

SILVERTON LOSES TO LONG BEACH IN LEGION BASEBALL

Three Bagger in Eleventh
Inning Decides Game;
Enderlin Triumphs
Over Denver.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 22.—Boys' baseball teams from the far west, middle west and south clash today in the semi-final round of the American Legion junior baseball regional championship.

New Orleans plays Salina, Kans., in one game. These teams drew byes for the first round. Enderlin, N. D., and Long Beach, Cal., meet in the other game.

Enderlin advanced yesterday by defeating Denver 5 to 3 and Long Beach put Silverton, Ore., out of the running after a hard fought eleven inning contest, 6 to 5.

Winners of today's games will meet tomorrow for the title. The winner of tomorrow's game goes to Memphis, Tenn., to play in the junior world series for the national championship.

Game Goes 11 Innings
A hard-driven triple into deep right field with the bases loaded proved the undoing of the Silverton, Ore., nine and the Long Beach, Cal., aggregation advanced to the semi-finals of the all-western American Legion junior baseball tournament by virtue of the three runs scored by that triple, winning an 11-inning struggle from the Oregonians, 6 to 3. Morrow, Long Beach third mucker, who had not hit safely up to that time, turned the trick that eliminated the hard-fighting boys from the northwest.

Silverton lost a chance to win the game in the regulation nine innings when Solorsen, Long Beach left fielder, made a sensational one-handed catch of Schwab's long drive, retreating the side with the bases loaded.

Schwab pitched masterly baseball for the losers, striking out ten men and allowing only nine hits over the 11 innings, keeping them well scattered throughout until the 11th. Hibbard, Silverton shortstop, belted out three singles and a double in five times up to that time, batters in the turn-out to date. Kitchen also hit a two-bagger, his only safety.

Hollywood, still leading the league, lost to Oakland, 9 to 8, as the Oaks in the ninth inning staged a three run rally to nose out the Stars. Previously in the game, the Oaks threw away a four-run lead.

As a result of Oakland's victory that club is tied for fourth place with the San Francisco Missions, who lost last night to the Sacramento Senators by a 6 to 4 score.

Los Angeles, yet in second place, was drubbed unmercifully by the Portland Ducks, 11 to 5. Seattle broke its losing streak to win from San Francisco, 8 to 5. Paul Zahner limited the Seals to eight hits, tossing a slow one that had the Seals swarming before the ball reached the plate. This is the first win of the series for the Indians, who for the past two weeks have been on the losing end.

DAIRYMEN, MILK DISTRIBUTORS TO OPERATE IN UNITY

Dairymen and milk distributors agreed to cooperate to the fullest possible extent, as a result of their meeting at the Roseburg city hall last night, called by the Douglas County Dairymen's association.

A report of the committee composed of Fred A. Goff, Harlan Moore and Ernest Unrath, indicated that the price of milk being paid producers by the retail distributors at Roseburg, was the average of that paid in Eugene, Grants Pass, Medford and other nearby cities.

Some sentiment seemed to favor paying for milk on a butterfat basis, and it is within the range of possibility that an acceptable plan will be worked out, for future use.

Due to the fact that feed costs are but little lower than a year ago, with prospects of advances in the near future because of the extreme drought in many of the principal farming sections, no reduction in the retail price of milk was decided on at the present time.

Dr. George Nicholas, county veterinarian, reported on the disease control work, stressing the importance of maintaining clean herds.

According to Dr. Nicholas, 37 herds of dairy cows have been tested for contagious abortion and but 4 reactors found. Almost 8000 cows have been tested for tuberculosis without a single reactor.

Douglas county is expected to be an accredited free area by December of this year, with reference to tuberculosis.

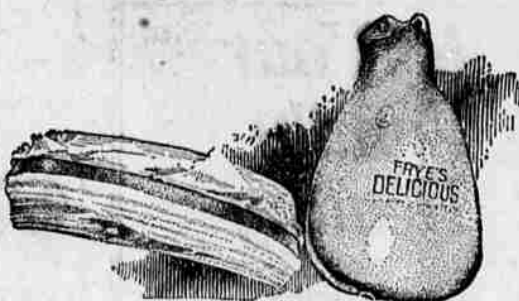

GIANTS STAGING HARD DRIVE FOR LEAGUE PENNANT

Defeat Cubs in First Game
of Series, Recording
22nd Victory in
30 Contests.

The New York Giants have served notice they intend to win the pennant. Yesterday they opened a series with the Chicago Cubs by trouncing the 1929 champions and 1930 leaders by a 13 to 6 score to put themselves only two games behind first place.

The Giants started hitting in the first inning and at the same time the Cubs began to make errors and New York got off to a lead of six runs.

Wally Roettger cloaked a home run with two on to make it six runs. Blake settled down after this bad start and held his own against Walker until the eighth. The victory brought New York's record up to 22 victories in the 30 games of the last month while in the same time the Cubs have won 16 games and lost eleven. The Giants must win all of the remaining three contests of the series to leave Chicago at the head of the league.

The third place Brooklyn Robins gained on Chicago and lost ground to New York as rain kept them idle in Cincinnati. The Boston-Pittsburgh game also was postponed while the St. Louis Cardinals slipped a 16 to 6 defeat on the Phillies.

Athletics, Senators Win

The Philadelphia Athletics moved a step nearer the certainty of victory in the American league pennant race by coming from behind to defeat the Detroit Tigers, 8 to 7. Held to one hit in six innings by George Uhle, the A's broke loose in the last three frames to score all their runs.

Washington kept pace with the leaders by taking a quick 5 to 2 decision over the St. Louis Browns as Sad Sam Jones allowed only six hits in a duel with Collins. But the New York Yankees lost one more of their faint hopes as the Cleveland Indians pulled a 6 to 5 triumph out of a twelve inning struggle. A Yankee error with two out in the ninth paved the way for the defeat and a home run by Dick Porter settled the overtime dispute.

The humble Boston Red Sox staged a three-run upsurge in the eighth inning of a mound duel between Al Thomas and Hod Lisenbee to defeat Chicago, 4 to 2, and keep the White Sox from breaking their sixth place tie with St. Louis. Five

Boston errors kept Lisenbee trailing for the first seven frames although he gave Chicago only four hits.

HEALTH BULLETIN

The Baby's Growth
(State Board of Health)
Every mother should know a little about the normal growth of a child. A child that is healthy should show approximately the following progress: On the first or second day the child's eyes should be sensitive to light. At the end of the second week he should be interested in bright objects. He should begin to hear on the fourth day and should discriminate sounds in three or four weeks. At the end of the first week he shows some sensibility to taste. During the first week he should enjoy nursing and bathing and should notice objects. At the same time he should display discomfort from cold, hunger, and too tight clothing. He should smile at the end of the third week.

The eyes do not coordinate during the first month, but the reflexes are active and the child should sleep the greater part of the time. During the second month the eyes begin to coordinate, he notices voices and sounds and turns his head toward them, is startled by loud voices, and seems to enjoy musical sounds. He laughs when tickled and clasps objects with four fingers.

During the third month the accommodation of the eyes improves and he shows pleasure at the sight of his parents or nurse. The thumb begins to act in conjunction with the fingers.

During the fifth month he takes pleasure in crushing papers, pulling hair, ringing a bell. He stretches out his arms for objects

and seizes and carries them to his mouth.

In the sixth month he raises himself to a sitting position. During the seventh month he sighs, imitates movements of the head and averts his head as a sign of refusal. During the eighth month he shows astonishment at new sounds and sights and moves his hands more accurately in obtaining something.

In the ninth month he stands on his feet with support. In the tenth month he sits up without support for long periods. In the eleventh month he stands without support and stamps his foot. In the twelfth month he moves about and creeps.

In the thirteenth month he shakes his head in denial, begins to say "papa" and "mama" and understands spoken words. He walks with support in the fourteenth month and without support in the fifteenth month. From the sixteenth to the twenty-fourth month he runs, associates words with objects and will generally do things he is told to do.

From two to four years he climbs stairs without assistance.
