LIBERTY PICTURE PROVES UNUSUAL

The story of a young bride and groom and a half-crazed doctor in their desperate battle against the elements after they have been trapped high on the side of a relentless mountain has been so presented in "The White Hell of Pitz Palu" as to form one of the most unusual motion pictures ever seen in Roseburg. This picture which opened a three-day engagement at the Liberty last night held a large audience spell-bound from its opening scene until the dramatic conclusion.

The picture is based on a true story. A German doctor and his young bride went to the Alps, in their enthusiasm to conquer the highest peak, Pitz Palu, they disregarded the danger and the bride is hurled into one of the deep crevasses. The doctor is bitter, almost insane, in his defiance of the mountain and for years attempts to scale its icy cliffs. Upon his last attempt he is accompanied by a newlywed couple. They all go against the advice of experienced mountaineers and melting snow traps them on the side of the mountain. Jealousy and fear drive the groom almost insane. He is injured in a fall and the doctor breaks his own leg in bringing the young man back to the cliff. The battle of this trio in their effort to stave off starvation and freezing, the heroic sacrifice of the doctor, the death-defying flight of a famous German aviator who locates them and the miraculous rescue by a big searching party—all these scenes amid the fury of an Alpine storm go to make an altogether different picture than any yet produced.

SEATTLE DEFEATS SACTO; HOLLYWOOD DOWNS MISSIONS

The Seattle Indians, down-trodden club of the Pacific Coast league for several weeks, today found themselves in another rung in the ladder, the goal of which is the top. The Indians, staging a mighty effort in the ninth, broke a tie and defeated the Sacramento Senators 7 to 6.

With Hollywood winning consistently, the battle for position is being maintained largely by the lower half clubs. Hollywood again defeated the Missions yesterday, this time by a score of 16 to 12. It was a slugging match throughout, 38 hits for both teams featuring the game with Jess Hill of the Stars making a home run.

Contrasted to the hit-fest put on by their brother clubs, the San Francisco Seals and Los Angeles enzanized in a pitching duel which ended in victory for the Angels when Ballou shut out the Seals, 5 to 0. Ballou allowed only two hits, while Lefty Douglas pitched a sterling brand of ball for the Seals, allowing seven hits.

Oakland made it three straight over the Portland Ducks, winning 8 to 4 last night at Portland. A big sixth inning, which netted six runs, accounted largely for the victory.

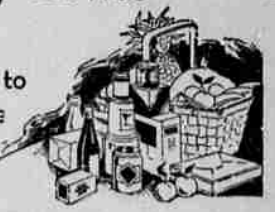
