

OLMSTED ASSERTS HE PAID WHITNEY FOR PROTECTION

First Contribution of Rum Ring Went to W. C. T. U., Ex-Bootlegger Says at Lyle's Trial.

SEATTLE, Aug. 22.—The first contribution of the Olmsted rum ring for Roy C. Lyle, former prohibition administrator, was \$250 for the "dear old ladies of the W. C. T. U." Roy Olmsted, erstwhile liquor king of the Pacific northwest testified at the Lyle-Whitney corruption and bribery trial in federal court here today.

"About a month after we started operating under the protection system, Al (Albert M. Hubbard, Olmsted's protégé, who turned dry agent) told me Whitney asked for a contribution for Lyle because he was being asked for contributions to the W. C. T. U. I thought the demands for funds were growing rather extensively but I told him if it were necessary to satisfy the dear old ladies of the W. C. T. U. I would agree to give him \$250 for Lyle," the ex-rum king testified.

Olmsted succeeded Hubbard on the stand as a government witness late yesterday and picked up the thread of his story that the five former prohibition officials on trial had entered into a protection system with rum runners. The five defendants are: Lyle, William M. Whitney, his assistant, Earl Corwin and Richard Bryant, agents, and C. T. Whitney, former assistant U. S. attorney.

Briberies Recited
Before leaving the stand yesterday, Olmsted had told of giving Hubbard \$500 and a radio with which to bribe Whitney to "let a bootlegger off easy."

"About that time Hubbard told me that Whitney had called him in and accused him of working with me," Olmsted testified today. "Hubbard told me he had admitted that to Whitney. Hubbard said Whitney had told him that he had not always been a prohibition agent and that Whitney had nothing in particular against me."

Olmsted said he and Hubbard had talked over the matter of making a protection agreement and decided to go into it. He said Hubbard told him his contributions to Whitney could be disguised as legal fees for work Whitney was doing for Hubbard in civil suits over the latter's radio enterprises.

Protection Bought
Olmsted said he was suspicious at first that Whitney was having a run for him but that about the middle of March or first of April 1925, he decided to work definitely under a protection system.

"About this time Al told me it was necessary to take in Corwin because he had charge of the agents. Hubbard told me Corwin wanted a radio. I told Al I did not think Corwin was worth more than \$200 or \$300 a month. I also told him to give Corwin the radio, which he said he did and also a \$100 bill," said Olmsted.

Olmsted then told of the contribution to Lyle for the W. C. T. U.

"From this time on Hubbard was almost in the capacity of my private secretary. He always knew all about my operations, supervised the upkeep of the boats, settled up with the customers and paid off the help," he then said.

Olmsted said Hubbard told him about making payments to "Earl, Bill and Lyle."

"Did he tell you how they felt about it?"

"Yes, he said they felt real good about it. He said Whitney even asked about my personal welfare and said he hoped I was getting along all right."

Olmsted said he had kept a record of the amount paid federal officials from time to time, but had not saved it because "it is not good ethics in the bootlegging business."

WHALE, SHOT, HAS BAY IN TURMOIL

SHELTON, Wash., Aug. 22.—A 45-foot whale, mortally wounded in shallow water of a log pond, was thrashing about in the head of the bay here today, keeping boats of all sizes tied up at their docks. The whale dragged a raft of logs, to which it had been hauled, into the bay.

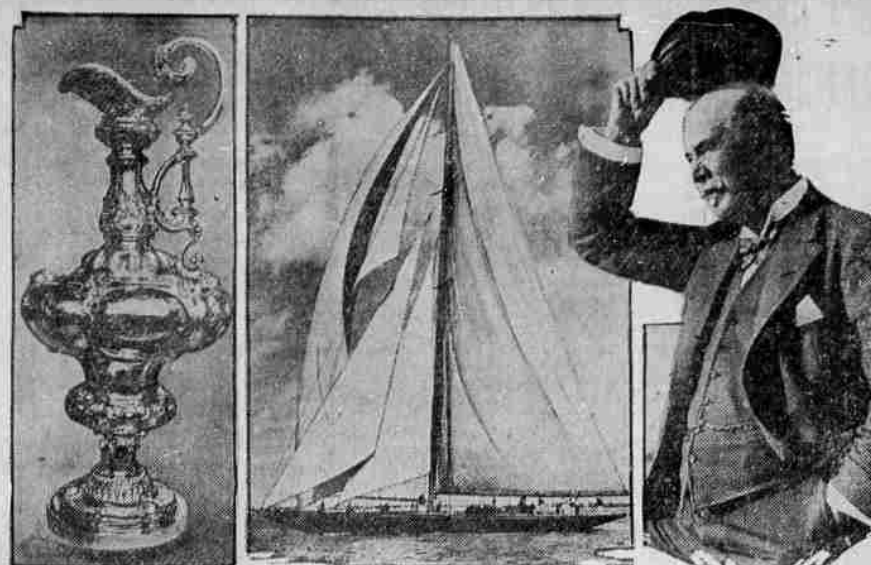

McNARY ASKS HASTE IN SCHOOL PLANS

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22.—Senator McNary today telegraphed to his office in Washington the request that Commissioner of Indian Affairs Rhodes be urged to hasten plans and specifications for the new \$6,000 dormitory for the Salem Indian training school at Chewawalla.

The appropriation was approved by the last session, and Senator McNary got an amendment into the bill making the money immediately available so that the foundation of the building could be laid before winter rains begin. No start has been made because of delay in sending the plans to the superintendent of the school.

TEA MAGNATE ARRIVES WITH NEW HOPES OF LIFTING THE CUP



THE CHALLENGE CUP SHAMROCK V. SIR THOMAS LIPTON

NEW LONDON, Conn., Aug. 22.—Although the race for the famous America's cup will not take place for some time—September 13 is the exact date—public interest in the international sporting event is already astonishingly high. Usually when a sporting event captures wide public attention, there is a dynamic or lovable personality connected with the event. Sir Thomas Lipton, owner of the challenging craft, Shamrock V, is the magnet that is drawing the public eye in this instance.

During the past thirty years, the smiling Sir Thomas has spent millions of dollars and endless time in attempts to lift the cherished cup. Four trim yachts of his have already gone down to defeat before superior Yankee boats.

Genial Sportsman
But Sir Thomas never has lost his genial smile, his desire to achieve his lifelong ambition nor his sportsmanlike attitude. "I'll be back," he says each time, "but this time I'll win."

Though he is seventy-nine years old, Lipton has no intention of making this race his last. If Shamrock V meets the fate of her four predecessors, he declares, he'll come back again, back to win.

"The present Shamrock, honestly, is the best yacht I have ever had," he told newspapermen. "The Americans have always beaten me fairly and squarely, but I hope to turn the table with the best boat and the best efforts of the crew."

"The old mug has been in one place too long. I think a change of air would be good for its health."

The Shamrock V, crossed the ocean under its own sail. A coast guard cutter accompanied it up Long Island sound to New London. After being refitted, she will be sailed to Newport, R. I., until the day of the great race.

Shamrock is just an inch and a half short of 120 feet long, has a sail area of 7,500 square feet and displaces 134 tons of water. The sloop was launched on April 14 and christened by the Countess of Shaftesbury.

Rise to Fame
Sir Thomas was born in Glasgow, Scotland, of poor, industrious parents. While he was a boy his father entered the marketing business on a small scale and young Thomas ran errands and did general work about Lipton, Sr.'s tiny shop.

He was only eleven when he

built his first boat—a toy vessel. Like the fabulously expensive yachts he now launches whenever he craves another opportunity to lift the America's cup it was named Shamrock.

After Lipton embarked in business for himself his rise in the world was rapid. Starting with a capital of a few hundred dollars, Lipton opened his own grocery in Glasgow. Speedily this single store grew into a chain.

World's Tea King
Later Lipton went into the tea business and today the beverage that bears his name is sold all over the world. Lipton has offices and agencies in almost every civilized country and he is counted among the wealthiest men in England.

As he grew older, Lipton's interest in the sport of yachting increased. His intimates say that he would rather lift the America's cup than obtain a monopoly of all the tea in the Orient.

America has held the prized trophy now since 1851. Yacht experts declare the present Shamrock has an excellent chance of beating any of the four Yankee yachts, now racing for the honor of meeting her in the banner international event of the season.

SUED FOR DIVORCE, MAN SLAYS WIFE, COMMITS SUICIDE

SHELTON, Wash., Aug. 22.—John Doyle, 55, mill worker, shot and killed his wife, Mary, 50, at their home near here today, and committed suicide by firing the rifle in his mouth.

Only yesterday he had been ordered by court to keep away from the Doyle home, while her suit for divorce was pending and had spent the night elsewhere. Returning today, he found her in the back yard and shot twice in the back, killing her almost instantly.

Four children, five to 12 years old, survive them. Doyle had several married children by two previous marriages.

except that of repeal or amendment of those laws.

"However, I wholeheartedly concur with my party's expressed adherence to the principle of majority rule. Therefore, I heartily approve my party's declaration that it will be responsible to the expression on referendum questions. I shall, as senator, accept such a majority expression as a mandate from the people whom I shall represent."

Would Obey Mandate

"If a majority in Illinois is recorded as favorable to the repeal of the 18th amendment (at the referendum next November) I stand ready when elected senator to obey their mandate and I shall vote to submit the question of its repeal to the several states."

"If the expressed will of the people is for modification of the Volstead act, my course as a member of the senate would be in sympathy with the principles so approved, but the definite course to be pursued would be dependent, of course, upon the nature of the modification demanded."

"It is impossible for any candidate honestly to agree in advance to a blanket endorsement of modification proposals."

Stands for Enforcement
"I also wish to make it clear that until the constitutional amendment is repealed or until the Volstead act is repealed, or amended, I stand squarely for enforcement of both these measures."

"As a public officer I have no choice and no privilege of discretion as to whether a law shall or shall not be enforced. As an individual and as a citizen not bound by any oath, I still would stand for enforcement of all our laws and of all the articles of the constitution. I am in favor of enforcement."
