WHITNEY BOISE STRICKEN

WIGFALL ADJUDGED SUICIDE

PORTLAND, Aug. 30.—A coroner's jury had today solved the death of Charles Y. Wigfall, 35, brilliant but eccentric Portland attorney and former Vancouver, Wash., minister, by finding, in its verdict, he had ended his own life.

Wigfall told authorities he had been shot in a scuffle with a robber.

Miss Eleanor Blackley, client of Wigfall, told the jury she talked with the attorney a few days before his death and he told her "I will not have these troubles to contend with much longer."

BUILDING CHICKENHOUSE

GLENDALE, Aug. 30.—Charles Walker, who last year bought the former Rust place, near Lebanon falls on Cow creek, about 13 miles from this city, is building a chicken house 20x80 feet, with an estimated capacity of about 500 hens. ADAMS ACCUSED IN ATTEMPTED BUY OF EUGENE'S UTILITY

PORTLAND, Aug. 30.—Information was received today from Washington, D. C. that an effort of E. J. Adams, Oregon resident, to bring about the sale of the Eugene municipal power plant to eastern interests while holding a position as special attorney with the federal trade commission will be investigated by that commission next week.

Adams, who was secretary to Senator Stanford during the latter's service in Washington, has held legal positions with government departments since that time and letters in the hands of the trade commission are said to indicate he was interested in the projected sale of the Eugene plant to the P. W. Chapman company, large investment concern.

As the trade commission still is investigating the public utilities of the country under a senate resolution, its members have taken instant cognizance of the report that an attorney on their rolls was aiding negotiations for the sale of a municipal plant to private operators.

Adams has not been connected with the utilities investigation of the commission but has been assigned to cases involving misbranding and false advertising.

According to the charge before the commission Adams intimated to several persons in Eugene that upon the transfer of the Eugene plant to private operators eastern corporations would set up new industrial plants there. The evidence included a telegram purported to have been sent the Eugene Regis-

ter, newspaper, on July 2, which said in part "agreement with Chapman prevents disclosure industrial plans until price fixed."

LOOK OUT FOR \$20 COUNTERFEITS, IS OREGON WARNING

A warning was issued from Portland today to merchants all over the state to beware of \$20 counterfeit notes that are being placed in circulation in that city.

The passers are believed to be traveling by automobile and will undoubtedly endeavor to pass the notes at other places. The bills first made their appearance at fruit and vegetable stands in Portland.

The notes are poorly executed. All bear the bank number "2" of the federal reserve bank of New York in the black seal on the left side of the face of the note. The back is too lightly executed and much detail is missing.

One of the men reported to be passing the counterfeit bills is described as being about 35 to 40 years old, 5 feet 8 inches in height, fairly heavy build. Has complexion similar to Malay or Egyptian. He wears a light grey suit and light fedora hat. His companion is about 25 years old, five feet four inches in height and slender built. Has dark sallow complexion and small black mustache. He is wearing a reddish brown suit, brown fedora hat and ring with oblong green setting.

GLENDALE MILL IS CLOSED DOWN

GLENDALE, Aug. 30.—All operations of the Glendale Lumber company, including logging, the sawmill, yard and planing mill, were closed down the first of the week and all men laid off with no explanations given. More than 100 men are affected by the shut down. Officers of the company here are very reticent as to reasons for the shutdown or as to any announcements of future plans, although it has been intimated the shutdown is only temporary.

A. A. Snyder, president and general manager, could not be reached for a statement and was said to be out of the city on business.

Rumors have been current here ever since last fall that the company was experiencing financial difficulties said to be due to the slump in the lumber markets. The loss of a payroll of more than \$10,000 per month is being keenly felt by the merchants, citizens and business men of this little community.

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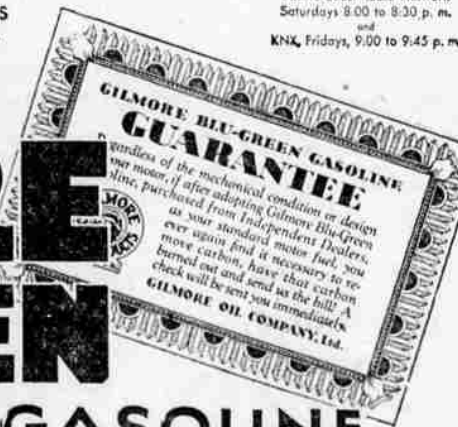
