Durant, automobile manufacturer, committed suicide today by jumping from the 12th floor of a Fifth avenue apartment hotel where he had until recently been a tenant. Clapp, who was 49 years old, left a note reading: "Good bye, Sue. I have killed myself. Nobody is to blame but me. I am crazy."

SANTIAM BATTLES INCENDIARY FIRE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PORTLAND, Aug. 7.—A forest fire of incendiary origin burned near Breitenbush Springs today with more than 100 men fighting its spread over a mile long line. Santiam forest headquarters headed the fire started at three different points. A fire on Silk creek, west of Cottage Grove, Ore., was controlled, according to C. V. Oglesby, western Lane county supervising warden. This fire, also, is believed to have been of incendiary origin. Damage was nominal.

POULTRY BUSINESS MAY OUTDO LUMBER

PORTLAND, Aug. 7.—Oregon's poultry business will, within a few years, outstrip in value and volume the lumber industry that has been the foundation stone of the state's business for decades. That was the declaration yesterday of Earl Bunting, marketing counselor, before members of the Portland Advertising club at their weekly luncheon meeting at the Benson hotel. "We are now on the eve of this development," he said, "We have seen Oregon hens take every egg-laying record of consequence. We have seen Oregon laying stock acknowledged by the world to be the best. We have seen Oregon eggs draw a premium of 5 cents a dozen on the New York city market. Now we are seeing Oregon canned chicken in the most exclusive homes and restaurants of the nation, so popular that the demand cannot be supplied. It is safe to say that the poultry business in this commonwealth will, by the time the next census rolls around, have assumed proportions never dreamed of ten years ago."

LOCKWOOD DENIES RUMORS OF CHANGE

Rumors that the Lockwood Motor company has sold out are unfounded, according to C. A. Lockwood, who states that there has been no change in the business or management. The rumors grew out of the fact that Edward E. Hatch, former Ford dealer in California, spent several days here visiting with Mr. Lockwood, while on a tour of Oregon and Washington looking for a location. Mr. Hatch plans to buy a business in either Oregon or Washington and is looking over the two states with a view of securing a location for a business and home.
