PROHIBITION NOT ISSUE, FESS SAYS

CLEVELAND, Aug. 14.—Despite the recent strong showing of several anti-prohibition candidates for high public office, Senator Simeon D. Fess, chairman of the national republican committee, said today the republican party does not recognize prohibition as an issue.

"I do not believe the prohibition question will be an issue in the fall campaign in Ohio or anywhere else. Prohibition is not a party issue unless both parties force it, and the republican party does not recognize it as an issue," Senator Fess said.

PLANE USED FOR RIDING PLAINS OF WILD HORSES

VALE, Ore., Aug. 14.—The airplane, king of the air, has come to conquer the wild horse, king of the Owyhee plains.

Archie Myers, wild horse wrangler and master of a score of riders, has brought in a plane to spot the bands of wild horses which his riders are rounding up for chicken feed.

The animals are herded into corrals by a half dozen outfits co-operating with the federal and state governments to rid the plains of the wild mustangs which have become infected with a contagious disease. Myers has found an air-

plane can spot the bands of horses in a few minutes, where they might hide from riders for days. The result is more bands are being rounded up.

Several thousand have been taken off the plains at the junction of Idaho, Nevada and Oregon, where it is estimated more than 10,000 horses are running wild. Most of the animals are worthless.
