mental to the fish life of said river and its tributaries and will greatly lessen the recreational advantages now afforded by said river and its tributaries.

"AND WHEREAS the construction of such dams, in addition to impairing the recreational advantages of said river and its tributaries, will result in an actual financial loss to the people of the state of Oregon through decreased revenue now derived and to be derived from persons availing themselves of the recreational advantages of said river and its tributaries;

"AND WHEREAS the construction of such dams upon said river will greatly endanger the lives and property of people residing or being thereon;

"NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Oregon State Game Protective association strenuously opposes the granting of any water rights which will, or might, impair the fish life of said North Umpqua river and its tributaries, or which might, in any way, impair or lessen the recreational advantages afforded by said North Umpqua river and its tributaries;

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the state engineer of the state of Oregon be and is hereby earnestly requested to grant no permits for the appropriation of the water of said river and its tributaries for the generation of electrical energy until the adjournment of the next regular session of the legislature of the state of Oregon;

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be forthwith sent to the governor of

Sheriff Jackson was informed that the local officers would be summoned if additional help should be needed. Deputy sheriffs in Roseburg and at several other points were notified by Sheriff Jackson to be prepared to answer any emergency call from Eugene and preparations were made to give any possible assistance to the Lane county officers.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 29.—Superintendent Henry W. Meyers and Warden J. W. Lewis today offered to Lane county the service of guards from the state penitentiary to assist in the search for Ray Sutherland, slayer of Joe Saunders, deputy game warden, and Os-

car Dooley, deputy sheriff, last night.

Dooley, with five bullet holes in his body, was tossed to the side of the road. Sutherland and his son disappeared. Carlile, hearing the shots, found Dooley alive and conscious and rushed him to Eugene to a hospital where he died after midnight.

Led by Sheriff Down, a posse was hastily organized and went to Sutherland's home in Marcola. They found nothing. Returning later with the dogs to get a scent from clothing of the fugitive, they were met at the door where Saunders was instantly killed and the other two officers wounded.
