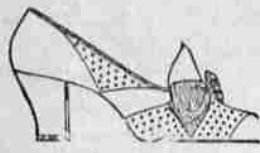

Notice is hereby given that the undersigned will, up to 7:30 p. m. on Thursday, the 14th day of August, 1930, at his office in the City Hall in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, receive sealed proposals for the purchase of Refunding Bonds in the sum of \$35,000.00.

Said bonds are issued under authority of the Charter of the City of Roseburg, as provided in Ordinance No. 622, duly and regularly passed by the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and approved by the Mayor of said City on the 4th day of August, 1920, said bonds are issued for the purpose of refunding Street Improvement Bonds Series "B" heretofore issued by the City of Roseburg, Oregon.

The bonds are in denomination of \$500.00 each and bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and are dated September 1, 1930, and are payable serially, one-tenth each year, the first payment being payable one year from the date of issue.

No bid for less than par and accrued interest will be accepted, and the council reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or draft for the sum of \$350.00 payable to the City of Roseburg, to be forfeited to the city in case the successful bidder shall fail to complete the purchase.

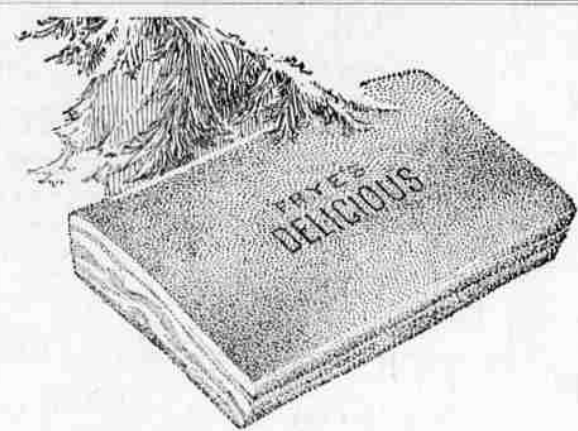
