 Most of the local hunters do their hunting on upper Cow creek although a few prefer the rough country in the Mount Reuben district.

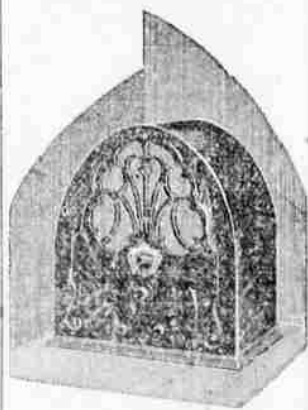
MELROSE

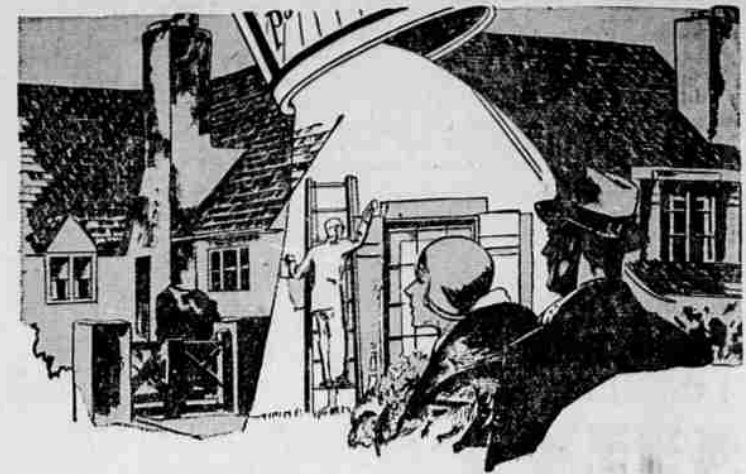
