

MANY ENTRIES IN FOR STATE FAIR, SEPTEMBER 22-23

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 6.—From Canada to Texas and from the Mississippi river to the Pacific coast, entries for all departments are flooding into the registration bureau of the 69th Oregon state fair to be held here September 22 to 28, advance lists revealed this week.

Illinois, Wisconsin, Texas, California, Montana, Washington, Oregon, and several Canadian provinces are to be unusually well represented, present records show, with late applicants from other states certain to swell still further the long list of competitors for the \$80,000 in premiums and purses, and the \$17,500 up for the horse races.

Horse show entries are showing an exceptionally large gain, according to A. P. Fleming, manager of this division. New stables listed thus far include those of Charles E. Shriner, Monroe, Wis.; Scripps-Meanley, San Diego, Cal.; Adair Stock Farms, Los Angeles, and George Peck, Winchester, Ill. Races are attracting unusual interest with scores of the finest horses in the west and north entered for the stake and class events on the new half-mile oval, according to Mrs. Ella S. Wilson, secretary of the state fair board.

Twenty of the record list of entrants for the \$2500 prize in each of three stake races are to come from Oregon's own stables, with many more also entered in the class events.

Much favorable comment has been drawn by the addition of the extra day to this year's exposition, and Sunday, September 28, is expected to be a banner day for thousands of rural visitors who will take advantage of the week end to attend the fair for the first time.

PRETTY MISS NOT HEROINE, DECLARES

SEATTLE, Aug. 5.—Miss Emmie Binns, Vancouver, B. C., who leaped into the water from a pontoon of a burning Alaska-Washington Airways plane near Point-No-Point yesterday to obtain aid for her imperiled fellow passengers and the pilot, today modestly waved aside the idea that she was a heroine.

The plane, which had been chartered in Vancouver for a flight to Seattle, took fire a few minutes after Pilot W. A. Williams brought it down on account of a missing motor. The passengers were ordered out on the pontoons when Williams found he could not extinguish the flames.

Small boats hurried to the scene, but Miss Binns decided to take a hand in the rescue, so she jumped into the water and swam to get a rowboat. She returned to the plane just as the passengers and pilot were being removed by other boats.

The plane's gasoline tanks exploded a few moments later. The pontoons and motor were all that could be salvaged.

WILKINS INSPECTS SUBMARINE WHICH WILL GO TO POLE

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 5.—Sir Hubert Wilkins, British explorer, has inspected the submarine, the O-12, in which he hopes to reach the north pole, and pronounced it suitable for his purpose. The O-12 is at the navy yard awaiting reconditioning and alterations.

Sir George said yesterday he was more than ever convinced the submarine is the only practical means of reaching the north pole by boat.

It is the explorer's intent to take the O-12, with a crew of 18 men, provisions for a year and fuel for 7,000 miles, to Spitzbergen, and thence over sea and under sea to the open water in Bering strait on the other side of the pole.

The O-12 is one of several undersea boats built before the World War. It is smaller than the average submarine and will be renamed the Nautilus in honor of Jules Verne's mythical craft.

"Three hundred ships have been lost in vain attempts to reach the pole by crushing a path through the ice," Sir Hubert said. "I do not believe it can be done. We plan to cruise under the ice at a speed of not more than four knots. If we hit submerged ice at that speed nothing will be damaged, because of the protective steel we plan to install.

"Every 100 miles we will have to come to the surface and take in air. It happens to be open water where we can open the hatches. If there is ice overhead we can pierce it with a collapsible ice-breaker and through a tube. We expect to be able to pierce ice 12 feet thick.

"The purpose of the trip is purely scientific. We plan to test the behavior of the gyroscope compass at the pole and hope also to make preliminary observations of the possibility of placing a weather bureau station in the far north. A

station would be of great value to meteorologists in forecasting weather."

ROCKET SHOOTING TO BE CONTINUED

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Experiments in shooting rockets to extreme altitudes, financed by Daniel Guggenheim, will be carried on by Prof. Robert H. Goddard of Clark university, Worcester, Mass., at Roswell, N. M. That site was selected because of favorable atmospheric conditions.

Prof. Goddard has been conducting rocket experiments since 1912 with aid of the Smithsonian Institution, Clark university and the Carnegie Institute. Guggenheim recently made a grant to permit further work.

At Roswell, small rockets will be sent up first and finally one capable of ascending from 50 to 75 miles will be sent up by gas propulsion and with parachutes to regulate the speed of the return to earth. The rockets will carry thermometers, barometers, electrical measuring apparatus, air traps to collect samples of air at various altitudes and other instruments.

Pending completion of preparatory work it cannot be announced how soon the work at Roswell will begin.
