ENDURANCE PLANE REACHES 628 HOURS; NO QUITTING SIGN

(Associated Press Special Wire)

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 16.—A demonstration of the stamina it still retains after nearly four weeks of continuous flight was given today by the endurance monoplane Greater St. Louis, which had shattered through 628 hours at 11:11 a. m. (C.S.T.).

Forest O'Brien, out after a 1,000 hour record, put the plane through a long low sweep over Lambert-St. Louis field to drop a note today and the rapidly with which it climbed back into the sky was convincing to the ground crew the motor's endurance was keeping pace with that of the flier.

The former refueling endurance record of approximately 554 hours, set by the Hunter brothers, was left three full days behind as Jackson and O'Brien started the twenty-seventh day in their grid.

The \$100 an hour earnings of the airmen which started when they broke the record Wednesday, ended today with the extent of further financial rewards uncertain. An oil company had agreed to pay the fliers \$100 an hour for the first seventy hours after breaking the record. The only other funds received thus far in rewards was \$1,800 for four contracts.
