drought area but no prospect was seen today by the weather bureau for any general rains for the next several days.

Oregon Crops Hit
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6.—The summary of weather and crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending August 5 was issued today by the United States department of agriculture, weather bureau.

The detailed report follows: Temperatures were moderately high over the eastern grain sections during the early part of the week but moderated toward the close. A little benefit to ranges and pastures. Dry land crops are suffering from a lack of moisture due to light winter snowfall and spring rains generally below normal. The water supply on most irrigation projects is below the average and is falling rapidly.

Cereals: Harvesting continues under favorable weather conditions with some wheat over ripe. Hot weather damage to grains during the week was light. In the central counties some grain which has headed short is being cut for hay. Corn in all sections needs

rain except where water is available for irrigating.

Ranges Very Dry
Fruits: Pears are maturing satisfactorily in the southern fruit district. Late apples and pears are being thinned in the Columbia valley districts. The bulk of the loganberry crop has been picked and blackberries are ripening rapidly.

Meadows, pastures and ranges: Mountain ranges are very dry and feed is short in some sections. A shortage of water for stock on the range is reported from northeastern counties. Haying and baling continues in western counties under ideal weather conditions.

Livestock stock: Pasture for dairy stock is limited and cows are falling off in milk production. Range stock is faring somewhat better although it has been necessary to move stock a considerable distance for water in many cases.

Miscellaneous: Melons, cucumbers and tomatoes are sizing up well. Flax pulling continues and the crop is being moved to mills. Mint doing well.

RIOT IN INDIA

TAKES 12 LIVES

LONDON, Aug. 6.—A Karachi dispatch to the London Daily Herald today said twelve persons were killed and 150 others injured during an outbreak of communal rioting at Sukker, northwestern India.

Police fired into a crowd of fighting Hindus and Moslems during the clash and it was supposed many of the casualties were from their bullets. Two companies of Indian troops are enroute.

Violence and the commissioner of Sind district is on his way there. Two hundred persons were arrested.

A Bombay dispatch to the Daily Mail today said revenue of the central provinces was \$345,000 (\$1,725,000) below the budget estimate, while expenditures showed an increase due to extra police charges entailed by the civil disobedience campaign.

The dispatch said the government was meeting the situation by drastic reductions in grants to public works, education, and health services.

A Lahore dispatch to the Daily Mail said eleven Moslems had been shot dead and four wounded by a Hindu in connection with a communal outbreak at Hissar, Punjab.

900 MEN FIGHT
BIG TIMBER FIRE

BALTIMORE, Aug. 6.—A forest fire in Allegheny county, western Maryland, which, ranging over a 20 mile front, has caused damage to timber estimated at more than \$100,000 was fought by 900 men today, but with some relief from the heat wave and drought affecting the entire state in sight.

Another fire had destroyed Williams Mountain Inn, overlooking Cumberland, and still other blazes raged unchecked.

Maryland farmers gloomily estimated their crop losses in units of \$100,000.

Frederick municipal authorities made an investigation of possibilities of emergency supplies with the reservoir down to 40,000,000 from 60,000,000 gallons and the inflow half the daily consumption.

Frederick, Cumberland, Annapolis and many smaller towns were on restricted consumption.

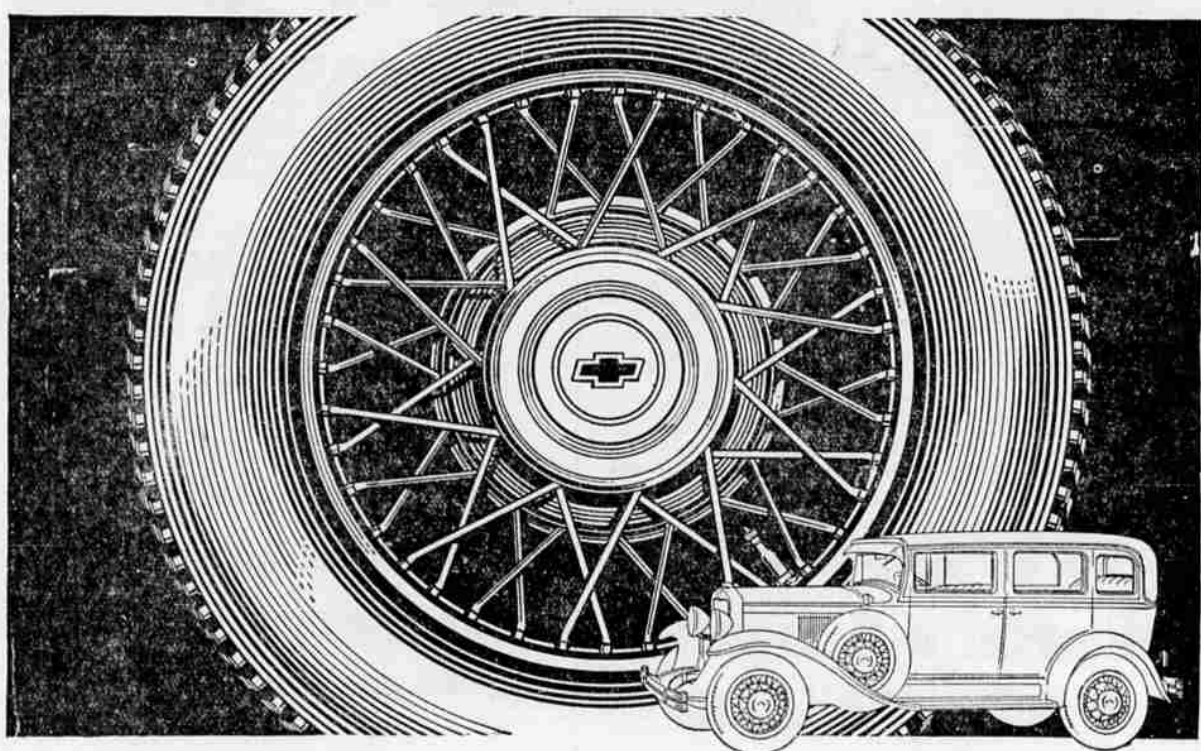
