BUSINESS PHASE OF AVIATION TOLD TO ROTARY CLUB

A most interesting and educational talk on commercial aviation was given yesterday at the luncheon meeting of the Rotary club by David Paville, of the school of business administration of the University of Oregon. Mr. Paville discussed commercial aviation from the standpoint of its relation to business, and the outlook for the use of planes, particularly the established airlines in regular business. He developed the fact that passenger flying is at present rather uncertain, particularly in winter months, although profitable during the summer. He stated that the greatest development may be expected in aerial express. One of the greatest handicaps at present for commercial aviation is fear on the part of prospective customers. He stated, as soon as confidence can be established in the safety of airplanes as a means of transportation, there will doubtless be a big growth in the passenger business.
