Heinline Piano School to Begin Classes on Next Monday

The Heinline piano school presents a very attractive and artistic appearance for the busy season ahead, which is assured by the already large enrollment. Mrs. Heinline has returned from the summer spent in Chicago Music college full of enthusiasm and new teaching ideas. Mrs. L. Y. Lander will again be associated with the studio as assistant teacher in melody class work; she is most efficient in her teaching, having studied with Mrs. Heinline since childhood and having taught with her for three years.

Many new features are being included in the courses of study, ensuring students of all ages the most modern and highly efficient training. Mrs. Heinline spent a very busy, but very interesting summer in Chicago in contact with some of the most renowned teachers in all branches of music education. She had two private lessons a week with Percy Grainger and four interpretation classes a week. He demanded certain qualifications in students before accepting them. They had to satisfy him not only in their playing but in their general musicianship, sight reading and ensemble playing. In his interpretation classes, he featured both ensemble playing and played many of the very difficult compositions of the modern composers as well as his own compositions; explaining in detail his methods and habits of practice, playing, touch, pedaling, phrasing, etc. He particularly emphasized the more delicate gradations of tone, strength and the more subtle shades of expression obtained largely by pedal technique for which he is famous. Mr. Grainger's concert tours net him \$2000 per night, on his students felt very appreciative of their contact with him.

Another delightful part of the course was the normal training with Otto Miesner, who is the author of the Melody way piano class system, and a educator of national reputation, noted composer, author and teacher. He is very inspirational and in his daily lectures as well as in his daily children's classes, he stressed the importance of bringing music into the reach of every child, guaranteeing every boy and girl equal opportunity to enjoy music and he demonstrated how easily their interest is developed by means of class lessons. Last season 75,000 children studied Melody way and last week Mr. Miesner conducted an institute for 300 teachers in Los Angeles.

Mrs. Heinline also took the Caruthers course in child training, so she feels especially well equipped for her class work during the coming season. The studio will be open Monday for all private and class lessons, but the kindergarten will not begin until the 15th.

Mrs. Weatherford's Piano Studio Opens This Week for Busy Season

The piano studio of Mrs. Harriet G. Weatherford presents a colorful and charming atmosphere for her classes this season. Every possible thing has been accomplished to make the studio pleasant to the eye. Mrs. Weatherford opened her studio of piano this week for the fifth consecutive season in Roseburg and has enrolled a large class for the winter months. She is a well trained and thoroughly capable teacher having studied with several distinguished and outstanding pianists and teachers.

She is a certified teacher of the "Dunning System of Improved Music Study" and has had normal and pedagogical training with Mrs. Melville Liszewska, famous for her teaching and concert work both in America and in Europe and with John Thompson, nationally known pianist, composer and teacher and also an authority on group teaching. Mrs. Weatherford has studied piano and interpretation from Jean Warren Carrick, now dean of the Dunning system of music study; and from Helen Harrington Lamb, who for many years studied in Europe with Liszewska and other masters. She has also studied at the University of Oregon with George Hopkins, head of the piano department.

During the past season, Mrs. Weatherford presented her pupils in a series of recitals, as will be her policy in the future. A recital of special merit last season was the one presented by Miss Kathleen Ross in an individual recital at Mrs. Weatherford's home.

Mrs. Weatherford is securing additional pianos for her studio this fall and will conduct group piano classes, combining group playing and ensemble work with the Dunning system. The classes are being formed at this time and will assemble the week of the 15th.

Celebrate Golden Wedding Anniversary With Beautiful Confirmation Ceremony

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Sept. 5.—(Special)—In the presence of several hundred invited guests from Oregon and Washington, filling the big lobby of the Memorial Union building to overflowing, Dr. John B. Horner, pioneer, author, and for 40 years a head professor of history at Oregon State college, and Mrs. Horner, a daughter of pioneers, celebrated their golden jubilee tonight with a beautiful and impressive confirmation ceremony.

The service was opened with an ode sung by Mrs. B. Leo Pasot of Portland, after which the couple marched to the altar while Byron Arnold of the music department played the wedding march. Dr. Carl Doney, president of Willamette university, acted as Dr. Horner's best man, and the bride was given away by Judge J. K. Weatherford of Albany. The ceremony was read by Dr. D. V. Poling of Corvallis, pastor. Mrs. Horner's mother's wedding ring, made from gold mined in California in 1853 by her father.

Maid of honor were Miss Gertrude Nolan, Miss Eva Corrie, Miss Ada Foster and Miss Gertrude Strickland. Matrons of honor were Mrs. Ruth Tartar, Mrs. Jack Porter, Mrs. Earl Lee and Mrs. E. C. Allworth. Catherine Fisher, Jane Woodcock and Jane Keeney were flower girls; Frances Jensen, Letty Warrington, Eleanor Hanson and Lucile Marks were ribbon girls, and Tommy Nelson acted as ring bearer. Ushers were W. A. Jensen, Dr. E. V. Vaughn, C. T. McDevitt, Dr. H. M. Francis, Dr. William Johnson and E. E. Wilson.

Dr. Horner, son of the late Rev. E. R. Horner, pioneer circuit rider, came from his native state, Texas, through Nevada, California and eastern Oregon by pack train, while the trail was still unsuitable for wagons, arriving at Walla Walla, Wash., in May, 1862.

He is one of the oldest living graduates of Whitman university, now Whitman college, the other being William S. Clark of Walla Walla. Dr. Horner has also attended Willamette university, Thoreau math college, the Blue Mountain university and the summer sessions of the University of California and Harvard university, and holds the degrees of B. S., M. S., A. B., A. M., Litt. D. and L. H. D.

Two books written by Dr. Horner, "Oregon Literature" and "Oregon History," have each gone through three editions. He is popular as a lecturer, and is nationally known for his work in prehistoric research.

Sunday evening, September 5, 1930, Dr. Horner and Miss Isabelle Skilton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Skilton of Benton county, were married in Philomath college chapel by the late Bishop N. Castle. Mrs. Horner came across the plains from Centerville, Iowa, in 1865, her father being captain of a train of 100 families. They settled on the Captain Chism donation land claim eight miles southwest of Corvallis, which the family still owns.

Mrs. Horner received her education in Philomath college and Willamette university, and taught school with Dr. Horner for several years in Union, Brownsville and Roseburg, later becoming matron of Waldo, Alpha and Cauthorn halls at Oregon State college.

The Horners have two daughters—Miss Vera, who is head of the history department of Corvallis high school, and Miss Alicia Pearl, history instructor in Washington high school, Portland.
