TRAILER WRECKS TOURISTS' AUTO

GLENDAL BERRY GROWER PLANTING LARGE ACREAGE

(News-Review Douglas County Special)

GLENDAL, Aug. 7.—Strawberries averaging 14 berries to the cup were brought to this city this week by Ole J. Johnson who has a ranch east of this city on the Cow Creek road. The berries are of the Mastodon everbearing variety and according to Johnson they're very prolific, commencing to bear in the spring and continuing doing so throughout the summer and fall months. With favorable fall weather it is nothing unusual to have berries until Christmas time.

Johnson has been raising strawberries for years on his place and now has an acre planted with them. He has been experimenting with the everbearing kind for two years and is now replacing the other varieties with the everbearing. He is setting out new plants as rapidly as he can secure runners and intends to have an acre of ground growing only everbearing strawberries, as he deems this variety a more profitable berry to grow than the other kinds of strawberries.

The everbearing strawberry produces an all summer crop instead of coming into bearing for just a short season at the time when every other strawberry grower is also on the market with his crop. Johnson says he has had no trouble disposing of all his berries locally because he has strawberries to sell when other varieties are off the market.

The everbearing strawberry plants grown by Johnson are hardy, free from disease, and excellent producers. The berries are of good size, deep red color, meaty and tasty. The berry is firm and handles well in shipment.

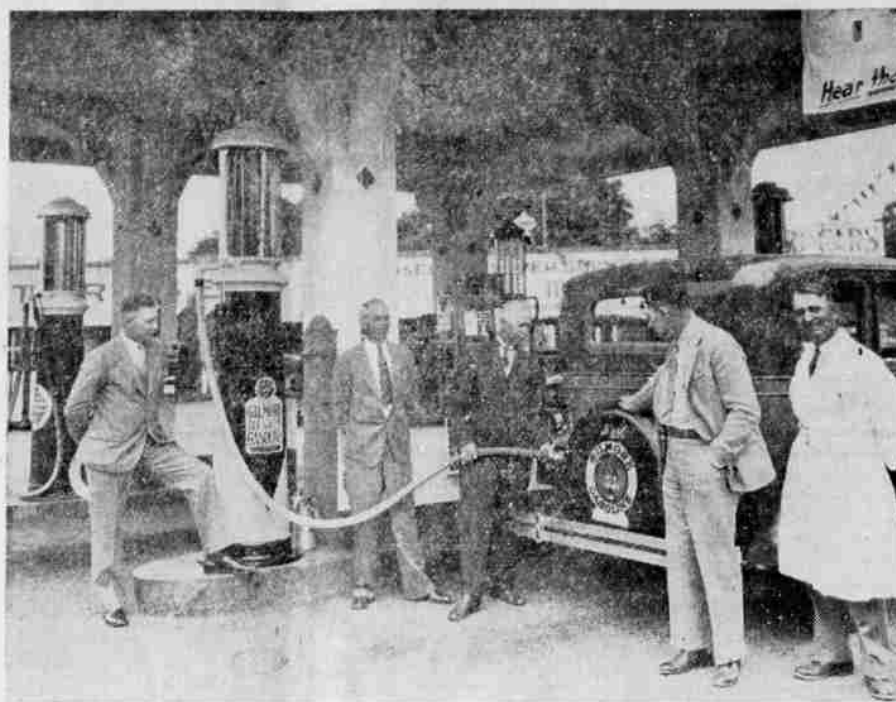

HOOVER MAY HAVE TO VETO VACATION

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—As the time draws near when President Hoover hoped to leave for his vacation in the Rocky mountains, his plans remain indefinite.

Faced by unexpected and prolonged difficulties in selecting the personnel of the tariff commission and with other problems still to be solved before he leaves, he has consistently declined to discuss plans even with his aides at the white house.

Continuance of the drought making necessary emergency measures by the government, also might work to alter plans of the president, it was pointed out today.

It was said at the white house, however, that so far as his intentions to the announcement that he expected to spend at least two weeks visiting Glacier and Yellowstone national parks still stood. Had he expected it would be added to abandon all plans for an extensive vacation, but no decision has been made.

In response to reports the president had abandoned his proposed western trip, he has received many invitations to spend a few weeks in New England, but it was said the western vacation was still foremost in Mr. Hoover's mind and no consideration had been given to these invitations.

The white house denied particularly reports Mr. Hoover was considering a fishing excursion off Montauk Point on Long Island.

His secretary and fishing companion, Lawrence Ritchey, went there last week Ritchey said. He went on a personal invitation and while he returned enthusiastic about the fishing at Montauk and hoped to induce the president to go there some time, it probably would not be this year.

The national parks close to the public September 15, but park service officials have informed Mr. Hoover there is no reason why he should not vacation there later if he so desired.

SILVERTON JUNIOR TEAM TAKES TITLE

The junior league baseball championship for Oregon was won in Portland yesterday by the Silver-ton team, which defeated the Portland Juniors 7 to 1 in a 10-inning game at the Vaughn street ball park. Orville Schwab, Silver-ton, south-paw, and Edwin Demorest, Portland left-hander, fought a pitching duel that was proclaimed to be far better than any coast league game played in Portland this year.

The score was tied, 1 to 1, at the beginning of the ninth inning, when Silver-ton broke loose in a wild rally that called three Portland pitchers into the field and netted the victors 6 runs. Schwab went back into the box in the last half of the inning and retired Portland, striking out two batters.

The Silver-ton team won from Eugene in the three-game series. After Eugene had eliminated Roseburg from the state contest.

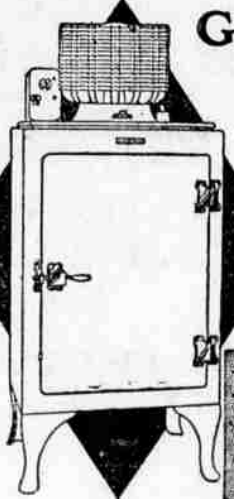
