Cloth and Fur Combined in New Winter Coats

PARIS—Coats of fur will frequently have bits of cloth or, if you prefer, cloth coats will be largely made of fur next winter.

At least so Paris shows them in advance winter styles, stressing fur and cloth combinations for afternoon coats. The favored furs for coats are short haired with soft, gullback, broadtail, baby lamb and genuine dyed grass, well to the fore. They are combined with black, dark blue and some dark green.

Dyed ermine is employed for the Ritzier form of fur coats for formal afternoon wear. Ermine of pearl gray also trims some of the cloth coats, figuring in generous upstanding collars and fore-sleeves or fur.

For town wear Paris shows short fur jackets made on straight lines or fitted in at the waistline with saucy pelumas reaching just to the top of the hips. The short jackets are sealskin, dyed moleskin or garden variety lapin.

The fur borel is an accepted adjunct of the fur coat for next winter.

A favored form is a semi-fitted cape pulled down at the back and crossed from the back to the side front with two tones of narrow grosgrain ribbon.
