

LYLE AND FORMER AIDES PICTURED TO JURY AS GRAFTERS

Collusion With Wet Ring
Alleged by Attorney
in His Opening
Statement.

(Associated Press Local Wire)
SEATTLE, Aug. 15.—The evidence by which the government hoped to send Roy C. Lyle and four of his former assistants in prohibition enforcement in the Pacific northwest to the penitentiary to join rum runners with whom they are charged with conspiring, was outlined in federal court here yesterday by United States Attorney Anthony Savage. Listing five major liquor conspiracies prosecuted by the government since 1924, Savage said the government would show that while the prohibition agents were ostensibly enforcing the law they were "hand in glove" with the very people they were supposed to be prosecuting.

During several years, Savage said, the indicted dry heads asked and received bribes from rum runners, delayed trials and permitted the defendants to operate their illicit business in the meantime and delayed trial of appeals for the same purpose. Later the government counsel charged, the prohibition officials "knocked over" many of the members of the rum ring to destroy their credibility as witnesses.

One by one Savage brought in the names of the five defendants: Lyle, former prohibition administrator of the northwest; William M. Whitney, his chief assistant; Earl Corwin, chief field agent; R. L. Bryant, former agent and deputy sheriff; and C. T. McKinney, former assistant United States attorney, who prosecuted many of the liquor cases.

Olmsted Central Figure
Savage began his story of the operations of the alleged conspiracy between rum running rings and the federal officers by describing the status of the liquor organization headed by Roy Olmsted, former Seattle police lieutenant in June 1924.

"This ring," Savage said, operated 15 or 16 speedboats and scows, landing their liquor at select landing places and storing it in caches. At that time, he said, R. L. Bryant and a man named Behneman, demanded \$10,000 from Olmsted for silence in regard to operation of the ring.

The gubernatorial campaign of Thomas P. Revelle then came in for mention.

Slush Fund Aided
Savage asserted Clifford T. McKinney arranged a meeting with Olmsted and told him of the federal case being worked up against him and suggested he had better take out "federal insurance."

Olmsted was induced to contribute \$10,000 to the campaign of Revelle, the money being given to McKinney by Mark Fleming, Olmsted then turned down Bryant and Behneman.

Regular payments of money and liquor were made by Olmsted to McKinney until the famous Olmsted trial in 1926, Savage said.

One of the evils of the Olmsted trial, he said, Bryant came to Olmsted and offered him a copy of the telephone conversations, the government had overheard over tapped wires. Thus, Savage said, the backbone of the government's case against Olmsted was revealed to him before the opening of his trial.

Charles P. Moriarty, chief counsel, left his seat to object that the government was trying to show that Bryant was obstructing justice and that he was on trial now on conspiracy charges.

The judge overruled the objection, remarking that the government was entitled to "wide liberties in making its opening statement."

LEGISLATION FOR LEGION AID TOLD TO OREGON VETS

Hospitals Should Rise in
Advance of Needs, Says
Bodenhamer; Flag
Respect Urged.

BAKER, Ore., Aug. 15.—The splendid achievements of the American Legion in legislation in behalf of the disabled, and in the Legion's program of service this year, were due in a large measure to early support which the record membership gave the organization last fall and winter, O. L. Bodenhamer, national commander, said here last night. He spoke at the annual convention of the department of Oregon.

"The first legislative proposal of the American Legion was enacted into law during the closing days of December, 1929," he said. "This was the Rogers hospital bill which authorized an appropriation of more than fifteen million dollars for hospital construction, thus providing for the building of some forty-five hundred beds. Never before in the history of soldier legislation has a measure of such importance been pushed to such a prompt conclusion at the beginning of a legislative session."

Wants Preparedness
The national commander announced the Legion's policy regarding future hospital construction, as follows:

"In view of the unfair neglect of the disabled and in view of the fact that it is poor economy for the government to wait until an acute situation confronts it, the Legion favors a hospital policy which contemplates a government agency to anticipate the need, and to provide facilities at any future date, as in 1925, 1940 or 1945 in order that a man can get just and fair care in time, perhaps, to give him a fighting chance for recovery."

Patriotism Stressed
Announcement was made in the address of a fall activity of the Legion in the promotion of education and patriotism.

"Education and patriotism," he said, "go hand in hand, and our

"Closing dates for applications was fixed as January 2, 1930, and there remained 462,000 veterans who, for one reason or other, had failed to make application," the commander said. "The Legion sought to extend the time and on June 5, the Hawley bill was put into law extending the time to January 2, 1935."
