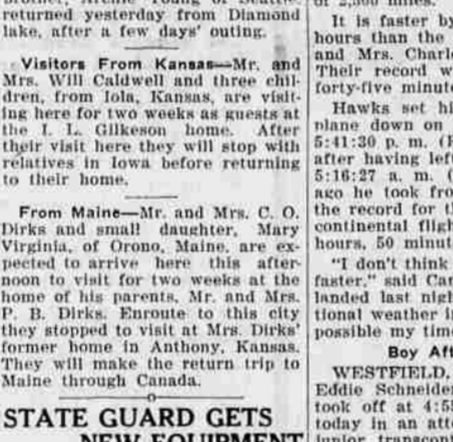

GLIDE LAMBS TOP PRICES PAID IN FRISCO MARKET

A net price of \$6.20 per cwt. was received by members of the Glide pool for the first shipment of lambs sent to the San Francisco market.

The double decked car containing 242 lambs, owned by three growers in the Glide community, topped the San Francisco market at a price of \$8.00 per cwt. After deducting a shrinkage of 4 1/2 per cent based on local weight, and the necessary expenses of shipment, a net price of \$6.20 was paid the growers for the lambs in the pool.

A committee composed of Willard Smith, R. T. Blakely and County Agent J. C. Leedy, graded the lambs on the farms previous to hauling to Roseburg for shipment. No lambs were culled at destination, all being of the required size and quality to justify top prices.

Willard Smith accompanied the shipment to San Francisco. Members of the Glide pool are greatly encouraged by the success of their initial effort, and plan to make other shipments in the future.

STATE GUARD GETS NEW EQUIPMENT

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 14.—Since July 1 the Oregon National Guard has received from the federal government about \$500,000 worth of new and heavier equipment for the arsenal at Camp Clackamas for the use of the 21st field artillery regiment. In addition to this, it was said at national guard headquarters today, \$45,260 worth of new equipment has been received.

Included in the equipment received since July 1 are 16 new 155-millimeter howitzers. These are propelled by five-ton tractors and 36 of these have been received. Also there are several thousand dollars worth of delicate instruments used in artillery operations. The howitzers replace the 75-millimeter guns formerly used.

The change is incident to the conversion of the 21st into regimental status.

HAWKS SMASHES RECORD MADE BY COL. LINDBERGH

VALLEY STREAM, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Behind the name of Captain Frank M. Hawks in aviation's record book today is set down the time of 12 hours, 25 minutes, three seconds for an eastward transcontinental flight, the fastest ever flown by man over that distance of 2,500 miles.

It is faster by more than two hours than the time made by Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh. Their record was fourteen hours, forty-five minutes.

Hawks set his Travelair monoplane down on Curtiss field at 5:41:30 p. m. (E. S. T.) last night after having left Glendale, Cal., at 5:16:27 a. m. (E. S. T.) A week ago he took from Roscoe Turner the record for the westward transcontinental flight, making it in 14 hours, 50 minutes and 43 seconds.

"I don't think it can be done any faster," said Capt. Hawks as he landed last night. "Given exceptional weather in the fall, it is just possible my time can be bettered."

Boy After Record

WESTFIELD, N. J., Aug. 14.—Eddie Schneider, 18-year-old pilot, took off at 4:55 a. m. (E. S. T.) today in an attempt to set a new junior transcontinental flight record. The present record was established by the late Frank Goldsborough, who made the trip in 23 hours, 35 minutes.

He plans to make his first stop at Columbus, O., for fuel and a second refueling stop at St. Louis, Mo. At Wichita, Kan., he plans to spend the night while a 250-gallon tank is fitted into his plane. The last stage of the flight will be to Tumbler, Cal., which he hopes to reach by tomorrow night.

Endurances Soar On

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 14.—With the world's record for sustained flight again in their possession, Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien soared on today taking up the twenty-fourth day of their endurance grind at 7:11 a. m. (C. S. T.) At that hour they had been up 576 hours and had beaten the mark of the Hunter brothers by more than 22 hours.
