

TAYLOR'S STEAL HOME FROM THIRD BASE BEATS N. Y.

Thrilling Feat Puts Cubs
in Lead by Five Games;
Senators Cut Down
Mackmen's Lead.

By his brilliant work as substitute for "Old Hoss" Rieger Stephenson, young Danny Taylor has just about won himself a regular place in the Chicago Cubs outfield. Taylor, who finished the Cubs' triumph over Brooklyn a week ago by driving in the winning run in the final game, did the same thing in a more sensational fashion and put Chicago five full games ahead in the National league pennant struggle with a 3 to 2 triumph.

Taylor stole home in the ninth inning when the score was tied, the bases full, two men out and two strikes on the batter.
The Cubs' triumph with a bit of rain in Brooklyn which gave the badly worn Robins a day of rest, added a few more complications to the National league struggle for all the leaders except the Cubs. The Giants dropped a half game, remaining only 1 1/2 games ahead of Brooklyn while the fourth place St. Louis Cardinals placed themselves only one game behind the Robins by winning a double header from the Phillies, 9 to 4 and 6 to 4.

In the clash between two of the league's promising winning streaks at Cincinnati, the Pittsburgh Pirates extended their series of triumphs to seven games by defeating the Reds in the first game, 5 to 6, as Ray Kremer's vicious stopper Cincinnati, Ray Kolo had the better of a duel with Steve Sestakovic by a 2 to 0 count, each making five hits.

Senators Beat Mackmen
Opening their new series against the eastern clubs of the American league, Washington trounced Philadelphia, 7 to 3, and reduced the leader's margin to 7 games.
The New York Yankees fell for the third time in three games as they divided a hard-fought double header with the Cleveland Indians. The Yanks won the first game, 5 to 2, in eleven innings. Wes Ferrell hurled his 22nd victory for the Indians and his eleventh in succession in the second game, allowing the Yanks only six hits for a 4 to 2 triumph.

The St. Louis Browns checked Earl Whitfield's series of pitching successes at eleven when they pounded him for 13 hits in eight innings and defeated Detroit, 7 to 5.
The Chicago White Sox split a pair of pitchers' battles with the Boston Red Sox. Boston won the first game, 2 to 0 on Milton Gaston's three-hit hurling but Chicago gained a 5 to 4 victory in the eleventh inning second clash as Pat Caraway outpitched Eddie Durham.

CANYONVILLE FAIR PRONOUNCED BEST EVER HELD THERE

Agriculture, Livestock and
Home Exhibits Reveal
Progress Made in
Industries.

The biggest and best-attended community fair ever held in southern Douglas county was presented at Canyonville Saturday. All of the agricultural districts in the southern portion of the county were well represented, and made fine showings in the excellent displays that featured the fair.

The exhibits, with the exception of the club display, were placed in the Henninger building, where ample room was afforded for an attractive arrangement of the products.

The fruit, vegetable and grain displays were placed along one side of the building, on shelves and counters, where they could be easily inspected. The exhibits were conclusive evidence of the unequalled agricultural resources claimed by Douglas county.

Across one end of the large room was a beautiful showing of flowers, which attracted much attention.

The center and opposite side of the room were occupied by the canning, cooking, needlework and art displays, which were particularly good, and brought much comment and praise.
Progress Attested
The livestock and poultry exhibits were placed in the large barn immediately behind the Henninger building, where ample room and suitable quarters were provided for the stock, and animals exhibited were sufficient proof of the progressive manner in which the southern part of the county is going ahead with its development of its great livestock industry.

Interesting displays were also made by the forest service, W. C. T. U., Douglas County Flour mills and the Roseburg Motor company. In the case building, just across the street, was a wonderful showing of the 4-H club work, rivaling in interest the display of products exhibited by adults. Handwork, cooking, canning and crop displays were tastefully arranged, and gave evidence of much training, skill and hard work on the part of the youngsters participating in the worthwhile activities of the 4-H club.

The fair was most successful in every respect, and much credit is due the committee in charge of arrangements. The committee was composed of H. B. Green, general chairman; Margaret E. Fenn, secretary; H. P. Nichols, livestock chairman; Fred Pernehorn, poultry chairman; J. A. Fenn, grain chairman; Ed Saulesbury, vegetable chairman; J. R. Parker, club work chairman; Mrs. C. P. Swartz, Mrs. R. L. Couglar, entertainment, and Mrs. John Ferguson and Gladys Wilson, domestic science and art. Each of these officers had valuable assistance from many volunteer workers, which wholehearted cooperation between the various communities comprising the district was fully demonstrated by the fine displays that were shown.

The medicine man has no definite idea as to his exact age. It was fixed at 135 years by an informal Arapahoe board of appraisers guided by the ancient's first knowledge of various tribal wars and tilts with the whites.
