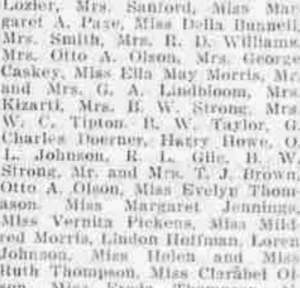
Beauty Experts Predict "Bobs" Popular Return
