CANADA PUTS BAN ON IMPORTED DOORS

OTTAWA, Aug. 21.—The dominion government has taken action to stop the sending of large quantities of fir doors into Canada, acting Prime Minister Perley said today. An order-in-council has been passed fixing at a "reasonable price" the customs valuation of such imports "in order to preserve the home market and give Canadian workmen a fair and equal opportunity of producing such doors."
