

10-MILE MARATHON SWIM CAPTURED BY MARGARET RAVIOR

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 23.—Margaret Ravior, 23-year-old Philadelphia girl, who turned professional to compete in the women's 10-mile marathon swim of the Canadian national exhibition, was \$5,000 the richer thereby today.

While other favorites found the pace too swift and dropped out, the Philadelphia youngster, a virtual unknown in marathon swimming, found chilly Lake Ontario to her liking yesterday and splashed her way to victory by nearly three minutes over Mrs. Ruth Tower Coran of Toronto, runner-up a year ago to Martha Norellus Wright. Miss Ravior's victory earned for her first prize money of \$5,000 while \$2,500 went to Mrs. Coran, a former Denver resident.

Ethel McGarry of New York, who like Miss Ravior, turned pro to compete in the event, set the pace for eight miles only to collapse with victory in sight. Miss Ravior then took the lead and never relinquished it.

Third place and \$1,000 went to Ethel Hurtle Gary of New York. Other prize winners were: Fourth, May Looney, Warren, O., \$500; fifth, Anna Priller Bonoff, Miami, Fla., \$500; sixth, Irene Yurack, Elmhurst, N. Y., \$250.

Only three others of the starting field of 32 finished the course. Olive Gatterdam of Toronto, formerly of Seattle, was seventh; Joan Ford of England, eighth, and Lillie Dibble, Toronto, ninth.

Miss Looney's feat in finishing fourth attracted attention. She strained the tendons of her left leg on the first lap of the race and then covered the remaining nine miles with a one-leg beat. When she climbed out of the water at the finish the leg was so badly swollen it required medical attention.

Miss Ravior's time was 5:31:39.75.

POWDER-PUFF DERBY STILL IN PROGRESS

WICHITA, Kas., Aug. 23.—Gladys O'Donnell was the first of the women national air derbyists to take off here on the hop to Kansas City, the next overnight stopping point. She left at 2:31:30. The other fliers left at minute intervals.

Marjorie Dolg was second to take off. She was followed by Joan La Rene, Ruth Stewart, Mildred Morgan and Ruth Barron in that order. The distance to Kansas City by air is 178 miles. Yesterday Miss O'Donnell flew the 103 miles from Enid to Wichita in 37 minutes. The fliers are enroute to the air races at Chicago.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 23.—Eddie Schneider, 18-year-old Jersey City aviator, who is attempting to establish a new west to east transcontinental air record, put his plane down at Port Columbus here this afternoon. He had hopped off from Wichita, Kan.

REVOLT FLAMES IN SOUTHERN PERU

LIMA, Peru, Aug. 23.—A serious military revolt in southern Peru today threatened administration of President Augusto B. Leguia.

The garrison at Arequipa, third city of the republic, was the heart of the movement. Revolting under leadership of officers the garrison arrested the civil and military chiefs of the department and today was in complete control.

The government was said officially to be taking appropriate steps. There were reports that involved sending of a fleet to Molendo, port nearby to Arequipa, and in moving aircraft against city itself.

The newspaper La Prensa, official organ of the government, said today all was quiet in the departments of Cuzco and Puno, which are north of Arequipa.

Garrisons in those departments remained loyal, the paper added, and the inhabitants believed that the coup of Sanchez Cerro in Arequipa was a fiasco.

ATTORNEY DIES OF ROBBER'S BULLET

PORTLAND, Aug. 23.—Charles Y. Wigfall, 35, Portland attorney, was dead today, the victim of bullet wounds inflicted by a robber who attacked Wigfall after the attorney granted his request for a ride. Police are hunting his assailant on meager clues.

A revolver was found in the brush near the scene of the shooting.

Wigfall was returning from an amusement park when he was accosted by the stranger. Climbing into Wigfall's automobile the stranger asked the attorney the time. As Wigfall pulled forth his watch the robber seized it and in the struggle Wigfall was shot. He died in a hospital.

Wigfall was a graduate of Yale and Columbia universities. His parents live at Orlando, Fla.

MACOMB, Ill., Aug. 23.—Mrs. Buelah McConnell Wagle, whose body was reported identified today in Omaha, is the center of a mystery which has stirred central Illinois for a decade.

Married to Henry "Kelly" Wagle in 1919, the couple left on a honeymoon from which only the husband returned.

DOUGLAS COUNTY FOREST MEMORIAL TO F. A. ELLIOTT

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 23.—The Millicoma tract of timber land in Douglas county, Oregon's first state forest, will become a memorial to the late Francis A. Elliott, state forester who died a few months ago after nearly 20 years in office. The tract of 70,000 acres will be known as "Elliott State Forest," so designated at a meeting of the state board of forestry in Portland yesterday. The tract is south of the Umpqua river between Scottsburg and Reedport.

It was in 1912 that Elliott and Governor West started a move to exchange isolated tracts of school lands within national forests for solid blocks of national forest land. The Millicoma tract was the first result of this movement, the exchange being completed about two years ago.

KAYE DON HURT IN IRISH SPEED EVENT

BELFAST, Ireland, Aug. 23.—Kaye Don, one of Great Britain's noted motor racers, suffered a broken rib and his mechanic was seriously injured when their car overturned and caught fire in the 410 mile Ulster tourist trophy race of the Royal Automobile club today.

The British driver, who only a few months ago went to America in an attempt to establish a new world's speed record, narrowly escaped death in the crash.

Another accident marred the race over the circuits of thirty laps, when Captain A. C. R. Waite received a severe concussion as his car mounted a bank and overturned.

Thirty-six cars started in the event, driven by experts from Germany, Great Britain and Italy.

Italy won the trophy and had six of her most famous racers in the event.

"Red" Plot Nipped
NANKING, Aug. 23.—Accusing communists of seeking to undermine the government, garrison soldiers today arrested 130 additional reds in city-wide raids. Many communist "cells" were smashed and huge quantities of propaganda seized.

Nationalist authorities were stirred to action by discovery yesterday of dynamite and other explosives in the asserted plot of reds to destroy government buildings. Twenty communists were arrested then to prevent disturbances within the capital.

state has been turned to a consideration of the value of its water resources. This sentiment will probably crystallize and take definite form by the time the regular session of the legislature convenes in 1931. In the meantime, due to the magnitude of the applications and the number, and the state engineer's duty to make complete investigations before approval of such applications in order that the public welfare may be protected, I wish to assure the people of Oregon that no permits for large power development will be issued until after complete investigation and until after the next regular session of the legislature.

Norblad Commended
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 23.—Governor Norblad has received a copy of a resolution adopted by the city council at Gold Hill, Jackson county, commending him for his letter to the state engineer insisting on public hearings before the engineer passes on applications by private interests for water power permits.

"We believe the attitude of the California-Oregon Power company to municipal power development in southern Oregon is of a vicious character and the water power falling into their hands is a severe blow to the development of this sort of the state," says the resolution.

The resolution "protests against the issue of any appropriations of water for the development of electrical power to the private power companies of Oregon until
