BEACH ROAD AT BANDON GRADED

BANDON, Aug. 20.—Grading of the beach road from Bandon, along the bluff overlooking the ocean, and connecting with the Roosevelt highway, two miles south of town, is being undertaken this week. At present the road is impassable due to the loose sand. An effort is being made to secure an appropriation from the county court to surface the road, but no definite action has been taken. At present it is impossible to reach the golf course over the beach road, necessitating the use of a detour from the Roosevelt highway. The loop road along the beach is one of the scenic drives in the Bandon district, and will draw much travel from the highway when put in good condition.

HAYHURST VALLEY RESIDENT 28 YEARS TAKEN BY DEATH

(News-Review Douglas County Special) YONCALLA, Aug. 20.—Willis Willard Love was born near Springfield, Ill., Nov. 22, 1860 and passed away at the Pacific Christian hospital, Eugene, August 13, aged 69 years, 8 months and 22 days. He came to Oregon in 1898. He was united in marriage at Roseburg in 1902 to Miss Alice Miller, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. James Miller. Rev. Miller was a pioneer circuit rider for the Methodist church. To this union was born three children: One daughter, Esther, passed away Sept. 1909. Mrs. Rachel Williams, a daughter, Elmer Love, a son, survive him. One brother, J. C. Love, and one sister, Mrs. Myrtle Bragg, of Littleton, Colorado, also survive him. His wife passed away May 19, 1919. A grandson, Willard Arthur Williams also survives him.

Mr. Love was employed by the late John Wise and Robert Long on farms prior to his marriage. He resided in the Hayhurst valley for the last 28 years.

Mr. Love had been in poor health for some time. He was stricken with paralysis about two months ago, which culminated in his death. Funeral services were held in the M. E. church, Yoncalla, Saturday afternoon, Rev. Finley of Drain, and Rev. Clark of Yoncalla having charge of the service. Mrs. May Daugherty and Mrs. Ruth Edes furnished the music. FISHING VESSEL RESCUED BY COAST GUARD AT BANDON

BANDON, Aug. 20.—The U. S. coast guard crew at Bandon was called out Sunday to rescue a fishing vessel stranded on the reef north of Rogue river. The boat had exhausted its fuel and drifted helplessly on the reef, where it was in danger of being battered to pieces. The coast guard cutter had some difficulty in making the trip, due to a stoppage in the gas line, but after repairs were made, hurried to the relief of the stranded boat and succeeded in towing it to Port Orford. The fishing vessel was from Eureka. The coast guard crew returned Monday after 24 hours at sea.
