(Salthellin Star) SUTHERLIN, Sept. 12.—A party of four government engineers, in charge of Francis G. Wells, has been here the past several days making a geological survey of the quicksilver and other mineral properties east of town and they expect it will be two or three weeks before their work is completed. It is understood the object of the survey is for a government report covering the mineral resources of Douglas county.

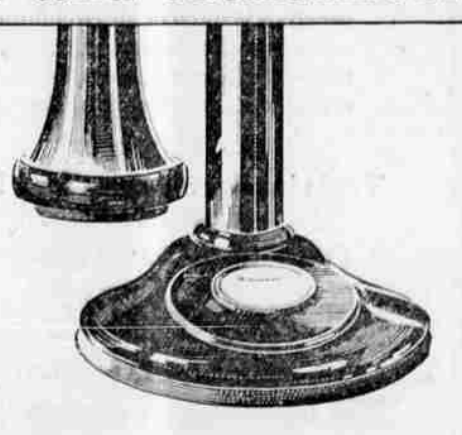
