

JUSTICE GALEN OF MONTANA FAVORS DRY LAW CHANGE

Candidate for Senatorship Advocates Control of Traffic in Liquor by States.

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 30.—Albert J. Galen, associate justice of the state supreme court, who is candidate for United States senator, told the republican state convention today he was in favor of state control of liquor, to be accomplished by amending the 18th amendment to the federal constitution.

Justice Galen advocated an amendment "revesting in the respective states the right to determine for themselves their attitude toward the sale, manufacture and transportation of intoxicating liquor."

To make effective state jurisdiction he would reserve to the federal government under its interstate powers "the most complete and effective jurisdiction to provide by adequate legislation the prevention, penalization and punishment of an interstate traffic which would lessen the effectiveness of prohibition within any state adopting it."

Justice Galen described the prohibition question as the most perplexing problem of government. He said "neither those who favor national prohibition or those who are satisfied with present conditions."

Declaring he realized "the danger from a political standpoint of venturing an opinion on the subject," the speaker asserted he "would much sooner go down to defeat standing and fighting on principle than to succeed by subterfuge and outlying."

A defense of the tariff law was signed by Congressman Scott Leavitt of Great Falls. He is seeking reelection from the second district. The convention is to adopt a party platform.

Rep. Leavitt explained the new law was not a drastic revision of the old and asserted the present business depression was not attributable to the tariff of new action of the Hoover administration.

The congressman said the depression was the result of world wide conditions with which the administration was endeavoring to cope.

WINCH, MARSTERS HEAD NEW GROUP OF SPORTSMEN

EUGENE, Aug. 30.—At a meeting of the Oregon Game Protective association yesterday a new sportsmen's association was formed, including influential men from Washington, Oregon, California to oppose the power interests and preserve outdoors.

Officers are: Frank Winch, Roseburg, president; A. C. Marsters, Roseburg, secretary; and Bob Kirkwood, Portland, also secretary. Vice presidents are Ralph Cowell, Medford; George H. Nordenholt, Los Angeles; and L. S. Herly, Seattle.

One of the most outstanding developments of the organization the past year is the requirement of membership which must be signed before a man may become a member of the association. Following is the obligation that must be signed. The purpose of the agreement is to identify the true sportsman and eliminate confusion with the hunter. In this way it is hoped that some of the animosity which exists between the landowner and the sportsman may be overcome.

"I solemnly and sincerely promise to observe and obey all game laws and regulations of the United States, of my state, or of any other state wherein I may fish or hunt and to endeavor to secure their observance by others."

"I shall observe and obey all rules of sanitation and fire prevention, both within and without the national forest."

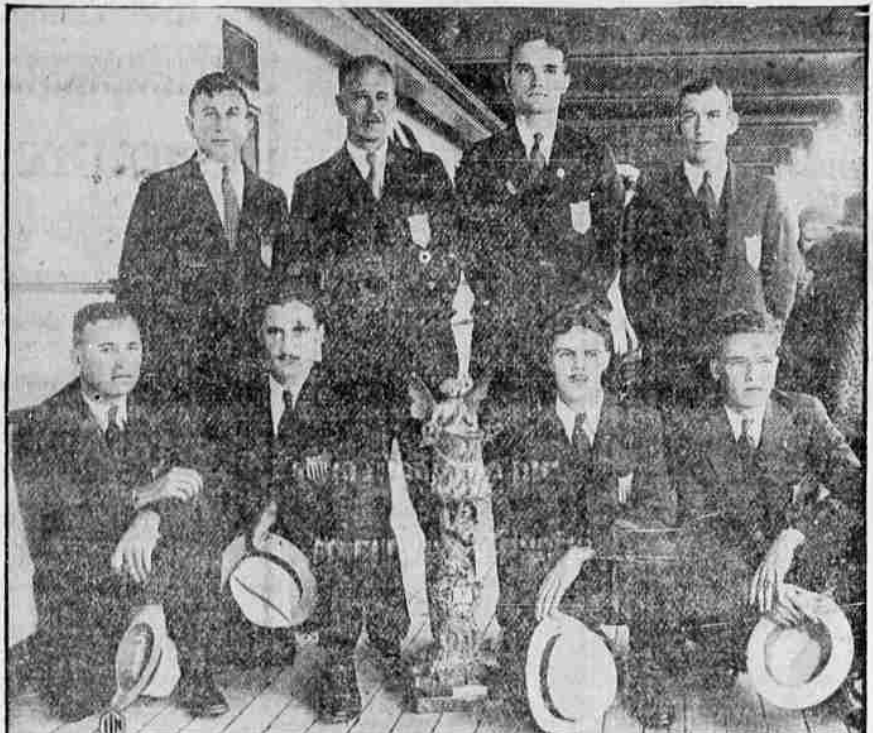

SIX HOP DRIERS TAKEN BY FLAMES

INDEPENDENCE, Ore., Aug. 30.—Six hop driers on the Grover and John Titus hop ranch three miles north of Independence, burned down this morning. The fire which consumed the six buildings also took 100 cords of wood.

The early crop of hops, which had been cured and stored in a nearby warehouse, was saved. The late crop of hops was in the buildings and ready to be taken off Saturday afternoon. The fire had been drawn from the fireplace a day or so ago. Each hop house held about 200 sacks of hops.

Two of the hop driers were practically new, being built last year. The others were in good condition. The cause of the fire, which seemed to start in the center of the group of buildings, was not known here. The buildings and the crop are covered by insurance.

BERRY PEST FROM CALIFORNIA HITS WOODBURN REGION

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 30.—Appearance of the red disease of Himalaya blackberries which they state has been prevalent in California for the past ten years is causing the Woodburn Berry Growers' association to send their secretary, Ray Platt, to California in the next few days and he will be accompanied by a representative of the extension department of the state college.

Woodburn men declared that the disease has swept through the fields of the Woodburn berry growing district doing thousands of dollars worth of damage there that unquestionably is general in blackberry plantings of the valley although not identified until the early part of this week. They assert that Evergreen blackberry growers will find that the immaturity of berries is caused by the red disease which has afflicted California Himalayas and in some mysterious way has transferred itself to the Oregon Evergreens.

In the Woodburn district they declare they expect fully a 35 per cent loss of the crop.

7 OF FAMILY HURT IN AUTO'S CRASH

HOOD RIVER, Aug. 30.—Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Edmunds, their two daughters and three sons, all of Pendleton, were recovering in a hospital here today from injuries received yesterday when their automobile crashed over a 125-foot embankment near Lindsay creek on the Columbia highway.

The family were enroute to Salem when the steering gear of their car locked. Passing motorists took the family to a hospital here. The elder Edmunds suffered a wrenched leg. Mrs. Edmunds a broken nose, one girl a broken collar bone and another concussion of the brain. The boys were bruised and cut.

AVIATOR MACREADY INJURED IN CRASH

CURTIS - REYNOLDS AIRPORT, Chicago, Aug. 30.—Major John A. MacReady, of San Francisco, former famous army aviator, was seriously injured today when his plane crashed during a free-for-all race at the national air races.

MacReady's plane, a special Keith Rider racing ship which he planned to enter in the Thompson trophy race Monday, was demolished. The pilot was taken to the Evanston Hospital. He had cuts about the face, bruises and possible internal injuries.

Physicians said he would live. He was taken from the plane unconscious.

rick that a liquor truck was in the Altus territory. Carter asked Whit to accompany him. On a country road four miles southwest of here they ran onto the truck which was accompanied by a fast coupe acting as a convoy.

Allowing the coupe, in which two men were riding to pass, the officers attempted to halt the truck. Their commands were met with a volley of rifle fire. Both officers returned the fire, but the truck and coupe continued.

Whitt, unconscious, slumped to the ground. Carter crawled to the farm home nearly a quarter of a mile away, called for help and died.

TEXAS WIFE MURDERER ENDS HIS LIFE IN JAIL

AMARILLO, Tex., Aug. 30.—A. D. Payne, Amarillo attorney who confessed playing his wife in a devised explosion, ended his own life by the same means early today.

The fatal explosion was believed by officers to have been produced by a vial of nitroglycerin which Payne carried suspended about his neck.

Fellow prisoners in the county jail where the attorney awaited trial for the slaying of his wife were dislodged from their cots. A sleeping cell mate was uninjured. Payne died lying face down in his cot.

He had frequently boasted he would never stand trial.

Payne's wife was killed and his 11-year-old son maimed by a dynamite bomb which wrecked the family car June 12.

Weeks later he asked Gene Howe, Amarillo newspaper editor, to investigate the case, saying civil authorities were making no progress.

Howe's investigation led to Payne's arrest. He confessed killing his wife because of love for his stenographer, Miss Verona Thompson. He confessed to four previous attempts to end his wife's life.

They were college sweethearts.

PORTLAND PARK OWNER GOES SUICIDE ROUTE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30.—Edwin F. Platt, 55, president of the Lotus Isle Amusement company, was found dead in the office of the island park at midnight. He had been shot through the heart.

At his feet lay a small revolver and on the desk was a note indicating suicide. The note, clipped to a sealed envelope addressed to his wife, Mabel Platt, Portland, said:

"Sweetheart, my Mabel, you know I love you. E. F. Platt: 8:15 P. M."

The body was discovered by Walter McKnight, public relations man in charge of concessions at the park and a brother-in-law of the dead man.

WIFE SLAYS HUSBAND. ALLEGING INFIDELITY

GREYBULL, Wyo., Aug. 30.—Authorities today had a confession from Mrs. Charles Fitzmaurice that she killed her husband, Greybull postmaster, early last Sunday after a quarrel over the husband's alleged intimacies with other women.

Mrs. Fitzmaurice's confession was obtained early today after three hours of grilling. Thomas McKinney, county attorney, said Mrs. Fitzmaurice admitted firing two shots, carrying her husband's body to an automobile and transporting it several miles outside the city, where she threw it in a clump of grass.

The following day the woman called at the postoffice to inquire about her husband, she told authorities, in order to avert suspicion.

FATHER SLAYS HIS SON IN HUNTING MISTAKE

EUGENE, Aug. 30.—Ladean Clark, 17, was shot and killed instantly by his father, Robert Clark, while hunting in the mountains near Blachly yesterday. The coroner said today he would investigate.

Mr. Clark and his son had separated and had not seen each other for some time, the father told Coroner Branstetter, when he saw an object move in the brush 200 yards away. He took aim with his rifle and fired. It was not until he reached the spot where he had seen the object at which he fired that he knew it was his own son.

of the home of Sutherland's former wife, but from that point the bounds used by the posse failed to follow a definite trail.

Inception of Affair
Deputy Sheriff Duley, the first victim of Sutherland's deadly shooting, was killed as he intercepted a delivery of liquor. With John Clark, another deputy, he had lain in wait at Marcola for "Stew" Sutherland, 21-year-old son of the killer, on the highway near the home of young Sutherland's stepfather. There he surprised the youth in the act of selling a gallon of moonshine to an unidentified man and girl in an automobile.

Duley placed the trio under arrest and stepped on the running board of the car. As the car started up he apparently saw the elder Sutherland lurking near the barn which is adjacent to the road.

"Wait a minute," he called. He jumped off the running board and ran back along the road. He was met by three shots from the .32 automatic held by Sutherland and dropped, fatally wounded.

Threats Often Made
The Sutherlands have been engaged in illicit liquor traffic for a long time, Sheriff Bown declared. Although the murderer has never appeared in court on a bootlegging count, he has made threats against officers many times and has operated stills in the hills behind Marcola on various occasions. It is known here. Young Sutherland has been arrested on liquor selling counts three times previously.

The elder Sutherland was known as a deadly shot with revolver or rifle and his name as a killer of game animals was known up and down the Mohawk valley.
