CAMP CONTENTMENT, Upper North Umpqua river, Aug. 16, 1930. —Yesterday was my birthday. No! I am not telling anyone how many years have passed into Never-Never Land! They have been many—or few—just as one chooses to look at it! But I never fail to thank the Creator of all things for the privilege that is mine of continuing on for yet awhile, and of enjoying that most interesting thing known as "life"—particularly when a portion of each year of it is spent on my beloved North Umpqua! Next year my father will also be with us, and it seems long to wait until the time shall come when I shall have the joy of seeing him look into himself a steelhead—for the dad is as splendid a fly fisherman as ever took rod in hand, and he has wet fly all over the world.

Sunday, the 10th, was the birthday of Supervisor Harpham. True to his promise to me, he came up on Saturday. He and Mrs. Harpham dined at Camp Contentment that night, and on Sunday morning I took him on the river for his first try for steelhead! Naturally I was highly elated, and felt signally honored! His own tackle belt for pan fish only, I outfitted him with one of my own Cross rods—a 6 oz. creation of the rod maker's art. That, a light-tapered line, one of good old Joe Welsh excellent leaders and a Plack Done No. 8... and he was ready! I took him to one of my best spots—at a distance down river... told him what to do and how to do it, and then sat me down to watch! On the 5th cast... came the dear familiar "amash" through the crystal clear water—a flash of metallic blue just under the surface... the scream of the reel—and the fight was on! I only had to make a suggestion to "The Chief" once! He handled that hard-fighting fish as would a veteran and after a splendid battle... landed it! Just 7 1/2 lbs! Lower down the river he took another, 5 1/2 lbs. And just after that lost a third! But he was happy as a boy just out of school and I thoroughly reflected his pleasure! That noon Ranger and Mrs. Fred Adam gave a most charming dinner for Mr. and Mrs. Harpham and Mr. and Mrs. Burroughs—to which the Motts were also guests—and indeed it was a delightful affair—the only trouble being that there were too many good things to eat!

From the point of view of sport... I have been having a very splendid time and more than loathe the thought that in some weeks I shall have to lie me southward there to again mingle in the Motts' o' Men and Thins—dreaming the while of next June—when we shall again be in camp at this lovely place—through the courtesy of Supervisor Harpham. Zeke, of course, will be with us! He, too, has had great sport with the steelhead this summer, and handles a fly with efficiency and precision. Our little family of wild things—all very tame!—play about the tents in perfect confidence. Zeke's tame trout "are" nearly big enough to take a fly—or so he avers! Kingfishers shrill along the river (the confounded fish thieves! Next year I shall bring a 2 1/2 automatic and start in to make this part of the river "safe for small fish"!); a pair of bitterns have taken to swooping down with the duck and sitting as graven grey statues on rocks just across from camp. ter was secured and temporary relief given. The Deschutes county municipal improvement district, known as the Tumalo, is another that is in danger. "The government could give permanent relief by acquiring the rights of the power company to the waters of the Deschutes river and storing the winter flow in the Crane Prairie reservoir," says the letter to the governor. "This will hold, at the present time, about 45,000 acre feet of water, and by building up the dam could be made to hold 90,000 to 100,000 acre feet, which would provide sufficient storage for both the Arnold and the Lone Pine (Crook county) improvement district No. 1 districts, additional water for the Tumalo project, and some additional water for the central Oregon irrigation district, which, though short of water, has not as yet suffered to any extent."

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STATE GAME BODY DECLARED IN "RED"

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PORTLAND, Aug. 20.—J. E. Cullison, state game commissioner from Multnomah county, said an official investigation of the commission books, made by him in conjunction with the head bookkeeper, had disclosed the commission was facing a financial deficit instead of a surplus.

Cullison said Harold Clifford, ousted state game warden, testified at his hearing, the department would show a surplus at the end of August.

"I discovered a deficit of \$4000 with August bills amounting to about \$38,000 yet to be met. August receipts will run between \$15,000 and \$20,000," he said, "but that will be far below the obligations facing the commission."

Cullison said he "wouldn't be surprised to see the deficit extend anywhere between \$25,000 and \$50,000."

Clifford testified, Cullison said, at the hearing that he had pulled the game commission "out of the mud."

FIGHTS LAST NIGHT

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20.—Smashing his way to a ten round victory here last night over Midget Wolgast, recognized in New York and Pennsylvania as boxing's flyweight champion, Newshy Brown, veteran Los Angeles puncher, today had added himself to the list of those who have defeated champions without annexing their crowns.

The bout was an overweight affair, Brown being required to come in over 112. He weighed 113 1/2 pounds and Wolgast 110 1/2.
