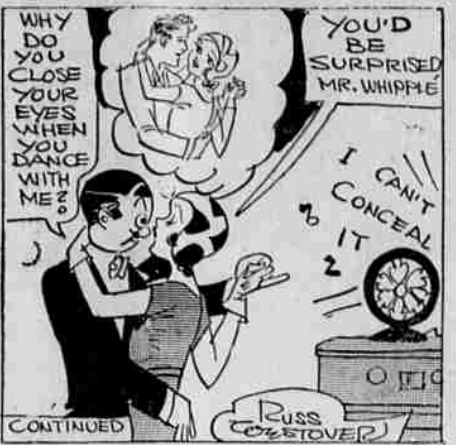

## MOONEY-BILLINGS CASE RESUMED BY CALIFORNIA COURT

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—Resumption of the supreme court hearing on the pardon application of Warren K. Billings was featured today by the promise of Edwin V. McKenzie, defense attorney. If he were given enough leeway he would prove by this afternoon Billings and Thomas J. Mooney were innocent of the 1916 Preparedness day bombing here.

McKenzie's promise followed the objection of Associate Justice Preston to the attorney's questioning of James Brennan, who prosecuted Billings at his trial.

McKenzie examined Brennan as to his conversation with Martin Swanson, private detective, on the day of the bombing. He attempted to show Swanson told the witness he had been trailing Mooney and Billings and traced Mooney to the Elfers building on the day of the parade and that Mooney had remained there until after the parade.

At this point, the justice objected to the line of questioning. "If you will permit me to go along without interruption," McKenzie declared, "the Mooney and Billings cases will end at 3 o'clock today."

A discussion followed and Chief Justice Wente ruled the questioning proper. McKenzie proceeded. The questioning apparently was designed to prove Billings' alibi on the day of the bombing, July 22, 1916. Billings' said he was not near Market and Stuart streets, scene of the bombing, and Mooney said he was on the roof of the Elfers building at the time.

Mooney and Billings are serving life terms for the bombing, which killed ten persons and injured 40.

## PAIR WITH \$70,000 DRAFT MISSING

TOLEDO, Aug. 12.—Toledo police were called upon today to help in the search for Mr. and Mrs. Charles Kern, an elderly St. Louis couple believed to have been kidnapped at Defiance, Ohio. He is a wealthy executive of a St. Louis biscuit company and is said to have left St. Louis with a bank cashier's draft for \$70,000.

Police here were told that three suave men talked with the couple on the train and that they left the train together in Defiance, Ohio. The men are said to have driven away in a sedan with an Illinois license. No trace of the couple has been found since.

The supposition of police is that members of a St. Louis gang were "planted" on the Wabash train at St. Louis and that Mr. and Mrs. Kern unwittingly placed themselves in the hands of gangsters when they entered the automobile. The draft has not been presented in Toledo, but can be cashed in any city.

## ENDURANCE PLANE DUD MAY TRY FOR 1000-HOUR RECORD

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 12.—Feeling assured of establishing a new world's record for sustained flight tomorrow Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien today talked of keeping their monoplane Greater St. Louis in the air for six weeks, or 1,000 hours. At 11:31 p. m. (C. S. T.) they had flown for 533 hours and had slightly more than 20 hours to go to wrest the record from the hard flying Hunter brothers.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 12.—The monoplane Greater St. Louis, piloted by Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien, early today soared nearer and nearer to a new record for endurance refueling flying. As Jackson and O'Brien approached the present record of nearly 554 hours, held by the Hunter brothers, their plane continued to function well—so well, in fact, that John Hunter, a visitor at Lambert-St. Louis field, said, "It looks as though they have it in the bag."

At 7:11 a. m. today Jackson and O'Brien had been circling over the field for 528 hours and had slightly less than 27 hours to go to equal the Hunters' record. Under endurance flying regulations, they must remain up an additional hour to break the record.

Although within sight of the record, which they formerly held, Jackson and O'Brien today had no intention of an early landing. They planned to remain in the air at least eight days beyond the present record.

Jackson, speaking over the plane's radio transmitter, even talked of staying up three weeks more.

John Hunter, who acted as spokesman for the brothers after their arrival here yesterday, assured their St. Louis rivals they would not attempt to break the record of the Greater St. Louis this year if a new mark is achieved.

There was a suggestion of change, however, in the well wishes of Harry Perkins of St. Louis, Hunters' manager. The success of Jackson and O'Brien has cost the Hunters about \$100,000 in contracts which might be forthcoming if there were not a tendency to wait and see if a new record was established, Perkins said.

The fliers received the first assurance of a financial return from their flight yesterday when an oil company announced it would give them \$100 for each hour they remain aloft over the old record. The offer will continue for 70 hours, or until the fund reaches \$7,000.

## MICHIGAN BATTLES WITH FOREST FIRES

MEMPHIS, Mich., Aug. 12.—The thrifty timber of the northland cracked today.

Reports of new danger points came in hourly as flames blazed through parched cut-over and timberlands in the upper Michigan peninsula and western Wisconsin. An observer in a forest, patrol tower 60 miles north of Menominee said he counted ten separate fires within ten miles of his tower.

In the drought-stricken peninsula counties, more than 75 separate fires were reported. These raged through Marquette, Dickinson, Luce, Schoolcraft, Alger, Chippewa and Mackinac counties. All of Menominee county was in danger unless the fires were controlled soon. Joseph M. Hornick, conservation commissioner said.

Forest lands still blazed at the edge of Menominee but the city was safe unless a strong west wind came up.

In Wisconsin, Indians and whites toiled together to save timber in Ashland, Forest, Bayfield and Langlade counties.
