

THREE KILLED IN ST. PAUL RACKET; ONE LONG SOUGHT

Sammy Stein, One Victim,
Considered Slayer in
Job Done During
G. O. P. Meet.

Another Gangster Slain in
Chicago Feud and 15th
Murder Is Recorded
in Detroit.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 14.—Three men were slain last night in what police believed was the outgrowth of a quarrel over slot machine concessions.

One man still unidentified and Frank Coleman, Kansas City, who was wounded fatally, were found last night by General W. F. E. Hibbs, head of the state bureau of criminal apprehension while touring a lonely road near Wildwood, an amusement resort on White Bear lake, northwest of here.

Victims "Bad" Men
One victim later was identified as Sammy Stein, Minneapolis. All three were found within 200 yards of the spot where a small car was parked by the road.

Identification of Coleman, who officers termed a member of a Missouri mob, tended to strengthen the theory the trio was slain by a rival gang.

Police believe the third victim was "Butch" Myer of St. Paul. Stein, they said, was wanted as a suspect in the recent Willmar, Minn., bank robbery when five men armed with machine guns escaped with \$142,000 in cash and securities. He also was wanted in Kansas City for murder, they said. Possibility a fourth body might be found was disclosed after a fourth hat and a gallon of moonshine, was found near the same spot.

Stein Sought 2 Years
KANSAS CITY, Aug. 14.—Sam Stein, identified as one of three victims of gang warfare near St. Paul, has been sought more than two years by Kansas City police for the murder of Traffic Patrolman James H. (Happy) Smith for which three bank robbers were hanged here last July 25.

Kansas City police believed Stein was the actual slayer of the policeman who was killed in attempting to halt the car in which a bandit gang fled with \$19,150 in loot from the Home Trust company, spraying bullets in a 1928 republican national convention crowd in the heart of the downtown district.

Four bystanders were struck by bullets from the bandit car as it careened past "Petticoat Lane" and another died of a heart ailment aggravated by the excitement.

Chicago Gunman Slain
CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—Denny Vallo, notorious gunman and suspect in the St. Valentine's day massacre, was shot to death from ambush last night in Niles Center, a northwest suburb.

Two men jumped from behind a clump of bushes and shot down Vallo as he alighted from his automobile with a woman companion in front of a roadhouse. Forty shotgun slugs were found in the gangster's body.

Vallo's death, police believed, was a reprisal by Niles Center beer runners for protection Vallo promised and did not deliver.

James Pleasure, negro owner of the Pleasure inn, in a south side cabaret, shot and wounded two gangsters, one of them seriously.

After Pleasure reported the shooting to the police, Sam Masina and Sam Phillips, gangsters, appeared at private hospitals seeking treatment for a leg wound.

Both refused to talk but they were identified by Pleasure.

Detroit's Toll Grows
DETROIT, Aug. 14.—Detroit's fifteenth recent gangster assassination was recorded last night.

The victim was Cleora Mangin, suspected of having been a liquor operator. He was shot five times by a man who was riding beside him in his automobile.

The assassin leaped from Mangin's automobile and escaped as the car crashed into the curb.

CANYONVILLE SETS COMMUNITY FAIR FOR AUGUST 23RD

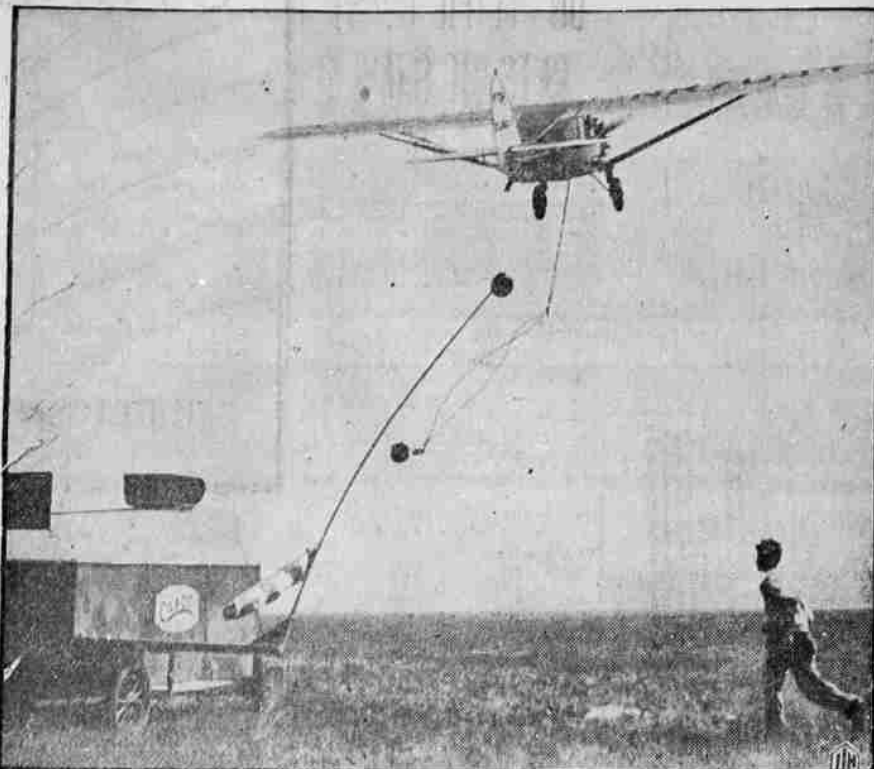

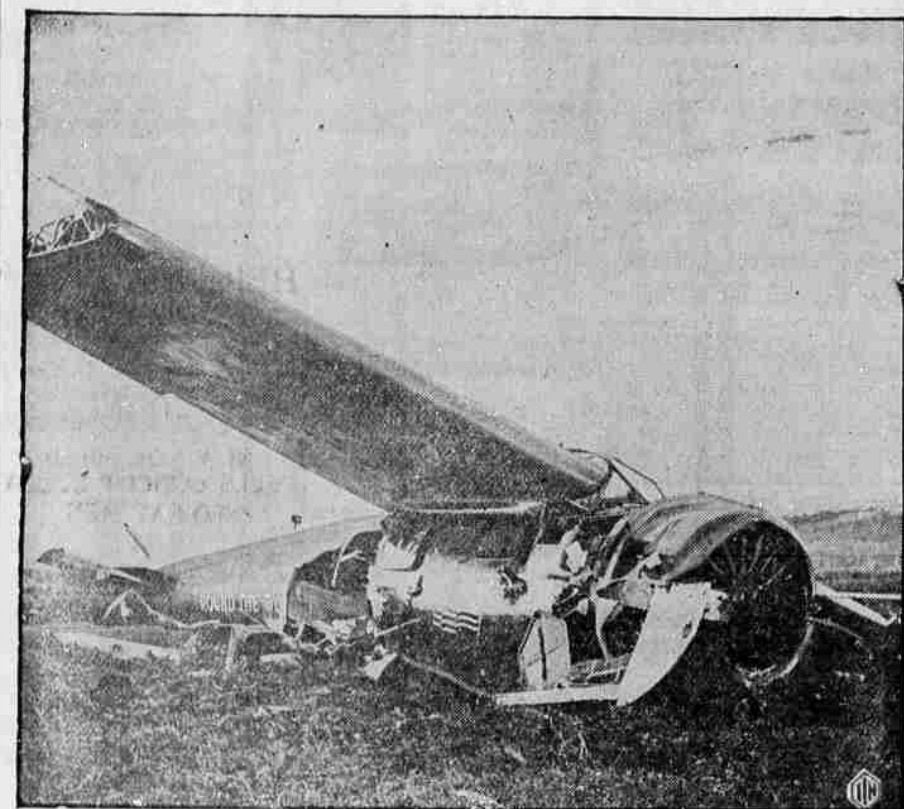
Some special prizes are being given in different divisions as well as the cash prizes listed.

DAIRYMEN PLAN CLOSER LINK WITH INDUSTRY UNITS

Plans for closer cooperation between retail milk distributors of Roseburg and producers in tributary sections were made when the members of the Douglas County Dairymen's association met in annual session yesterday afternoon at the city hall in Roseburg.

A committee, composed of Fred A. Goff, Harlan Moore and Ernest Unrath, was appointed to draw up plans to be presented at a later meeting.

Officers selected for the coming year were J. F. Bonebrake, president; C. E. Marks, vice-president; J. C. Leedy, secretary-treasurer and Harlan Moore, directors.

The program for the day included talks by Horace C. Berg of the Douglas County creamery on "The Dairy Situation," Fred A. Goff on "Marketing Dairy Products," and J. C. Leedy, county agent, on "Ladino Clover."

J. F. Bonebrake, in his report as president, stated that the association during the past year, had been helpful in securing an increased number of dairymen to test their herds for contagious abortion and for tuberculosis, and in arranging meetings with other farm organizations at which educational programs were given relative to the food value of dairy products.

14 miles long. The road change was made in compliance with this request, necessitating much additional expenditure. It is evident that the company evidently had this project definitely agreed upon or would not have asked the road change.

Demand to Govern
All of the projects, however, depend entirely, it is pointed out, upon the demand for power. At the present time the lines are carrying all of the load with ample reserve to meet expansion. It requires, however, about two years to construct a generating plant of the magnitude of the proposed Boundary project, and the company is looking ahead to future needs in its construction program, so that if officials are convinced that the needs in the next two years require construction of a plant on the North Umpqua, doubtless work will be commenced in the very near future.

Engineers have been working for several years on preliminary plans, securing data from which to draw up the definite plans and specifications that will enter into actual construction.

EX-BRICKLAYER ACQUIRES STOCK IN NEW YORK GIANTS

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—J. Henry McNally, New York contractor who is said to have laid some 20,000,000 brick in the course of a long and active career, has become the second largest stockholder of the New York Giants.

McNally has bought the stock of William F. Kenny, who held 20 percent, and by other purchases increased his holdings from 3 percent to 30 percent.

Charles A. Stoneham, president of the club, controls more than 50 percent of the stock.

Sometimes known as "King of the Bricklayers," McNally has played a part in the construction of some of New York's latest buildings, first as an active brick layer and later as a contractor.

COMSTOCK TRAGEDY IS UNDER INQUIRY

Sheriff V. T. Jackson and Deputy Coroner Mikeworth left this morning for Eugene to question the Filipinos who survived the accident at Comstock yesterday in which one of the nine occupants of the car, that crashed through the railing of the overhead crossing, was killed. It was undecided as yet whether an inquest is to be held. The members of the party will be questioned, and if it is found advisable the officers will arrange for an inquest. The body of the wreck victim is being held at Cottage Grove.
