

HUSTON RESIGNS AS G. O. P. HEAD

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Clarence H. Huston, of Tennessee, resigned today as chairman of the Republican national committee and in a formal statement asserted "no man in political life has ever been subject to more unjust and unwarranted attacks."
Huston presented his resignation to a meeting of the party's executive committee and made public his statement before the meeting was over and his successor chosen. He said his withdrawal would "give the organization an opportunity of selecting a leader free from the present factional opposition, and will permit the party to pursue a course that will insure in the minds of the republicans of the country my right to their continued esteem and confidence."

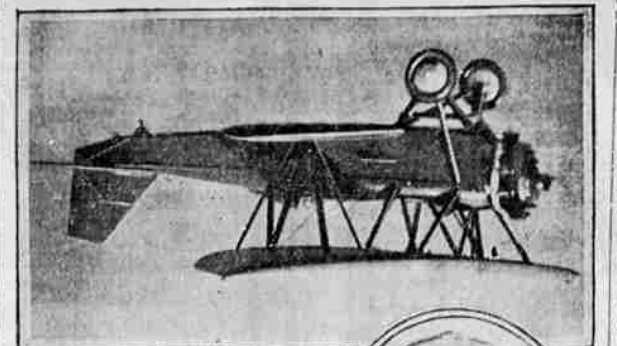

numerous persons were not drowned. They declared the flood waters had struck both cities before rain had fallen and that many inhabitants must have been trapped in their beds.
Stunted in the neck of a great bottle-shaped valley formed by the Santa Rita valley, the twin cities felt the sweep of flood waters from three sides. The Mexican city for the most part is on higher ground than its American sister but its buildings generally of poorer construction.
The population of the two towns combined is approximately 11,000 with the Mexican city slightly larger. Only a barbed wire fence separates the two.
Bodies of the three women had been found on the Mexican side of the line at 7 a. m., and the body of a man was discovered near the Buena Vista bridge on the American side. None were identified.
Surging walls of water hit the two towns before midnight, tearing out brick and adobe houses in Nogales, Sonora, and filling International street, the main thoroughfare which separates the towns, with five to six feet of swirling water.
One hotel and sixteen Mexican homes on the Sonora side were reported by the police there to have been swept away. They did not know how many persons were in the hotel. A. C. Villaseor, chief of police, said his officers reported having seen several bodies floating down the street.
See Children Perish
Don Phillips, American aviator, forced his way to the American side with a report of having seen several small children swept away when an adobe building collapsed. The swift sweep of the flood waters through the towns was partly the result of a streambed, usually dry, running directly between the two towns. Through International street the bed is covered with concrete, forming a confined tunnel incapable of carrying flood waters. These, being forced through the tunnel early today, spouted high in the air, drenching many large residences.
The swirling currents, ripping into adobe houses, swept them clean of their contents. Furniture,

Flying Fleet Coming to Roseburg Saturday for Three Day Air Circus; News-Review to Give 15 Free Rides



Clyde E. Pangborn, noted stunt and exhibition flyer, is shown above in oval, and also flying his plane in upside down position, a stunt that he will repeat daily during the air circus Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Fifteen free rides are to be given by the News-Review to finders of tickets to be scattered from the air at noon each day.

The air circus will include daily free exhibition flights at noon, parachute jumps, wing walking, and passenger flying at low rates.

Fifteen free airplane rides in the planes of the Flying Fleet, a nationally known group of commercial fliers, who have completed arrangements for a series of three-day exhibition and passenger flights, will be given by the News-Review to lucky persons during the time the air circus is staged in Roseburg.

Every day at noon, the Flying Fleet will put on a free exhibition of stunt flying over Roseburg and the airport, and at the close of the day one of the planes will swoop low over town and will distribute a number of copies of the Roseburg News-Review from the air.

In five of these papers there will be complimentary tickets, entitling the finders to free rides. There will be five tickets dropped each day, making fifteen in all. The papers will be dropped after each noon exhibition flight.

The fleet planes are biplanes of the open type, government licensed and inspected. They are fireproof ships, carrying four passengers and a pilot, and are powered with 29 h. p. motors. The fleet is coming from Grants Pass, where a program, similar to the one to be given in Roseburg is now being presented.

The use of the Roseburg Municipal airport has been granted by the commission, and the greater part of the stunt program will be given there.

clothing, and "everything imaginable" one eye-witness said, went down stream on the crest of the current.

The rain, which struck the towns soon after the flood waters tore down from the surrounding mountains, fell in torrents throughout the night. At seven o'clock it had not abated.

The floods swept through the towns in unabated fury for more than three hours, after which the crest of deep waters passed. At seven o'clock International street and many side streets still were filled from curb to curb, and debris was piled high against the buildings.

Hundreds of Mexicans at daylight walked the higher side streets clad only in nightclothes, all their possessions swept from their shattered adobe homes. Shelter was given them in houses that escaped the flood.

Automobiles Wrecked
More than fifty automobiles, left in the streets, were buried in debris. Several had been rolled and disabled several blocks through town, while others were overturned wrecks.

SHIPPING HEAD TO SEEK LOWER RATES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—T. V. O'Connor, shipping board chairman, said today unless members of the United States interstate conference agreed to regulate freight rates on an equitable basis, he would seek congressional authority to have the shipping board regulate them.
At a meeting at the shipping board conference members were told by O'Connor that unless satisfactory rates were worked out, he would seek to have the shipping board given authority on interstate water commerce similar to that given the interstate commerce commission on railroads.
Complaints that many non-conference lines were doing a "cut rate" business on freight handled between eastern and western coasts were heard at the meeting.
Members of the conference told the board business had decreased 25 or 37 per cent and many boats were idle.

Dr. Smith will keep her local office open until the last week of this month.

Brown was slightly cut by flying glass. The cars received minor damage.

OFFERS \$100,000 FOR R-100 RIDE

TORONTO, Aug. 7.—Sir Dennis-toun Burney, designer of the dirigible R-100, said today he had received an offer from an American millionaire of \$100,000 for a ride in the airship from Montreal to New York.
"It was a shame to throw away money like that," Sir Dennis-toun said, relating that he had declined the offer on the ground that the R-100 was a government ship. "It would not take many customers like that to put the line on a paying basis."

DRINKING WATER SOLD BY GALLONS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—A story of drought in the Ohio valley resulting in the sale of drinking water came to the weather bureau today in a letter from Dr. L. W. Humphreys, to his brother, William J. Humphreys, meteorological physicist.
Dr. Humphreys said drinking water was selling at 3 cents a gallon in Logan, West Virginia. He added that across the river in Ohio, farmers were attempting to save fruit trees by pumping water on them with old fire engines.
