31 PRIZES AWAIT ROSEBURG GOLFERS

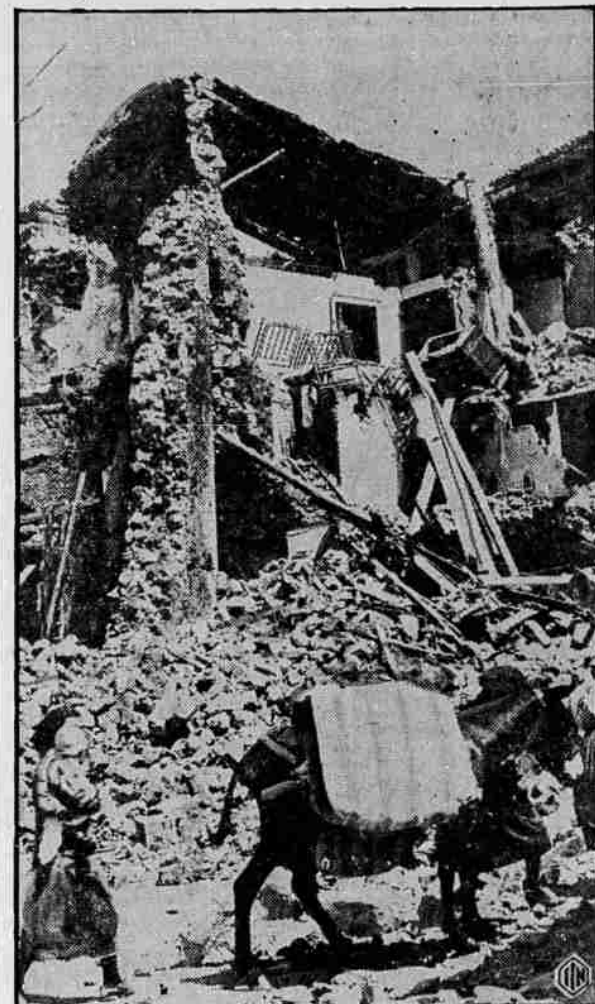

MISERIES OF WAR SHOWN IN UNUSUAL FILM AT ANTLERS

"All Quiet on the Western Front," now showing at the Antlers theatre, is a war picture entirely different from any other this reviewer has ever seen. Written by that gifted author, Erich Maria Remarque, it is a story of the lost generation, the youths of all nations who were drawn into the living death of war before they had really learned to live. No matter that the hero happens to be a German. He symbolizes the "unknown soldier" of every country. He represents that never-to-be-forgotten decade, who, sent to the struggle on the wings of a mighty patriotism, found there not the glory depicted "back home" but the slime, the anguish, the cursedness of war. Living or dead he was lost. If he did come back, he found himself in a world that had passed him by, a world he could never understand nor be in harmony with.

Great credit should be given Lewis Milestone's realistic depiction of the battle scenes, while acting laurels must be divided between Lewis Ayres as Paul Bäumer, the young school-boy, and Louis Wolheim in his role of Katczinsky, hard-bitten veteran, benevolent protector and instructor of the bewildered youths. George (Slim) Summerville as Taden, the biggest water in the company, supplies most of the comedy relief, and is perfectly suited to the role. It is really regretful that all the other featured players in the large cast cannot be given their just due, but lack of space prevents. It will be sufficient to say that a wonderful performance was given by each one, particularly by the group of school-boy chums who set off so gallantly together, and together hardened into fighting men.

One of the most gripping scenes in the entire production is that of Paul Bäumer's return home on leave when he finds that even his home and his loved ones have so changed in his eyes that he seems a stranger to everything there. His speech at the school-house is the theme of the whole picture, and represents accurately the author's purpose in writing the book. Everyone should see this picture. It is a far greater indictment of war than a thousand speeches could be. It is more than a drama of uniforms; it is a drama of men, who cast into the flaming maw of the struggle, knew there was no escape. "All Quiet on the Western Front" stands alone as a motion picture achievement. Once seen, it will never be forgotten.

WEEKEND MISHAPS TAKE NINE LIVES; OVER SCORE HURT

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—Nine persons lost their lives, and more than a score were injured, three possibly fatally, in automobile and train accidents and drownings in the Pacific northwest over the weekend.

G. J. Grantland of Battleground, Wash., drowned in the Columbia river near here. He was seized by cramps while swimming.

Clare Hunter, 17, of Portland, died in Salem from injuries received when she fell from an automobile.

Paul Zella dived into Medical lake and drowned when he stuck in the mud.

Clarence H. Nicholson, 15, Tacoma high school football star, drowned at American lake.

R. J. Bolter, transient laborer, was run down and killed near Spo-

kane. G. B. Russell, his employer, was possibly fatally injured. Mrs. Louise Marzug, Spokane, was killed, and Michael, her husband, may die from injuries received when a Northern Pacific freight train demolished their automobile near Spokane.

Other casualties included: Mrs. D. F. Parks, Kennewick, killed in auto crash; husband badly injured in auto smashup. Speed said cause.

W. E. Hedley, Missoula, killed, three children hurt when auto smashed into fallen tree across highway.

Walter Robertson, Yakima, killed when car wrecked against bridge. Don Burke, Tacoma, probably fatally hurt in auto crash at Shelton.
