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POSTPONEMENT OF GRAIN RATE SLASH SURPRISES COREY

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 28.—H. H. Corey, member of the public service commission, expressed surprise today when informed of the action of the interstate commerce commission in postponing from October 1 to January 1 the effective date of the grain rate reduction for western territory.

"I did not think the interstate commerce commission would comply with this petition of the carriers," Corey said. "The reason I presume, was that given by the carriers, that the date fixed in the order did not give them enough time to make the extensive changes in schedules for all the territory west of the Mississippi river."

Corey said the postponement would work a hardship on the farmers, since it would prevent the new rates applying to movements of this year's crop to January 1. He was hopeful that further news from Washington today relative to the postponement would reveal qualifications beneficial to the producers.

The Oregon commission protested the postponement. A general revision on grain rates in the west and for exports was prescribed by the commission last July after an investigation lasting more than a year.

The revision was in general a decrease. The investigation was initiated under the Hoch-Smith resolution directing the lowest possible rates be prescribed for farm products consistent with the service rendered by the railroad.

CAPTAIN DIES ON SHIP; CREW SAVED

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Caught by shifting freight, a captain was carried down with his ship in New York harbor last night after a collision with a scow. His crew of 24 was rescued.

The collision between the Clyde-Mallory freighter Neches and the third of a string of scows in tow of a tug occurred in the narrows off Staten island. Coast guard boats and police launches saved all the officers and men but Captain Elmer Estee of the Neches. He was wedged in by a load of pipe on the after deck.

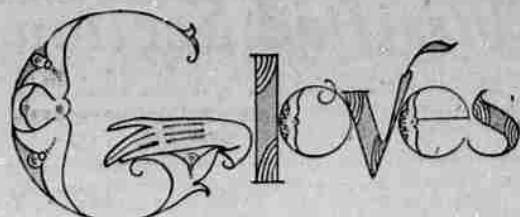
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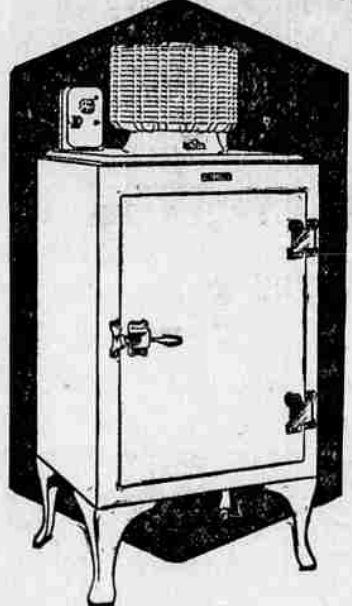
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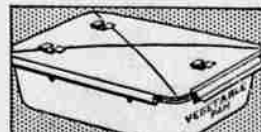
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
