DEMOCRATS BLOCK RELIEF, GUIDE OF G. O. P. DECLARES

Business Would Be Injured by Republican Ouster From Congress, Is Lucas' View.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—Taking office yesterday as executive director of the republican national committee, Robert H. Lucas, of Kentucky, issued a statement charging democratic leaders with blocking administration business and unemployment relief to preserve depression as a campaign issue.

"The democratic leaders," he said, "put their party in direct opposition to every effort made by the nation's chief executive and his administration to restore business and provide employment for all the people. Having selected the moral misfortune of the nation—the suffering of the unemployed—as a campaign issue for 1930, the democratic leaders could not lend their support to any corrective measures without depriving their party of a battle cry for the campaign."

"And the country has continued to suffer—business is slow to recover—workers walk the streets looking for work while the democratic strategists confer and consult and issue statements, all the while fearing an improvement in business before the election. They hold the fallacious idea that things will just remain as they are until election day, the democrats will secure control of congress."

Quack Vs. Physician

The Lucas statement—the opening gun of the republican national organization's participation in the fall election campaign—compared the democratic party to a "quack" and republican organization to the "old family physician."

The new director charged the democrats with having waged a campaign of misrepresentation and confusing propaganda.

"That campaign has had a demoralizing effect upon business," he said. "That misrepresentation has made its impression. That propaganda has taken hold. It is well there is yet time to get the truth to the people. . . ."

Sees Peril in Change

"The country is facing a crisis. We are in the midst of a temporary but serious depression. If, by reason of this situation the democratic party—traditionally known as the 'free trade party' and 'the party of unrestricted immigration'—should gain control of the legislative branch of the federal government, what chance would there be for a restoration of normal business? Elect a democratic congress in 1930 and this country will not see normal business again for some years to come."

Lucas said he believed voters would elect a republican congress to support President Hoover.

HAGERSTOWN, Md., Aug. 18.—Rainbow, brook and brown trout, some of the most elusive quarry known to the angler, eat out of the hands of Miss Mary Cushman. She is caretaker of the trout ponds near Clear Spring, maintained by the state conservation department.

By the hundreds they follow her as she walks on the edge of the ponds. The older ones, which wouldn't snuff a baited hook, actually let her lift them out of the water.

The trout, 13,000 of them, got that way from Miss Cushman's habit of feeding them. She tosses mixtures of beef liver and beef hearts to them, every now and then enticing the holder ones to nibble from her hand.

"I never fished with a hook in my life, and I don't expect to begin now," she said.

GIANTS CROWDING CUBS AND ROBINS FOR LEAGUE LEAD

Late Winning Streak Makes Them Real Contenders; Tigers Put Check on Senators.

Noted for their strong finishes, the New York Giants have climbed in the National league pennant race.

The Giants were a half game behind the second place Brooklyn Robins and only three games behind the league leading Chicago Cubs after Saturday's games. The Giants won 22 out of 32 games in the last month.

They extended their straight winning streak to five games in the first half of yesterday's twin bill by pounding Wild Bill Hallahan of the Cards and three successors for 17 hits and a 12 to 4 victory. Burleigh Grimes turned the tables in the second game and the Cards won 14 to 4.

Cubs and Robins Win

Chicago and Brooklyn turned in single victories to gain a half game on the Giants and continue their race 23 games apart. The Cubs had difficulty with the humble Phillies but took advantage of their one opportunity when Earl Collier developed a streak of wildness in the eighth. The Cubs then scored two runs to win, 5 to 1. The loss of Charley Grimm, injured Saturday, did not prove serious as Lester Bell filled in for three hits in three times at bat and drove in two runs.

The Robins played a home game against Pittsburgh and sent out Dazzy Vance to entertain the flat-bush fans. He fanned nine and hurled an eight-hit shutout. The score was 5 to 0.

The Boston Braves supplied Cincinnati's fans with enough thrills for a week's series in a double headed between the two clubs buried deep in the second division. The Braves barely edged out a 4 to 3 victory in the first game, then won 13 innings in the nightcap to win, 9 to 8, as 37 players, eleven of them pitchers, strove for a victory.

Tigers Trim Senators

Washington's attempt to overhaul the Philadelphia Athletics in the American league pennant chase was halted yesterday after the Senators had taken six straight games. Detroit's Tigers staged an uprising in the first two innings and scored eleven runs to win by a 15 to 1 count.

Babe Ruth and Charley Ruffing gave the New York Yankees a ten inning victory over the Chicago White Sox, 8 to 7, in the first half of a double bill, but the Sox came back behind Red Faber's pitching to win, 6-1, in a second game which was stopped by rain after five innings. Ruth closed his 14th home run in the seventh inning to tie the score, then made the winning run in the tenth on Ruffing's pinch single.

With the Athletics and St. Louis idle, Cleveland made the day's only important American league gain and remained in fourth place 93 games behind the Yankees. The Indians won both games from the Boston Red Sox with a pair of effective pitching feints, 9 to 3 and 2 to 0 counts.

San Francisco and Portland split their double header at San Francisco yesterday, the Seals winning 14 to 9 in the morning, and the Ducks coming from behind in the afternoon to overcome a three-run lead and walk off with a 5 to 4 victory. It was a four to three series win for the Seals.

Oakland came up to take both games from the San Francisco Mission the first 3 to 2, and the second, 4 to 2. Pete Daglia allowed the Reds only five hits in the afternoon game. Their two wins yesterday gave the Oaks the series, four to three.

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
