SERIES OF REVIVALS STARTED AT GLIDE

Teddy Leavitt, state evangelist for the Christian church, one of the best known preachers in the state of Oregon, is conducting a series of revival meetings at the Christian church at Glide, starting Sunday. Mr. Leavitt, a very forceful and interesting speaker, has been very successful in evangelistic work, and was selected by the state board from among the preachers of the state to carry on the religious efforts sponsored by the organization in Oregon. His first service will be held Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, and meetings will be continued nightly for an indefinite period.

GENERAL REVIVAL OF BUSINESS DUE SOON, FORECAST

When elected president of the Six-Pint League of New York, Hil F. Best, eastern manager of M. C. Mogensen & Co., Inc., issued a statement which appeared on the wire services of the country about business in general taking a turn.

Business has continued to move along the path of readjustment during July, as he predicted, despite the fact that the seasonal slackening normal to the month brought the general level of industrial activity close to the lowest point in several years, according to another statement just released by Mr. Best in New York. He points out that there were no disturbing elements apparent in the month of July and that the feeling is general among the business men throughout the country that a general revival of business conditions is believed to be due within the months of August or September.

Continuing, Mr. Best stated: "The more optimistic advertising men look for definite improvement within August or September. The conservative attitude sees a general revival of activity and some what longer delayed, perhaps until December."

"Automobile production is one line which shows a marked increase for August, following the temporary shut-down of many plants during a part of July and the largely reduced output of the first half year. Ford has rehired over 100,000 men already. The motor factories are well established as a main cog of the general industrial machine, and a speeding up there will stimulate the steel and other important industries, as would also a return to more normal construction activity such as is hoped for with the coming of fall."

"Expectations of a speedy resumption of general production rest largely upon the much reduced inventory stocks of manufactured goods revealed in many lines by the mid-year stock taking. This is taken to mean that the accumulations resulting from last year's production excesses have been largely worked out of the business organism."

Mr. Best then brings up another point—the National Association of Credit Men says in a recent bulletin: "Inventories are low in all lines of business. Buying for replenishment of stocks must begin soon. We have managed to get through the storm with no conspicuous failures and no serious damage to our machinery of production and distribution."

VALLEY-SILETZ RAILWAY HEARING SET FOR SEPT. 4

PORTLAND, Aug. 14.—An interstate commerce commission examiner will arrive here September 4 to conduct hearings on petitions of the Oregon Electric and Southern Pacific railroads, 40-mile lumber line extending from Independence to the Coast Range summit at Valselt.

The Oregon Electric, last April, announced it had contracted with Cobbs and Mitchell company, owners, to buy the Valley and Siletz, and planned to connect it by constructing a 25-mile link with the Oregon Electric at Oryville station. Application was made to the interstate commerce commission.

The Valley and Siletz for nearly two decades has been a spur line from the Southern Pacific line through the connection at Independence and the Southern Electric opposed the Oregon Electric extension.

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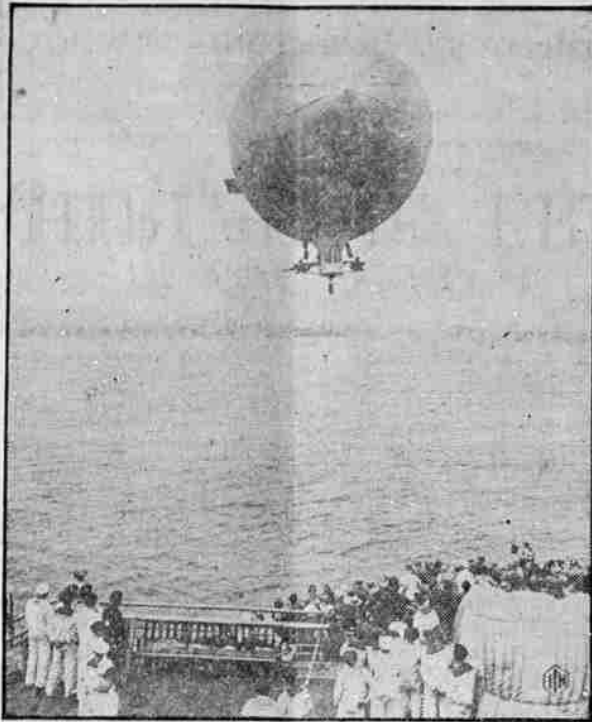
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SOURDOUGHS WILL PICNIC ON AUG. 17

BROOKLYN RALLIES AND GETS REVENGE ON CHICAGO CUBS

As long as the Brooklyn Robins can keep on slugging the ball, the collapse of their pennant hopes, which has been rumored every time they have lost more than one or two games in a row, seems unlikely. Supporters of their rivals, principally the Chicago Cubs, were beginning to celebrate the Brooklyn downfall after the Robins had lost five straight games and had dropped the opener of the current "crucial" series as Chicago won its sixth straight.

But the Robins slugging reappeared yesterday and showed that there still is plenty of life in the Flatbush team. A game behind and apparently headed for a worse position, the Robins overcame all their ills in a virtual tie for the lead. Today the Cub margin is only two points instead of the hoped for two games as the result of the 15 to 5 beating inflicted by Brooklyn yesterday.

The Cubs made 16 blows, one of them back Wilson's 40th home run, but with little effect.

It took a homer by Fred Lindstrom with Criz on base in the tenth to give the Giants a 7 to 6 victory over Cincinnati.

The Grates came from behind to win their fourth straight, 8 to 4, from Philadelphia.

Mackmen Keep Winning

The three American league leaders failed to produce any change in their standing. Philadelphia, Washington and New York all coming out ahead of their western rivals. The champion Athletics made it three straight over Cleveland with a 7 to 2 score as George Earnshaw won his 15th victory of the year.

Washington's Senators piled up an early lead of five runs off their old mate, Garland Braxton, then kept the Chicago White Sox from turning their 14 hits into runs to win by a 7 to 4 count. The New York Yankees put on a similar performance, scoring enough runs in the first five frames to offset a sudden weakness on the part of George Pipgras and defeat Detroit, 10 to 5.

Down at the bottom of the standing, the St. Louis Browns reversed the previous day's decision, beating the Boston Red Sox, 7 to 2, and gaining a tie in games with Chicago for sixth place. Goose Goslin again took the day's honors, driving in four runs with a homer and two singles.

WAR 'HERO' POSE WINS GIRL, BUT HE ENDS BEHIND BARS

DETROIT, Aug. 13.—Benjamin Lee couldn't win his girl's love with his resplendent theatre ushers' uniform, so he bought some medals, won the girl, and today he is in jail as a bogus hero.

Dined and honored by Detroit veterans' organizations as one of Michigan's war heroes, Benjamin, a theatre usher, appeared wearing the croix de guerre, the Victoria cross, the distinguished service cross and the congressional medal of honor. He told lurid stories of his part in the war.

Some of the veterans became suspicious. They figured out Benjamin was about 12 years old when the war started.

Department of justice agents questioned Benjamin and he confessed that his tales of heroism were designed to win the love of the girl who now is his wife. He said he purchased the medals from veterans who were "short of cash"—and that after his marriage his wife carried on the tales of heroism until the affair got out of his control.

REMODELING OF ANTLERS STARTS; COST NEAR \$10,000

The task of remodeling the Antlers theatre building to afford Roseburg a beautiful and thoroughly modern showhouse, has been started under the direction of J. D. Young, Portland architect, designer of the Portland theatre, the new Lakeview theatre and many other motion picture houses of the Pacific northwest.

The entire interior of the local theatre is to be changed, and considerable alteration will be made to the front. The entrances are to be enlarged, providing a large central entrance and two exits.

A large foyer will be provided, with two stairways, one at each end, leading to the balcony. The stairways will open on a mezzanine lounge, where rest rooms will be provided and the theatre office located.

The seats downstairs are to be rearranged, with an aisle down each side and an aisle in the center, and will be set in a curved arrangement.

The balcony is to be reconstructed, and two rows of boxes will be provided in front.

The stage is to be cut back 10 feet in depth which will give space for 100 additional chairs on the lower floor.

A complete new heating and ventilating system is also to be installed, and the building will be completely redecorated.

The work is being done under the supervision of the architect, and local labor and materials are to be used, it is stated, as far as possible. Shows will be continued most of the time while the alterations are in progress. The cost of improvement is to be in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

CHARLES GALE NOT GRAVELY INJURED

Charles Gale, 19-year-old son of G. A. Gale of this city, who was injured yesterday at "ston" in a fall from a horse, is not as seriously hurt as was first reported, according to his father, who returned this morning from Eugene where he visited his son yesterday evening. Miss Ingalls, who took her flying training at Lambert-St. Louis field, is one of the fourteen women in the country holding a transport pilot's license. Within two hours after being awarded the transport pilot's license, she had broken the women's record for consecutive loops.

Last May at Muskogee, Okla., Miss Ingalls broke her own loop record with 980 consecutive loops.
