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GLENDALE SCHOOL OPENED MONDAY

GLENDALE, Sept. 9.—The Glendale public schools began the 1930-1931 school year Monday with an enrollment of nearly one-third less than opening day a year ago. The high school enrollment was 44 as compared with 50 of last year. The registration in the grades was 121. Last year it was 134.

A number of children of school age expect to enter school during the next few weeks or as soon as the fruit harvests are over with. It is not expected the total attendance this year will equal that of last year.

Class and grade assignments were made and various plans for the school work for the ensuing year discussed at a teachers' meeting held Saturday forenoon at the school house.

In the high school department, M. L. Winslow, principal, will have charge of the algebra, geometry and physics classes. Miss Helen Gregg will teach high school English I, II and IV and domestic arts. She will also have charge of the high school girls' athletics. Mrs. M. L. Winslow will teach civics, world history, latin and typing. The classes in advanced arithmetic, high school geography, bookkeeping and French will be in charge of Kenneth Vannieu. He will also have charge of the high school and grade boys' athletics.

The grade teachers were given the following assignments: Mrs. Alma Archambeau, first grade; Mrs. Elizabeth Winchell, second and third grades; Miss Iuz Parkman fourth grade and all grade girls' gymnasium classes; Miss Mildred Scott, fifth grade and music classes; Mrs. Vernon Williams, sixth grade; Mrs. William Wunach, seventh grade; and Miss Florence Johnson, eighth grade.
