LABOR APPEALS TO HOOVER FOR HELP

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 28.—A resolution asking President Hoover to call a special session of congress to appropriate \$1,000,000,000 for public construction as a means of relieving unemployment was adopted unanimously by the New York Federation of Labor in annual convention here today.

The convention previously had rejected by a vote of 400 to 57 a resolution putting the state federation on record as favoring a third political party sponsored by organized labor.

SHARKEY SIGNS FOR THREE RING BOUTS

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—A contract between Jack Sharkey, Boston heavyweight, and Victorio Campolo, South American, providing for a 15-round bout at the Yankee stadium September 25, has been signed.

Another contract signed requires Sharkey, if he conquers Campolo, to meet Young Stribling in Miami in February if the Madison Square Garden corporation can induce Stribling to accept the match. The agreement also obligates Sharkey, if he defeats Stribling, to meet Max Schmeling, world's champion, next June.
