Editorials on the Day's News

THE census group composed of the three Pacific coast states, Oregon, Washington and California, leads the nation in percentage of increase in population since 1920.

This showing, of course, is helped along by the remarkable growth of California, which led the nation in rate of increase, but Oregon has done very well indeed, being eighth among the states in rate of growth.

During the long period of unrestricted immigration, the East regularly led the Far West in growth of population, but with the ending of the great immigration movement a definite change has come.

The children of today will probably live to see the Pacific coast the wealthiest and most populous section of the United States.

MANUEL HERRICK, former Oklahoma congressman, jailed in Baltimore for running a still, says:

"When I was in congress, I had as much as \$50,000 in bills stacked on my desk—dishonest money. But I said to them: 'Take it away. Maybe I was a fool.'"

REGARDLESS of what he MAY have been, he IS a fool. Only fools talk of the dishonest money offered to them. Wise men would blush for shame, and conceal to their dying days the dishonor involved in being sized up as crooks who would take a bribe.

DISCUSSING the problems of divorce, an editorial writer in this state whose identity might as well not be disclosed here says:

"We believe that the nearest solution of the problems involving matrimony will come only when the state acknowledges and cares for all children . . . HANDAX USED IN SLAYING
PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—R. A. Winchester, 45, of Boring, Ore., was being held here today for a coroner's jury hearing, the outcome of the death Saturday night of Ulrich Gantenbein, 47, who Winchester killed with a handax.

The two men were working on a hay-baling crew. Others in the group said Gantenbein had been "picking on" Winchester all day, and at the close of work ran at him with a hay hook.

Winchester looked around for something to protect himself with, he said, and his hand grasped a small hand ax. He struck blindly, he declared, with the blunt side. The ax slipped, turned and the blade slashed down on Gantenbein's neck. He died three hours later.

FALL FROM AUTO FATAL
SALEM, Aug. 11.—Clare Hunter, 17, whose home was 1125 East 16th street, Portland, died about mid-night in a local hospital from injuries received when she fell from an automobile near Woodburn yesterday.

ELKTON BOYS CHARGED WITH MANY THEFTS

Ernest Higginbotham, 19, Norris Weatherly, 21, Held by Officers in Eugene.

Confessions of Robberies in Two Counties Said Made by Younger of Prisoners.

Norris Weatherly, 21, and Ernest Higginbotham, 19, residents of Elkton, are under arrest in Eugene charged with a series of robberies in Douglas and Lane counties. The young men, it is claimed, robbed a store at Jasper in Lane county, and also the Scottsburg garage. Confessions have been secured from Higginbotham, according to Sheriff Jackson.

It is believed that the young men also robbed the Hebard store at Umpqua and the Roberts store at Aulauk. In each of the four robberies of stores only the cash register was taken. The till from the Scottsburg store was found in the river, after it had been tossed from the bridge, while the cash register from the store at Jasper was found in the millrace at Eugene.

Boy Furnishes Clue

According to Sheriff Jackson, Weatherly and Higginbotham, after robbing the Jasper store, stole the cash register in the millrace, and passing by, that it was in shallow water. They came back later in the day, in bathing suits, and carried the machine out into the river and sank it in deep water. They were seen by a boy who identified them among eight prisoners in the Lane county jail. The cash register was recovered yesterday.

The two young men were suspected following the robbery of the Scottsburg store Friday night and were traced to Eugene by Deputy Sheriff Dietrich, who secured their arrest. During their examination evidence was found connecting them with the robbery at Jasper, and Higginbotham, the officers state, confessed both robberies.

Because of the similarity of circumstances, they are believed to be guilty of the robberies at

WAR VET ACCUSED OF MURDERING 2

GRANTON, Conn., Aug. 11.—Stanley Smith Bogue, 34 year old World war veteran, was arraigned today on a charge of murdering the two sons of Mrs. Eva Jennings Roberts, 52, boarding house keeper, and Ole Ostberg. He was held without bond for the next term of superior court.

State police said that Bogue, who made an ineffectual attempt to kill himself, confessed to hacking to death the woman and the man who had replaced him in her affections Saturday night when he found them together.

TURN WHEAT INTO PORK, LEGGE SAYS

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 11.—Several thousand farmers of Washington and Idaho gathered today to hear Alexander Legge, federal farm board chairman, state his conviction that inland Empire wheat acreage should be cut.

"Surplus of industrial products can be sold abroad," he said, in an interview, "because production costs can be lowered and demand increased, because man's stomach can hold only so much wheat."

He advocated northwestern farmers feeding it to hogs.

ALLEGED FORGER CAUGHT IN TEXAS

Virgil Chambers, against whom a warrant was recently issued here, charging him with passing worthless checks, is under arrest at Liberty, Texas, according to word received today by Sheriff V. T. Jackson. The local officers have asked for the release of Chambers to Douglas county, but have been informed that he is charged with forgery there and that the Texas authorities will not permit his return to Oregon, unless they are unable to convict him there.

Mill of Early 50's Torn Down For Bridge Plan

(News-Review Douglas County Special)

MYRTLE CREEK, Ore., Aug. 11.—The "Old Mill" has been torn down. Away back in 1853 or 4 the first unit of this mill was built by Lazarus Wright who owned the donation claim on which the building was placed. It was the first grist mill in this part of the state and for many years supplied the settlers far and near with all their cereal products. The mill stones were brought round the Horn in a sailing vessel to Scottsburg and freighted the rest of the distance to Myrtle Creek, which was no small journey at that time.

The mill has been enlarged several times so that the building as it looked lately did not much resemble the original structure. The remnant of the pioneer settlers of Myrtle Creek vicinity regret the passing of the ancient landmark.

The mill site is being given over for a fine new concrete highway bridge, which will be 120 feet long, with a 27-foot roadway and a 4-foot walk on either side. The bridge will rest on four concrete piers and is being erected at a cost of \$12,170, by Contractors Hargreaves and Lindsay of Eugene.

NON-JURY TRIAL DENIED ROY LYLE

SEATTLE, Aug. 11.—Former Northwest Prohibition Administrator Roy Lyle and his three former aides, charged with conspiring with the Olmsted and other notorious bootleg rings to accept bribes, were denied trial without jury by Federal Judge Frank H. Norcross today.

The visiting Nevada jurist declined to accept responsibility for determining the case without aid of a jury. The request of the defendants, unusual in a case of this character, came as a surprise Saturday, but they had held their other would have been accepted. Government counsel had made no objections.

Motion of Clifford T. McKinney, former Olmsted prosecutor, a flimsy defendant who was also indicted on similar charges, for separate trial was to be decided later today by Judge Norcross.

McKinney has claimed charges against him are not connected with the bribery and conspiracy charges brought against Lyle, William M. Whitney, R. R. Bryant and Earl Corwin, the four former dry officers.

McKinney did not join in the motion for non-jury trial, which the other four said they wanted to lessen expense and expedite the trial.

KNIFE AND PISTOL END THREE LIVES

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Salvatore Teseraro, his wife, Concetta, and their eighteen-year-old daughter, Emelia, were found dead in their Brooklyn apartment today after neighbors had been aroused by shots.

Teseraro was shot through the head and his wife had died from bullet and stab wounds. The girl had been stabbed to death.

Police believed Teseraro killed his wife and daughter and then shot himself.

FATHER BLOWS UP 3 TOTS AND SELF

BURNABY, B. C., Aug. 11.—Three little children and their father were dead today after the latter, Otto Zeller, placed them in a stump hole with him on a highway near their home and set off a charge of dynamite. The triple murder and suicide occurred last night.

At least one of the three murdered children had been warned of his fate several days ago it was disclosed, when a friend said the child had told him of the father's intention to kill them all. Neighbors said Zeller's wife left him recently. The children were between two and seven years old.

DEER HUNTER NEAR DEATH FROM SHOT

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 11.—Joseph Vasco, 32, garage employe of Hayward, was mistaken for a deer yesterday and shot in the chest and his right arm shattered. His condition today was serious.

Antone Vincent, 32, rancher of Tassajara, Contra Costa county, was the shooter. Both were in the same hunting party, tracking deer in the hills south of Livermore.

WEEK TO SEE PRIMARIES IN FIVE STATES

Senator Hefflin, Ousted by Democrats in Alabama, Runs Independently for Re-Election.

Norris Has Two Opponents in Nebraska—Liquor Leading Issue in Ohio Battle.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—The shadow of Alfred E. Smith, 1928 democratic presidential candidate, will loom large over three of the five state primaries to be held Tuesday of this week.

Voters of Alabama, Arkansas, and Nebraska, will have the burning issues of two years ago brought back to them indirectly, while in the fourth state where ballots are to be cast prohibition is to figure largely in the vote.

Alabama democrats are to choose a successor to Senator J. Thomas Hefflin, ousted from this year's party primary because he failed to support the democratic presidential candidate two years ago. Hefflin, however, has conducted a vigorous campaign for reelection as an independent and will be the November opponent of the victor in the democratic primary. John H. Bankhead, of Jasper, and Frederick L. Thompson, Mobile publisher, are the senatorial candidates in the primary. It will be the first time in more than 30 years that the democratic nominee faces opposition at the general election.

Norris Before Voters

The Nebraska race offered as its chief interest opposition to Senator George W. Norris, who left the republican fold to support Smith in the campaign. However, farm relief, tariff and prohibition are numbered among the issues in the republican contest there. Norris is opposed by W. W. Stebbins, state treasurer, and Aaron Read. The Stebbins campaign has been directed at Norris for failure to cooperate with the administration. The veteran senator carried to the voters a claim for vindication of his party bolt, asserting "events that have transpired have cleared me of criticism."

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VESEL'S MASTER MYSTERIOUSLY GONE

BOSTON, Aug. 11.—Disappearance of Leslie E. Large, 32-year-old acting master of the United Fruit company's steamer, San Gil, in the early morning of August 1, a few hours after the vessel cleared Havana, was under investigation today by officers of the line and British consular authorities. The San Gil is under British registry.

Officials of the fruit company today characterized Large's disappearance as "most mysterious." Large's fellow officers aboard the San Gil agreed he was in the best of health and there had been no trouble aboard.

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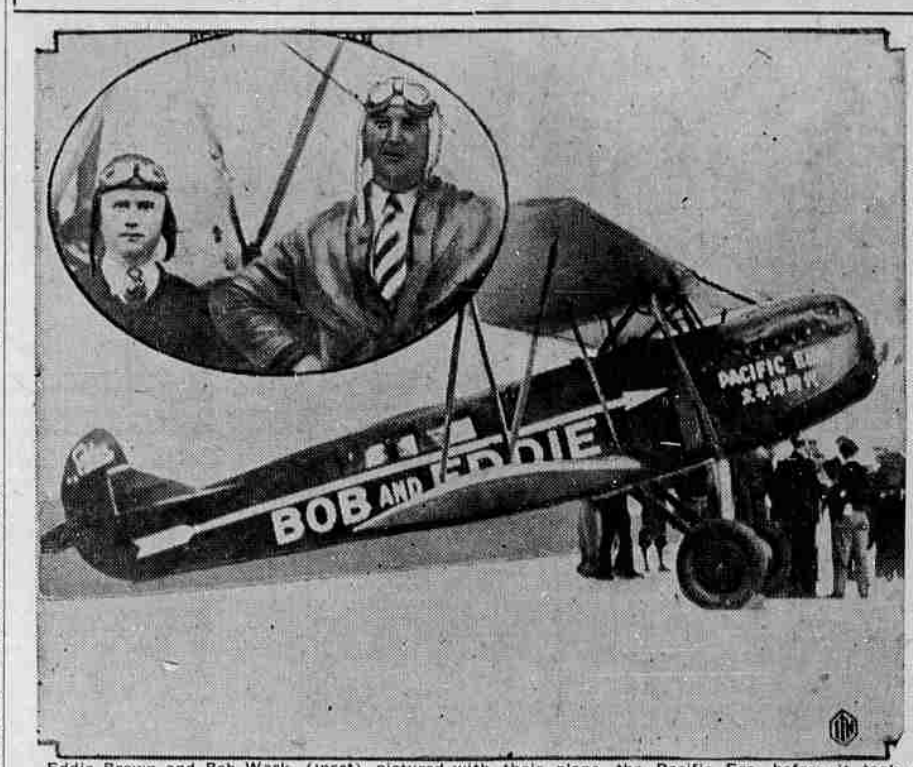
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Tacoma-Tokyo Hop Interrupted by Clogged Gas Lines



Eddie Brown and Bob Wark, (inset), pictured with their plane, the Pacific Era, before it took off Sunday morning from Tacoma, Wash., on a projected hop over the Pacific ocean to Tokyo, Japan. The vessel will be refueled in the air at points in their announced itinerary, which includes Fairbanks and Nome, Alaska, and Petropavlovsk, Siberia. The trip outlined is approximately 5,400 miles.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 11.—Temporarily halted in their hop to White Horse, Yukon territory, from Tacoma on the first leg of their proposed flight to Tokyo, Bob Wark and Eddie Brown, Seattle aviators, planned to resume their aerial jaunt today from Lander airport here.

The fliers took off Sunday from Tacoma field, but were forced to bring their Pockker biplane, "Pacific Era," down at the Vancouver airport on Lulu island about 2 p. m., on account of air clogged gas lines. Vancouver is approximately 150 miles from Tacoma by air. The fliers expected to negotiate the entire distance in five or six days.

FIVE BURNED TO DEATH IN COTTAGE

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn., Aug. 11.—Five persons were burned to death and two others suffered serious injuries in a fire that destroyed a cottage located in an amusement park near here early today.

The dead are Mrs. Hugh Lee Witt, 25, her two children, Hugh Lee Witt Jr., 2, and Marie Witt, 3; Eva Witt, 16, her brother-in-law; and Paul Reeder, 25, an employee at the park.

Charles Witt had concessions at the park, known as Cox's lake, and Hugh Lee Witt had charge of fireworks displays. Officers investigated to determine whether fireworks had been stored in the cottage.

The fire occurred about daylight and the victims were burned in their beds.

FIRES TAKE HEAVY TOLL IN 2 CITIES

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—Sweeping the entire plant of the F. C. Stettler paper box factory at an early hour today, fire destroyed the plant and caused damage estimated by the owner at \$750,000.

Two Portland firemen, George Viadine and Harry B. Landru, were burned severely when a blast of flame struck them in the face. They were rushed to the emergency hospital.

Fire officials said the plant would be a total loss. Origin of the fire was undetermined.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 11.—The new million dollar Canadian National railway pier here was a blackened ruin today after one of the most sensational fires in this port. Damage to the structure and freight awaiting coastwise vessels was estimated by government officials at \$1,250,000. Origin of the blaze was unknown.

While firemen battled the raging flames which several times spread to a nearby ferry wharf, one of the crowd of spectators, James Cathcart, fell dead as a result of a heart attack.

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WARK AND BROWN AIRPLANE CRASHES

SEATTLE, Aug. 11.—Bob Wark and Edward Brown, enroute to Tokyo by plane from Tacoma, were reported in special advices to the Times here today to have crashed at Lander airport, a few miles from Tacoma, B. C., this noon. Wark was reported to have suffered a knee injury and Brown to have escaped unhurt.

LIGHTNING FIRES UMPQUA FOREST

Seven forest fires were started yesterday evening by lightning storms over the Umpqua national forest. The storm covered the Diamond lake and Bohemia districts and seemed to be in three sections, striking chiefly north of Mt. Thielsen and following along the summit of the Cascades, veering slightly westward over the northern portion of the forest. The storm struck with great severity in the Cascade forest, east of Eugene, starting 20 fires.

Four fires were reported this morning in the Diamond lake district. There were two in the North Umpqua district and one in Bohemia. Three of the fires were reported under control at noon and it was expected that the others would be brought under control by night, according to O. C. Houser, central dispatcher. Weather conditions over the forest, Mr. Houser reported, indicate the possibility of another storm tonight.

AX DEATH AGENCY IN THREE CASES

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 11.—James Jarnaeen, 55, a negro, surrendered to police last night and is being held on a charge of slaying U. S. Rudd, 43, white, with a heavy ax at their joint home in the west end of Pendleton.

Jarnaeen said the killing followed a quarrel over the cooking of a meal.

McARTHUR, O., Aug. 11.—Mrs. Josephine Napper, 69, was held here today on charges of first degree murder in connection with the slaying early today of her husband, Jasper Napper, 71, whose head was split with an axe.

Sheriff Ray Cox said the woman confessed the killing, saying her husband had been out nearly all night with another woman.

BREMERTON, Wash., Aug. 11.—A freak accident took the life of Allen P. Mosford, 55, harbor here, when he was cutting down a tree at his Finney bay home. The tree struck a snag, which knocked him down and the axe he was holding split his head.

750 HOURS, AIM OF ENDURANCE PLANE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 11.—Less than fifty hours separated Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien from a new world's endurance record flight record as they began their fourth week aloft here today.

At 7:11 a. m. (C.S.T.) Jackson and O'Brien had been in the air 504 hours and their motor was running smoothly. If they are still up Wednesday they will pass the record of 554 hours set by the Hunter brothers of Sparta, Ill., at Chicago last month.

The aviators' intention is to stay up eight days beyond the present record to set a mark which will discourage rival endurance fliers. If successful in this, the new record would be about 750 hours.

The first assurance of financial return from the flight was received today when the company from which the fliers purchased oil announced it would give them \$100 an hour after they break the record, up to 70 hours, amounting to \$7,000. Bill Pickens, the fliers' manager, said he was negotiating with a national radio chain to broadcast the fliers' remarks. The fliers' bank balance today was \$3,526, with expenses to be met at the rate of \$1,000 a week.

CRATER LAKE PARK HAS RECORD SUNDAY

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 11.—Crater lake park had the biggest day in its history Sunday and all single-day attendance records were shattered. The register shows 3,561 persons visited the park, and 1,013 automobiles entered during the day.

\$1600 SECURED IN HOLDUP OF THEATER

FRESNO, Aug. 11.—Two young men with handkerchiefs tied across their faces lined nearly a dozen employees of the Wilson theatre against the wall of the office and forced House Manager Howard Helles to open the safe, from which they worked about \$1600 in currency from stacks and rolls of silver, and escaped just before noon today.

EAR SLASHED: 35 CTS. GONE

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—Leslie Yost complained to police today that after being rudely awakened from sleep on the grass at Trivette park yesterday, he found himself surrounded by Filipinos. He had been robbed of 35 cents, he declared, and his left ear had been slashed with a knife. The islanders fled when he awakened, Yost reported.

NO ONE HURT AND NO LOSS TO PROPERTY

Unidentified Machine, With Two Occupants, Rouses Area Long Seat of Labor Trouble.

Department of Commerce Launches Investigation; License Number Is Given to Police.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Aug. 11.—An airplane today dropped bombs into this coal mining section torn by labor troubles for several months. The bombs, estimated at nine in number, created intense excitement, but injured no one and did no property damage.

The machine, containing two men and described as an orange colored monoplane, appeared about 6 a. m. It approached Providence at about 2,000 feet, coming from the direction of Illinois.

The first bomb struck near Clay city a few miles north of here. Then the machine dived towards Providence and released two bombs. Columns of smoke and dirt rose from a field.

The plane circled the town and came back, dropping lower as it came on. A bomb fell near the entrance to the Ruckman mine but failed to explode. Five more were dropped near the Meador, Young and Holt mine but only two exploded. The explosions of the bombs could be heard for miles and threw the town into an uproar. The machine appeared about the time the miners were going to work.

The bombs which failed to explode were made of dynamite wrapped in adhesive tape with fuses attached. The aerial attack followed several explosions of dynamite near the Diamond mine company's plant, and that of the Meador, Holt and Young company.

County authorities wired officials at Harrisburg, Illinois, and other southern Illinois towns to be on the lookout for the plane. It also was indicated that another appeal would be made to Governor Sampson for troops. The governor has refused to send them, stating he believed that detectives could do more to break up violence than could troops.

The mines in this section were closed April 1 because of disagreement over wages and working conditions. While a vote was announced as overwhelmingly in favor of a strike, it was never authorized by the United Mine Workers of America. In recent weeks most of the mines have been reopened and announced they were producing at almost normal rate of production.

Dynamitings and other forms of violence followed and 98 men have been enjoined in federal court against interference with the mines.

Federal Probe Ordered

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—The department of commerce today ordered an immediate investigation after receiving reports that an airplane had dropped bombs on coal mines.
