on his life.

Zuta hid out in Wisconsin. He had several telephone conversations with a Mrs. Laura Nelson living on the northside. One was just a few hours before five men entered the dance hall and shot him down.

Police today went to Milwaukee to see if "Mrs. Nelson" was one of three women held in jail there for questioning in the Zuta murder.

The women, arrested at a roadhouse between Delafield and Milwaukee, identified themselves as Mildred Tosch, Marjorie Roberts and Betty Epperson, all of Chicago.

None of the women would talk, other than to admit they knew Zuta. One of them, Roche was convinced, notified Zuta's enemies of his whereabouts.

Lingle, Roche said, had at several times crimped the northside gang's vice and gambling rackets. Zuta, when questioned, talked freely about the murder to save himself, Roche added.

Another angle was pursued in the Zuta investigation—the reported return of "Scarface" Al Capone. Police said they had learned Capone planned on expanding his business to take over the northside territory.

Solly Vision and Albert Bratz, two of Zuta's henchmen, have been sought since the vice lord's death, but cannot be found. Police said they, too, have been slain.

Sam Hunt, who totes his guns in a golf bag, was sought today. Three miles from the Delafield hotel where Zuta was slain a golf bag, containing five discharged shotgun shells was found. Experts examined it for finger prints.

Weeks ago Hunt was dragged from the running board of an automobile as it started away. Hunt's comrades, never apprehended, had pulled the body of some unidentified victim into the car and were driving away when a policeman tore Hunt from the car. He was carrying a golf bag as a "quiver" for his shotgun.

Witnesses of the Zuta killings said the leader of the quintet of assassins, thin-faced, straight-lipped, aquiline eyes, slender, closely resembled pictures of Sam Hunt.

At the time of Hunt's arrest several weeks ago, the report went around that the man dragged into the car after being shot was Len Mongoven, a Moran gangster and friend of Zuta.

ASKS SCHOOL TO PAY DOCTOR BILL

Lundstrom said Clarence Bell, gymnasium instructor, had forced Vincent to "run the gauntlet" and the youth had suffered a broken arm.

C. A. Rice, city school superintendent, said the gauntlet would be stopped. Lundstrom's request was held in abeyance.

CHINESE BEHEAD EIGHT BOLSHEVIKS

HANKOW, Aug. 4.—Eight suspected communists were beheaded in the streets here today as military authorities tightened their defense against the growing menace of a Red uprising in Hankow.

Additional troops patrolled the city. Everyone was subjected to search. The French community formed a volunteer defense corps to function in case of emergency.

Barriers in the foreign section were strengthened Saturday when reports said communist armies, flushed with their success in pillaging and burning Changsha, were marching toward Hankow and its sister cities, Yueyang and Han Yang. Martial law was declared. Thousands of terrified Chinese sought the protection of the foreign quarter.
