HELEN WILLS MOODY—INCARNATE YOUTH

When Helen Wills Moody arrived from Europe the other day, it was not a newly won tennis cup that she carried. Tall and lithe, as she came on deck preparatory to disembarking, she had in her hand a worn wooden box. All over it were smudges of paint, and as she stood there with the breeze blowing through the willow wisps of golden-brown hair, she looked more like a returning art student than the champion woman tennis player of the world. She was proud of some of her sketches than of her victories on the courts, and she prized a painting that Augustus John had made of her more than she did the cups she had won.

Indeed I am quite certain that she is more interested in art than she is in tennis, but she sees certain similarities in the two. It is the motion, the swiftness, the glory of sunshine, the smell of the out of doors that appeal to her in the game in which she has won international fame, and it is the appeal that these same things have for her that makes her want to paint. In appearance she is typical of the outdoor woman. About her is that air of youth that Lindbergh also has.

She posed for me at the Junior League. As I entered her large living room with its Colonial furniture and its Venetian blinds drawn to keep out the sunshine, she was sitting on a great sofa beside a window. The light behind her cast her face in shadow and she looked for all the world like one of those paintings that Benson used to hang in American girls in their homes—S. J. Woolf in The New York Times, July 27, 1929.

To us she's always Helen Wills. The girl who gives so many thrills. She seems herself a sunshine ray That glorifies a common day. Indeed, she seems, to tell the truth, The incarnated soul of youth; Quintessence she of God's outdoors—Where'er she is the sunlight pours.

As Lindbergh in his flying joy Reveals to us the glorious boy, So Helen with her conquering whirl Is evermore our dashing girl. They are to us like Merlin's gleam—Fulfillment of our love's dream. They are to us the soul of dawn; In them our youth still carries on.

When lucky Moody won her heart, It gave us all a jealous start. We feared 'twould rob the tennis court; We're glad she's found so fine a port. For Helen is an artist now And to her new-found art we bow. The racket's changed to painting brush; We're sobered in expectant hush.

We wish our Helen great success. And, over all, sweet happiness. We'd grieve to hear the racket's knell, But if she'll wield the brush as well, Her reputation is assured; We'll praise the day when she was lured To challenge fate with colored paints; We'll crown her among the artist saints.

ENDURANCE PLANE REACHES 605 HOURS

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 15.—The endurance plane Greater St. Louis rounded out 605 hours this afternoon and started its twenty-sixth day of sustained flight today above Lambert-St. Louis field. The plane has set a goal of 1000 hours.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 15.—Eddie Schneider, young Westfield, N. J., flier, who is attempting to establish a junior trans-continental air record, arrived at Norton field here this afternoon from Altoona, Pa.

Schneider was forced down by fog and rain at Water Street, Pa., yesterday.

R-100 Makes Slow Time LONDON, Aug. 15.—The air ministry this morning reported the position of the R-100, British dirigible enroute to England from Montreal about 1,555 miles from Montreal and 1,732 miles from Cardington, the ship's home.

In the six hours since the last preceding report the dirigible's speed had been cut by a cross-wind from the north in excess of 60 miles per hour to about 32 miles per hour, and its average cut to about 55 miles per hour.

Should the dirigible not gain in speed over the remaining part of the journey her arrival at Cardington, which had been expected at dawn Saturday, probably will be delayed.

Newspaper representatives aboard the dirigible, seeking to be helpful, got themselves "in Dutch" with the ship's officers. They volunteered to pump petrol to the engines; in some fashion a dump valve had been left open and an air officer demanded to know what they meant by pumping petrol into the sea. Luckily the mistake was quickly discovered and only a few gallons of the precious fuel was lost.
