THE Pendleton East Oregonian thinks the federal farm board is all wrong. It shouldn't go around telling farmers to raise only the amount of wheat they can sell at a fair price.
Instead, according to the Pendleton paper, it should buy all the surplus wheat grown each year and dump it on foreign nations at any price it can get.
With the surplus thus removed, the remaining wheat could be sold on the domestic market at a price so high as to stimulate the production of a still LARGER wheat surplus to be dumped abroad.
And so on, until the country went broke.

LET'S see about that. Russia is now engaged in dumping wood and coal and manganese on U.S. at any price she can get. And we are protesting furiously.
Sooner or later, we will find some way to get even with Russia. We can't afford NOT to find a way.
We can't sit still and see our own producers ruined. It is our own producers that pay the taxes to keep OUR OWN government going.

SO, you see, if we start dumping our surplus wheat on foreign nations at ruinously low prices, the farmer subjects of these foreign nations are going to protest bitterly to their governments, and in time these governments are going to find a way to GET EVEN with us.
You can't have everything your own way all the time.

THE Pendleton paper is quite sure the farmer should go on raising all the wheat he can, regardless of whether he can find a market for it.

Just one question at this point: Does the East Oregonian go right on printing more and more papers after the market for them has been supplied?
Of course not. It stops its presses just as soon as it has printed all the papers it can sell at the price it has set for them.

Lightning Starts Numerous Fires

CREWS BUSY IN SECTIONS OF DOUGLAS

Prompt Action Minimizes Losses in the Umpqua Forest and Areas Elsewhere.

High Humidity in Season's Hottest Day Prevents Rapid Burning and Aids Fighters.

Generated by the extreme heat, which reached 97 degrees, the highest mark for the year, a severe electrical storm swept over the Umpqua National forest yesterday afternoon, setting numerous fires, forcing an emergency call for fire fighters to quell the most serious blaze, which was located along the North Umpqua road between Williams and Bogus creeks. The storm struck the forest about 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, continuing until 6 o'clock. The lightning struck frequently throughout all sections of the forest and innumerable fires followed. Some of these fires were extinguished by rains that fell in several sections of the forest while others it is expected, are still smoldering and have not yet been spotted.

In all counting the seven fires started by lightning Sunday night, 32 fires were reported this morning by Oscar Houser, central dispatcher. Ten of the fires were reported under control, and others, said to be small, are expected to be easily handled.

Roseburg Crew Aids
The fire on the North Umpqua road yesterday evening threatened to become serious, but was brought under control about daylight this morning.

Starting near the road, it swept up a grass-covered hillside and gained great headway. There were not sufficient forest service men

DESCHUTES WOODS ARE SET ON FIRE

BEND, Ore., Aug. 12.—Forest fire control units were today attempting to hold in check eight small fires in the Deschutes National forest. The fires, all on the Cascade crest, were set by lightning. Three of the fires were near Ringo and Royce Buttes, areas of extreme fire hazard.

The lightning storm was preceded by wind of near-tornado velocity. Large pine trees were uprooted in the forest, and several houses in a lumber camp south of Bend were struck by falling limbs.

STATE AIDS FLAX RAISERS
SALEM, Aug. 12.—Money for the immediate payment of farmers who have contracted their flax crops to the state of Oregon was provided by the state emergency board Monday when it authorized a deficiency appropriation of \$245,000. The debt thereby created will be paid off from the sale of flax products.

It is estimated that \$296,000 will be required to handle the 1929 crop. But the state has received \$35,000 from seed advanced to growers and \$25,500 from pullers sold to the farmers.

ASYLUM NEEDS MONEY
SALEM, Aug. 12.—About 60 criminally insane inmates at the state hospital are a cause of serious concern. Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent, says he probably will ask the 1931 legislature to make provision for safer care for these wards.

SALEM, Aug. 12.—The first pearls to be received at the Woodburn cannery were received yesterday from the Roseburg district.

FIRE TAKES BOATHOUSE
NEWPORT, Ore., Aug. 12.—The boathouse of the Yaquina bay coast guard station on Bay beach, was destroyed by fire at 2 a. m. today. Loss was estimated at \$20.

LEGION CHIEF INJURED
ASTORIA, Aug. 11.—Mike Cosovich, post commander of the American Legion here, was in a hospital today suffering from severe injuries received Sunday when his automobile was struck by a car driven by Otto Becken of Astoria. The accident occurred on the Astoria-Seaside highway.

LODI, Cal., Aug. 12.—Mrs. Claude Hall, 65, Los Angeles, and Esther Bunch, 22, and Josephine Bunch, 11, sisters, were burned to death early today in a fire which destroyed the Bunch farmhouse six miles southeast of here.

Joseph Bunch, father of the girls, was badly burned in an attempted rescue and was taken to a Stockton hospital in a critical condition.

The younger sister had escaped from the burning home but ran back when she heard the screams of the older girl.

TREE SITTER GETS FRACTURED SKULL

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 12.—Stephen Streleck, 16 year old tree sitter, sustained a badly fractured skull last night when a limb on which he had been perched for nearly 400 hours, gave way, plunging him 25 feet to the ground. He was taken to the hospital in critical condition.

NORBLAD ASKED TO PARDON EX-BANKER

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 12.—Numerous letters and petitions from Portland are reaching Governor Norblad, he said today, asking him to pardon J. V. Burke, who is serving a seven-year sentence in the penitentiary on a charge of willfully misappropriating funds of the Kenton State bank, of which he was president.

The governor said the requests were coming from some of the most influential people of Portland, including many of the depositors who lost money in the closing of the bank. One of these lost \$7500. Letters say that Burke's wife is in very poor health.

The governor said he had not investigated the case and was not contemplating immediate action. Burke was received at the prison April 12, 1929. In addition to his prison sentence he paid a fine of \$2500.

CLIFFORD AND CLARK OUSTED BY GAME BODY

Chief Warden and His Aide Adjudged Grafters and Guilty of Private Misconduct.

Accusers Bitterly Flayed by Counsel; New Head to Be Appointed at Later Session.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12.—Harold H. Clifford, state game warden, and E. H. Clark, deputy state game warden, were removed from office yesterday by the state game commission. Clifford is to be relieved of his duties September 1, while Clark's removal is made effective immediately.

The commission issued no statement explaining its action, which followed lengthy hearings of charges by various sportsmen's organizations alleging incompetence and negligence on the part of Clifford and Clark. The conduct of their offices. Sportsmen charged both men with laxity in enforcing fishing laws and receiving "protection money" from poachers.

No successors have been named to either office, but David B. Evans, member of the commission, said an executive meeting would be held for that purpose August 25. Clark has been with the game department for 19 years.

Proud of Record
The only comment Clifford had to make was a prepared statement issued several hours after the order was handed down. It said:

"I am still very proud of the record that has been made in the game department under my administration during the past 3 1/2 years.

"My one great regret is that I have not been allowed to complete the plan to rehabilitate Malheur lake which is so well under way. My interest will still be in this project.

"May I ask for my successor the hearty cooperation of all those who hunt and fish."

CANNERY PLAN HELD UP BY CLAIMANTS

Cooperative Proponents to Determine Tonight If Reorganization Is Possible.

Failure Means Sale of Two Norton Plants, Vitality Needed to Handle Heavy Crops.

A meeting of the directors of the proposed cooperative cannery association is to be held tonight to decide definitely upon whether to continue or drop the attempted organization and allow the Roseburg and Sutherlin (Norton) canneries to be sold by the receiver.

With the organization more than 90 per cent complete, the committee in charge of that phase of the work reports that a small group of growers has refused to enter into the plan, and that the organization is doomed to failure unless these signatures are secured.

Proposed Plans
Under the plan proposed for organizing the cooperative cannery, which would be eligible for federal aid, the growers holding claims against the Norton company agree to take stock in the new company for the amount of their claims, organizing their own association to continue operation of the plants, which would be leased from the receiver and put back into active operation.

The plan also provides for the sale of a small amount of preferred stock, to be used to meet commercial accounts and provide operating capital, leaving nothing on hand to take care of any other expense.

The organization committee reports that there are a few growers who have refused to sign this agreement and are demanding payment of their claims against the Norton company.

Must Be 100 Per Cent
The success of the venture, according to the committee, must be 100 per cent.

\$7,000,000 STADIUM BUILDER DIES POOR
CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Paddy Harmon, the dreamer whose dream of a \$7,000,000 sports palace came true, died as he started life—virtually penniless.

This was revealed today when plans were set in motion to stage a benefit boxing show in the Chicago stadium, the building Paddy built, next month with the receipts going to his widow and four-year-old daughter.

When Harmon's car skidded off the road two weeks ago and killed him, he had \$2.50 in cash in his pockets. He had no life insurance, no other bank account, nothing left of his fortune except the money he took in building the Chicago stadium, largest indoor sports arena in America.

Friends of the dead promoter said today his most difficult task was managing his money. He allowed it to slip through his fingers making loans to needy friends, much after the fashion of the late Tex Rickard, who allowed his fortune to slip away.

Harmon's funeral expenses were paid by his friends.

TAPS SOUND FOR SOLDIER WHO LED VICTORIOUS 42nd

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Major General Charles T. Menoher, 68, former chief of the army air corps, whose break 10 years ago with Colonel William Mitchell precipitated a nation-wide uproar, died yesterday of pneumonia.

During the course of a long and distinguished army career he had served as battle commander of the Rainbow (42nd division) in France, and bore therefrom not only the distinguished service medal, but also the decorations of France, Belgium and Italy.

The clash with the then Brigadier General Mitchell, assistant air chief, took place shortly after Menoher had assumed command of the army air forces shortly after his return from France.

Taking issue with actions and statements of Mitchell, General Menoher openly demanded his subordinate be relieved from duty, thus initiating a nationally-aided debate which culminated in the court martial of Mitchell and his eventual resignation from the service.

General Menoher, born in Philadelphia, saw active duty in both the Spanish-American war and in the Philippine insurrection.

Britain Loses Soldier.
CHIPPENHAM, England, Aug. 12.—General Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien, 72, one of Britain's most famous soldiers, died this morning after an automobile accident yesterday.

General Smith-Dorrien commanded the second army of the British expeditionary force in 1914-15.

CARROLL AND CAST MEMBERS FREED
(Associated Press Leased Wire)
NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Earl Carroll and eight members of the cast of his "vaudeville" were freed today after charges of presenting an immoral performance when a grand jury refused to return an indictment against them.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 12.—Misunderstanding relative to just how much authority the chief state traffic inspector has as a division head under the secretary of state, appears to have contributed largely to the ouster of Chief T. A. Rafferty by Secretary Hoss.

This is indicated in the letter written by Hoss requesting Rafferty's resignation, and in Rafferty's reply. The letters were made public by Hoss late yesterday.

Hoss, in his letter, cited "lack of harmony and discipline in the department, which I believe to be incurable as long as the present arrangement is continued."

Disension Cited
In his reply Secretary says: "During the past 12 months the efficiency of the state traffic force has been materially affected by internal dissension, the importance of which has been magnified by the political activities of three or four members of the organization. For the reason that I have no authority to correct this evil I know it has and will continue to embarrass your administration until the present difficulty is overcome."

When, in conversing with newspaper men yesterday, Hoss was asked about reported undue interference by himself with Rafferty's division, Hoss said he had been trying for months to get away from the troubles in the traffic division but hadn't been able to. Also, in the letter to Rafferty, he says:

"We have gone over the problems of the department so many times that it is unnecessary here to reiterate the reasons making this change essential. I am sorry that it was during my administration that the disruption occurred, because it has given me a great deal more grief than I was entitled to. Unless I make some sort of a drastic move at this time I feel that I would be unable to function efficiently as secretary of state, because this matter has gone so far."

Hoss intimates in the letter that he will assist Rafferty to secure another position in the state department.

"It would be my wish that you make your resignation effective as of October 1," he writes, "and that from August 15 until the effective date that you be relieved from active duty, both for the purpose of securing a much needed rest and to seek a new connection, which I assume you will need. I also assume that you will talk with Mr. Laughridge at your convenience, as he and I have discussed the matter."

Laughridge is assistant secretary of state.

EVIDENCE ON PRISONER NOT MADE PUBLIC

Paul Montgomery, Flyer Accused in Warrant in Kentucky, Denies He Is Guilty Man.

Airman Admits Going Aloft Yesterday but Asserts He Was Recovering From Spree.

MURPHYSBORO, Ill., Aug. 12.—Paul Montgomery, local aviator, was arrested here today by Sheriff William Flanigan for investigation in connection with the airplane bombing of mining properties in the vicinity of Providence, Ky., yesterday.

Montgomery's arrest followed receipt of a telephone call from Sheriff Overbee of Dixon, Ky., that a warrant for the aviator in connection with the bombing outrage had been issued there.

Evidence Claimed
Three men who came here this morning from the Kentucky coal field conferred with county authorities, advising that they had some evidence on Montgomery. The nature of the evidence was not revealed.

The aviator, who had talked of a Rome-to-Dallas, Tex. non-stop flight this summer, declined to make any other statement than to deny he had flown in the vicinity of Providence yesterday or that he had any connection with the air raid. Immediately after his arrest he asked for permission to engage counsel.

Spree Is Defense
Montgomery's orange and black monoplanes answers the general description of the ship that dropped nine bombs in the vicinity

UMATILLA, AT 108, WARMEST REGION

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—A maximum of 108 degrees registered at the government station in Umatilla, Ore., yesterday, was the highest temperature recorded on any weather bureau thermometer in the country for the day. The Umatilla heat was approached only by Red Bluff, Cal., and Yakima, Wash., each with 102 degrees. Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Wash., and Wolf Creek, Ore., were next in line with 100 degrees.

Portland had its hottest day of the season with a temperature of 96 degrees.

Other Oregon temperatures included: Medford 98, Roseburg 97, Baker 88, Marshfield 76, Albany 98 and Salem 86.
