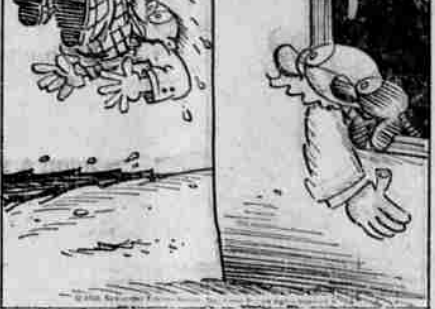

W. E. SWIFT, SON OF PACKER, SUICIDES

(Associated Press Special Wire) NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Police were trying today to determine how and where William E. Swift, son of Louis F. Swift, Chicago packer, obtained the pistol with which he ended his life in a Park avenue sanitarium Saturday night. Dr. Thomas A. Gonzales, deputy chief medical examiner, sought to learn whether Swift had taken narcotics or liquor.

Mrs. Helen Morton Bayley Swift, the widow, is in Johns Hopkins hospital, Baltimore. Hospital officials said they would make efforts to keep news of the suicide from reaching her.

Mrs. Swift is the former Helen Morton, daughter of Mark Morton, salt magnate. She is the mother of a five-year-old son. Her first husband was Roger Bayley Swift was 35 years old.

Detectives said Swift had been permitted to roam about the sanitarium at will and leave it for long periods during which he could obtain anything he wished.

Swift died in the sanitarium of Dr. Edwards S. Cowles where he had been a patient eight months. He shot himself in bed while a male nurse was in the room, police learned.

Police said a few minutes before Swift shot himself, he had attempted to hurl himself out of a window of his room.

TODAY'S MARKETS

PORTLAND, Aug. 18.—The butter market opened firm today following a fair Saturday trade when supplies were considered moderate. The fruit and vegetable situation was unchanged with seasonal products moving in large quantities. Tillamook cheese was quoted at higher, triplets at 29c and local at 21c. Tomato shipments from the Dales were greatly curtailed, and the recent over-supply has entirely disappeared. Tomato prices are a shade stronger, up to 60-65c per 10-lb. box. Yakima potatoes are in rather light supply, and are in good demand from all parts of the northwest. Portland prices on Yakima goods advanced to \$2.30 per cwt. to retailers. Initial Dillard, Oregon, cantaloupe movement has been postponed, to about August 22. Several carloads of labish onions have been dug, and are now drying preparatory for shipment in another week or so. Wool Prices Hold. BOSTON, Aug. 18.—The Commercial Bulletin of Boston will say tomorrow: "While two or three houses report fairly good business, as this past week, there is little doubt that the demand for wool has tapered off more or less on the whole. Prices, however, remain firm and favor the finer sorts, descriptions still. Foreign markets are firm though quiet and somewhat unsettled. Temporarily, by reason of strikes or financial difficulties. Midsummer dullness prevails in the Atlantic as well as here. The piece goods markets respond slowly to the new opening, clearly the buying disposition of a market. "Wool is still slow, with price bid September and the opening of agencies is expected to reveal local demand here and abroad. ROGER WILLIAMS STILL LEADS

Arthur O. Williams, Jr., of East Providence, R. I., was chosen today by Thomas A. Edison from among the "brightest boys" from every state to receive the inventor's second annual college scholarship.

Arthur was selected as having made the best answers to questions propounded yesterday in a written examination taken by the boys at the Edison laboratories. The selection was made last night by Mr. Edison and an advisory committee, including Henry Ford and Harvey S. Firestone, which had helped him to prepare the questions.

The Rhode Island boy's victory means he will receive a four-year technological and scientific course in any college or university he selects. Young Williams is a freckle-faced youngster of 17, a direct descendant of Roger Williams, settler of Rhode Island. His father is chief clerk of the Providence Gas company. Arthur graduated from East Providence high school in June, and was valedictorian of his class.

For several summers, he said, he had been working to save money with which to attend college. He says he will go to Massachusetts Tech at Cambridge, where Wilbur Huston, last year's winner, is a student. Williams will specialize in physics. From Associated Press story, Providence, R.
