News Briefs

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PORTLAND, Sept. 4.—Don McRoy, 20, a sheet metal worker, was killed today when he fell 40 feet from the roof of the new Willamette Iron & Steel company plant. He fell across an electric wire. The youth died enroute to a hospital.

SUPREME COURT RESENTS CHARGE OF INTIMIDATION

Mannix, Denied Rehearing, Justly Disbarred as Lawyer, Firm View of Tribunal.

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 4.—Denial by the Oregon supreme court yesterday of Thomas Mannix's petition for rehearing of the order disbaring him from the practice of law in this state exhausts the last resource at his command to secure a reversal or modification of the order. In the opinion of Arthur Benson, clerk of the court, who explained that the state supreme court has final and complete jurisdiction in such cases. Mannix may, however, after an indefinite period of time petition for reinstatement, which may be granted or denied at the discretion of the court.

"Mr. Mannix closes his argument for a rehearing with the charge that this court has been intimidated by the fact that the late George W. Joseph, the defendant's accuser, immediately preceding the announcement of our decision became the republican nominee for governor of Oregon," read the opinion. "We had hoped that our analysis of the evidence, virtually all of which was taken from copies of the public records, would bear conviction that we sought the facts and let the result abide the event. The evidence persuaded our mind that the revocation of the defendant's license was not only warranted but demanded, upon the same day that the petition for rehearing was filed Mr. Joseph was removed from this life to the Great Tribunal above."

"Court Feels Justified." "Mr. Mannix did not argue that the record failed to justify the severe discipline imposed and, as previously said, his criticism of our findings instead of shaking our confidence in them, convinces us that they were fully justified."

"To disbar a brother attorney, especially one who has practiced extensively in the courts of this state, and who has at many times displayed a learning of the law which has commanded our admiration, is a most unpleasant task. It is one which we would have avoided had not our duty commanded its performance."

"Naturally under such circumstances the mind is loath to draw a result which will bring shame to the attorney and deprive him of his franchise to earn a livelihood by the means which he has industrially cultivated ever since he reached manhood."

"However, the facts have been announced. They have been gathered from a record which the defendant was the author. Now to have it said that something other than the evidence brought up to our conclusion detracts from that satisfaction we anticipated would be ours when an uninviting task had been finally terminated."

PACIFIC STATES SEEK EMERGENCY PEAR RATE EAST

MEDFORD, Sept. 4.—Fruit growers and shipping organizations in California, Oregon and Washington today filed a request with northwest railroads for an emergency pear rate to eastern markets.

Public service commissions of three states were asked to intervene because of a heavy crop and low market conditions. Wenatchee, Yakima and Hood River seeks restoration of the former pear emergency rate of \$1.50 per hundred in lieu of the present rate of \$1.75 per hundred. Rogue River Traffic association asked the Southern Pacific for \$1.25 per hundred.

Paul Shopp, Southern Pacific president, advised Medford fruitmen his railroad had the request under advisement.

MEDFORD, Sept. 4.—Rogue River valley shippers were advised today the recently invoked Canadian tariff on American apples and pears would be abandoned as soon as the Canadian products are sold. Canadian railroads and trans-continental rail associations were asked to use their influence. All northwest districts filed protests.

PRUNE GROWERS GET PAY

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 4.—Members of the Washington Growers' Packing corporation will receive 3 cents a pound on prunes grading 40 or less to the pound, 2 cents a pound on 40-60s and 2 cents on smaller grades, on delivery at the packing plant here. This first payment is advanced to take care of the expense of harvesting the crop. Other payments will be made when the prunes are sold.

LOGAN AND BRYAN FILE APPEAL FROM OREGON BARRIER

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 4.—An appeal was filed in circuit court today by Logan & Bryan stock brokers, from a decision of Mark McCallister, state corporation commissioner, denying the firm the right to conduct a brokerage business in Oregon.

In the transcript filed was included a copy of the report of Henry Kleessenbeck, examiner for the corporation department, on which denial of the application was based and in which Logan & Bryan is scored by the examiner for its connections with Overbeck & Cooke company, defunct stock broking concern in Portland.

The report of the examiner declares that for a long period of years the two firms Overbeck & Cooke and Logan & Bryan operated in conjunction; that Logan and Bryan executed orders by Overbeck & Cooke and operated in such a way as to cause a large number of people who dealt with Overbeck & Cooke to believe Logan & Bryan were the real principals.

Overbeck & Cooke were capitalized at \$10,000, states the report, but it appears the loss to hundreds of customers will exceed a million and a half dollars. The report says the failure of Overbeck & Cooke was primarily due to officers of that company trading against the company's customers and "to the practices of the officers of Overbeck & Cooke company. If they did know, their conduct was dishonorable," continues the report. "If they did know, then under the circumstances and in the light of the confidence reposed in them by the public their gross negligence in not ascertaining the facts which a most cursory inspection of their own and the books of Overbeck & Cooke company would have disclosed, is equally reprehensible."

"From the day of failure until now," the report goes on to say, "it appears that Logan & Bryan have failed to do anything to in-

dictate in any manner that they have any regard for those who suffered losses."
