CHARIOT RACE ADDS UNEXPECTED THRILL AT SUTHERLIN SHOW

The two-day rodeo at Sutherlin ended yesterday evening after two very successful shows. There was a large crowd present for Sunday's events, and plenty of excitement was furnished, particularly when four horses in the chariot race became frightened and ran away. The drivers were thrown from the cart and the four horses leaped the race track fence, dragging the chariot after them. They ran to the highway, where they fell. One of the horses broke loose and ran all the way into town and stopped at the stable. The others were captured by the riders, who gave chase when the accident occurred. The backing program was particularly good and several of the riders took hard falls from the hurricane deck of their mounts.

The rodeo was sponsored by the Sutherlin volunteer fire department.

Twenty-seven head of horses were attached, following the performance yesterday, on claims from Oregon City. The attachment was served Saturday, but it was agreed to allow the rodeo to go on and the horses were not taken into custody by the sheriff until yesterday evening.

PERUVIAN REBELS CAPTURE AMERICAN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—The American embassy at Lima, Peru, advised the state department today that Captain Harold B. Grow of the American naval mission to Peru was captured by revolutionists at Camana on the morning of August 24.

Grow, resigned from active status in the navy two years ago to accept an appointment as director general of Peruvian air forces. Although working with the United States naval mission to Peru he was not attached to it because of his civilian status.

The embassy is seeking assurance of his safety, communicating through informal channels with the revolutionists.

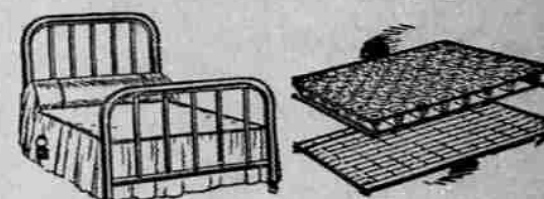
