A. A. A. SPONSORS SURVEY OF ROADS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 13.—As the first step in the formulation of a national program of highway beautification, the legislative committee of the American Automobile association will shortly launch a survey of road conditions throughout the country.

An announcement to this effect was made today by Thos. P. Henry of Detroit, Mich., president of the national motoring body. Mr. Henry pointed out that the survey had been authorized by the recent annual convention of the A. A. A. in Asheville and cited the resolution calling for a program of highway beautification, as follows: "Advertising signs along the main highways of the country should be so controlled and regulated as not to mar the beauty of the landscape or constitute a hazard to safe driving. The American Automobile association favors a survey of the situation by the A. A. A. legislative committee with a view to the formulation of a model law for the regulation of highway advertising. The committee is also authorized to study and make recommendations on such collateral subjects as highway beautification through planting and the removal of junk yards."

Representatives from every section of the country," said Mr. Henry, "participated in the discussion which preceded the adoption of the resolution and the belief was unanimous that the problem of controlling and regulating conditions on or adjacent to our highways must be solved, both from the standpoint of preserving what is left of the beauty of our landscapes and the elimination of factors that constitute distinct hazards to motor vehicle drivers. When the committee meets, it will decide on how the survey will be conducted and the lines along which it will proceed."

SUMMER DAYLIGHT ENDED IN ALASKA

POINT BARROW, Alaska, Aug. 12.—The three months of summer daylight here has ended with the sun dipping below the ocean horizon a few minutes each night. Lights must be used in the evenings and the schedules of work and play of the natives are being forced back to the white man's system. During the summer they sleep during the white man's "day" and remain up all "night."
