GIANTS CLIMB INTO SECOND PLACE IN NATIONAL LEAGUE

Coming Battle With Cubs Regarded as Crucial; Blaholder Shuts Out Mackmen.

Due to the efforts of a pair of clutch which are not even making a pretense of getting into the super-heated National League pennant struggle, the three contenders for the flag have found themselves in a more uncertain position with the prospect the coming series between the Chicago Cubs and New York Giants will be the really crucial one of the season.

The Giants have taken second place in the standing and have placed themselves within striking distance of the league leading Cubs, only three games behind.

Leaders Break Even While the Giants were taking a close struggle from the St. Louis Cardinals, 4 to 2, Pittsburgh showed Brooklyn's Robins into third place with an 8 to 0 triumph while the humble Phillies kept the league leaders from making any sort of a gain in a double header.

The Phillies took the first game by a 9 to 8 count despite the efforts of Hack Wilson, who eluded his 43rd home run to tie the National League record set last year by Chuck Klein and of Hartnett and Blair, who also hit homers. The tall ends then battled the Cubs to a standstill in 16 innings of play which wound up in a 6-6 tie. Phil Collins hurled the entire game and was deprived of a victory when Lester Bell hit a homer with two on base in the eighth inning.

The Giants gained their triumph by some timely hitting in the second inning which produced three runs, Pitcher Carl Hubbell driving in two of them. With nothing much at stake, Fred Frankhouse turned in another nice job of hurling to give the Boston Braves a 4 to 0 victory over Cincinnati.

Ruffing, Blaholder Star The American league's hurlers had a thoroughly enjoyable day with the single exception of those who work for Boston. The red stockinged moundmen failed to stop the Cleveland batters, the Indians winning by scores of 7 to 2 and 7 to 3.

Earl Whitehill ran his string to eleven straight to give Detroit a 2 to 1 victory over Washington. Charley Ruffing of New York made another kind of a mark by pitching his third two-hit game since he joined the New York Yankees. His victims this time

A CALL TO HOME AND MOTHERHOOD

A CLARION CALL TO WOMEN to return to the home is sounded by Mrs. Thomas A. Edison, wife of the inventor; but a Modern Portia, successful at the bar, asks, "Where is the home we are to return to?" Woman—to put it broadly—has dropped the needle for the law, books of recipes for Blackstone, the rolling-pin for reportorial work, and, exclusively for man, has all but adopted his dress.

But she hasn't yet given up being a mother. And even loud advocates of woman's right to enter the trades and professions say that romance is not dead.

But Mrs. Edison is alarmed at the outlook. In a radio talk broadcast from Station WJZ, New York, recently, she said that the art of homemaking has declined so much in recent years, because of trends originating in woman suffrage and the World war, that the country is facing a situation of widespread restlessness.

Men no longer find satisfaction in their homes, she said, and "unless the women of America make a decided effort to return to the business of homemaking, the most vital institution in the country is threatened. America is essentially a nation of homes. The woman who doesn't want to make a home is undermining our nation."

Mrs. Edison admitted that the aversion to housekeeping is due to the drudgery of it, but she said, "every business and every thing in life is 25 per cent drudgery."

As a matter of fact, Mrs. Edison asserted, a good home-maker must have executive ability and be a good purchasing agent, an economist, something of a chemist to supervise the diet of her family, and a gracious hostess. She also should be versed in music, art, and literature to have a proper background, and to be able to entertain herself, her husband, and her friends.

"Deep down in her heart," believes Mrs. Edison, "every woman wants a home, and most women want children."—The Literary Digest, August 2, 1930.

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WIDOW SAYS ATTIC LOVER MURDERED

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20.—Mrs. Walburga Oesterreich, charged with the murder of her wealthy husband, Fred C. Oesterreich, wealthy Milwaukee, Wis., garment manufacturer, yesterday accused Otto Sunhuber, husband of Oesterreich's first husband, of slaying her husband.

Shaking and hysterical, Mrs. Oesterreich denied conspiring with Sunhuber to slay her husband. Under cross-examination she asserted she always loved him, even while she harbored Sunhuber in her attic.

Admitting she told a false story of the slaying when she first was arrested in 1923, Mrs. Oesterreich said she never had told anybody the true story before "because I didn't want to expose my life to the world; having Otto in the house."

Mrs. Oesterreich testified Sunhuber locked her in a closet and told her to blame the shooting on burglars.

Sunhuber was tried for the slaying and was convicted of manslaughter but went free under the statute of limitations. He admitted the shooting following his arrest out dated it at his trial.
