buying, getting the benefits of quantity purchases, without the necessity of having investments in excessive quantities.

Do National Advertising
Advertising is directed by the organization, as all merchants are on a standardized basis. The merchant is not bound to handle exclusively the goods of the organization, but may deal in local produce as well. The organization also has the advantage of being able to do national advertising on a large scale, which is of benefit to each individual merchant.

The county stores are part of a block of more than 30 stores in the territory from Portland to Gledale being simultaneously added to the organization, and the council will be selected from among the members of the affiliated firms and will hold their meetings at Eugene, with jobbing headquarters in Portland.

The fronts of the stores will be repainted in the red and white colors of the organization, and the stock will be standardized in accordance with the Red and White system.

the mob, saying the two men directly involved had been punished, and advised against further violence.

The body of Shipp, after swinging against the side of the building for a time was moved to the two on which Smith was hanged, the lynchers announcing they would be left there until noon as a warning to other negroes.

Deeter was fatally shot Wednesday night as he sat in his parked automobile with Miss Mary Ball, 19, of Marion. Four negroes appeared and after ordering him to throw up his hands, shot him four times. One of the assailants then attacked the girl. Deeter was brought to the Grant county hospital, where he died yesterday afternoon.

No Arrests Made
Shipp, Smith and Cameron were arrested by police at their homes early yesterday and Sullivan arrested in an automobile late in the day.

Sheriff Campbell removed the bodies of the negroes from the tree at 6 o'clock this morning. At that hour there were only a few stragglers about the court house. The negro section of the city was quiet although during the night there was a gathering at which there was criticism of police and county officers for alleged failure to protect the prisoners. Prosecuting Attorney Harley Hardin said this morning he planned no immediate action against members of the mob. Thus far, he said, no one has been identified as having taken part in the lynchings.

Lewis Lindemuth, Marion police chief, said none of his men had been able to identify anyone connected with the lynchings.

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and color regardless of how thick they are growing.

Approximately 425 acres of cantaloupes will be packed and shipped by Williams this season. On the basis of the appearance of the crop at this time this will mean a gross pack of 400 carloads. Nearly three fourths of the total production is being grown by Williams personally, the remaining acres being under contract to him to be marketed under his brand. Every cantaloupe will be carefully graded and packed and nothing but the first grade perfect melons will be shipped to the market. Each melon will be branded with the trademark of the Williams gardens and each crate will be labeled on both ends. All labels state in large type that the melons are products of the Umpqua valley, Oregon.

Next we went through the Mel-

rose packing house. Williams has three packing houses, one at Dilard, one near the Marx place and the large one at Melrose.

Packing House "Human"
The big packing and grading house is almost human in its ability to sort and grade melons and put them in the proper bins. The melons are not touched by hand from the time they leave the vines until they are placed in the crates by the packers.

The statistics concerning the capacities of the various units of the plant are meant for the consumption of technicians in such matters. One fact alone out through the mass of figures quoted by Williams and that is that this Melrose plant will have to pack about 50,000 crates of melons this season—in about two working months. This number of crates means approximately 250 carloads.

Mr. Williams was asked for some statistics regarding his gross business. The entire production marketed under the "Prize of Dilard" brand will bring an approximate gross return of \$125,000, he said. Of this total, more than \$100,000 will be spent right here in Douglas county.

The enormity of this melon industry is hard to grasp unless you actually see it as we did yesterday.

Williams has a fine marketing contract, the yield is fairly heavy, he has ample packing house facilities, so there is no apparent physical reason why this infant industry, its first year in really LARGE scale production, should not be entirely successful.

PORTLAND TO SEA SURVEY PLANNED

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 8.—Roy A. Klein, state highway engineer, said today that a reconnaissance survey of various proposed short routes for a state highway from Portland to the sea will be started about August 15. This will be done under authority of the state highway commission by Henry Hackett, an office engineer of the department who has been stationed at Bend for several years.

Through authority of the commission so far covers only the reconnaissance survey. It is understood that a detailed survey will be made later of whatever is established by the preliminary survey as the most feasible route.

Several suggested routes are to be examined by Hackett. Among these are the Wilson river route leading directly to Tillamook, which has been previously surveyed, the Trask river route running from Forest Grove to Tillamook, the Nehalem river route, the Salmonberry, and a route running through Vernonia, Elsie, Buster creek and Hamlet.

Hackett will be succeeded at Bend by K. D. Lytle, now stationed at The Dalles.

OREGON GROWS 21 PER CENT, 10 YEARS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Population of the continental United States for 1929 was announced today by the census bureau as 122,698,190, an increase of 16,987,579 or 16.1 per cent over 1920.
