BLAZE DESTROYS U. S. BUILDING WITH VALUABLE RECORDS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Reams of government records were destroyed today by fire which swept the temporary structure housing the federal trade commission. The building had been vacated by government workers on half-holiday a short time before. The structure is bordered by several of its kind. All were built during the World war to house government departments. The building was a two-story structure. Except for a thin veneer of rough concrete on the sides, it was built entirely of wood. W. H. Stevens, assistant chief economist of the commission, said that more than two year's work in investigating trade practices in the chain store industry had been lost. Other records lost included some dealing with the commission's inquiry into the power industry. Records of the commission's investigation of the cottonseed industry also were destroyed.
PORTLANDERS HURT IN TRAFFIC WRECK

JEFFERSON, Ore., Aug. 30.—Fred Aston, 792 N. Glen Ave., Portland, and W. H. Berg, 570 N. Prescott, Portland, were severely injured in an automobile wreck on the Pacific highway one mile north of Jefferson at Buchner's corner this morning. The Portland men's car, traveling north, swerved off the paved highway into loose gravel and turned over twice into a ditch when avoiding a large truck that turned without signal into the Talbot road leading west from Buchner's corner. The Portland car was badly damaged. Aston suffered scalp wounds and probable concussion of the brain. He was unconscious for several hours. Berg received a broken collar bone. The truck was not damaged and evidently preceded on its way without knowledge of the accident. Neither the driver nor the truck have been identified.
RUSSIA BANISHES AMERICAN TOILERS

STALINGRAD, Russia, Aug. 30.—Two American mechanics, Lewis and Brown, employed at the Soviet tractor plant here, today were sentenced to deportation for ten years on charges of assaulting an American negro worker named Robinson. The court at first gave a verdict of two years' imprisonment, but "taking into consideration the fact that the defendants are laboring under false racial ideas," the sentence was modified to deportation. The trial, which began several days ago, attracted much attention with newspapers describing the attack on the negro as racial hatred wholly alien to communist doctrine.
FIRM WINS BLUE SKY LAW ACTION
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 30.—The American Bank & Trust company is a trust company and as such is exempt from the provisions of the Blue Sky law and is not required to obtain a permit from the corporation commissioner to sell its own stock. The effect of a decree handed down in circuit court here today by Judge L. H. McMahon in the case of American Trust company against Mark D. McCallister, corporation commissioner. The court holds that the capital stock of the company is not subject to the power, control or jurisdiction of the commissioner.
