

SLAIN GANGSTER'S RECORDS INVOLVE MANY NOTABLES

(Associated Press Special Wire)
CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—The trail that Jack Zuta left behind was followed down new alleyways today. Patrick Roche, chief investigator for the state's attorney, who with Charles F. Rathbun, special assistant state's attorney, found the slain gangster's deposit boxes, said important developments were expected. Zuta, business director of the northside gang of George Moran and the Aiello brothers, was slain at Delafield, Wis., two weeks ago as he fed nickels into a mechanical music player.

"We are following the trail of Zuta's dollars and there is no telling where it will lead," Roche said. "A lot of men will be leaving town soon."

Roche today turned the investigation to a \$500 campaign contribution to the "regular" republican organization as shown on the accounts of Zuta, slain several weeks ago.

Another item found in Zuta's possessions was a membership card in the William Hale Thompson republican club, signed by "Homer K. Galpin, chairman."

In Zuta's balance sheet, items of \$80,000.00 and \$22,775.00 were shown paid as "dividends" to "M. K." Roche said he has established "M. K." identity as Matt Kolb, ward politician.

Among the names already made public by Roche in the investigation of Zuta's papers are those of Municipal Judge Joseph Schulman, former Judge Emmanuel Eller and Attorney Louis I. Fisher. These names were found on checks in Zuta's boxes.

Former Judge Emmanuel Eller, to whom a check for \$250 was drawn, signed by Zuta, told authorities the money probably came from a friend as a campaign fund gift but he denied knowing Zuta. Eller said a number of his friends raised campaign money for him, the source of which he did not know.

CHIMPANZEE PUTS THRILLS IN BERLIN

BERLIN, Aug. 18.—A chimpanzee at large kept Berlin excited for 24 hours. God up traffic in a subway for half an hour and finally was captured in a church pulpit after an exciting chase along an electric rail line.

SHIPMENT OF GREEN PRUNES STARTS SOON

Shipment of green prunes from Roseburg vicinity will start this week, according to Fred Hamilton, local manager for Hurst-Root company. A number of growers have begun picking and the first car will probably leave the middle of the week, Mr. Hamilton states. It is expected that there will be about twelve carloads shipped this season.

In normal seasons Umpqua valley growers do not ship green prunes, but hold their fruit for drying, but due to the poor market conditions this year, many growers, particularly those with small crops, are preparing to ship their fruit green, rather than hold it for drying.
