Mrs. Caroline Bealman, well known Douglas county pioneer, celebrated her 93rd birthday at her home five miles east of Canyonville, August 19th.

In the fall of 1862, Mrs. Bealman, with a party of seven, including her two brothers, John and Adam Weaver, left their home near Dover, Tuscarawas county, Ohio, going to Ottumwa, Iowa, where they spent the winter and prepared for their trip across the plains. Starting in the spring of 1863 they joined a company of two hundred others westward bound at Omaha on their long journey to Oregon, arriving at Canyonville in the fall of 1863.

Mrs. Bealman lived for five years with her brother, John Weaver, on his farm, now known as the date prune orchard. She was married to Chas. Bealman November 8, 1868, moving after their marriage to Canyonville where they made their home for over twenty-two years. In 1891 they moved to their ranch five miles east of Canyonville, where Mrs. Bealman now makes her home with her two daughters, Mrs. Henry and Mrs. Chas. DeWald. Mr. Bealman passed away in 1911.
